

SOLDIER SHOT BY GUARD AT GATES OF CITY

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FREE CITY OF DANZIG, July 20 (AP)—The killing of a Polish soldier near the Danzig frontier village of Postelau this forenoon suddenly increased tension between the free city and Poland. Police charged the Polish soldier, Witold Budziewicz, was shot by a Danzig border official on Polish soil.

Free city authorities said the Danzig customs officer, Max Stein, had fired in self defense. Officials told widely differing stories of the incident which created great excitement at the office of the Polish commissioner in Danzig.

The account of authorities of the nazified Danzig government was that Stein while patrolling near the Polish-Danzig frontier saw a man on a bicycle riding toward him from Poland with a rifle slung on his shoulder.

At the border, Danzigers said, the man dismounted, raised the rifle to his shoulder and released the safety catch as he aimed at the Danzig official.

Stein asserted he shot the Pole in self defense. Danzig authorities said they were not certain the Pole was dead, but the Polish commissioner's office reported Budziewicz died a few minutes after he collapsed at the frontier.

The Polish version was that a Danzig customs officer and two men in Danzig storm troopers' uniforms approached the border and without warning shot Budziewicz who was several yards within the Polish side.

Poles described the incident as "inexcusable provocation." The Polish commissioner, Marian Chodacki, conferred with Danzig senate officials while both sides still were receiving reports from the scenes of the shooting, on the free city district's southern frontier.

As the incident occurred, the nazified Danzig senate was preparing for conscription of men and wealth and taking further measures to meet emergencies which might arise from the Nazi campaign to reunite the free city with Germany.

Senators worked on a decree which would give sweeping authority for requiring all citizens to serve the state and for the use of any private property in defense of the community.

The free city government already has authority under a decree to conscript men for its enlarged police force, which has been increased to 4000 men on active duty.

Defense organizations already have commandeered some trucks and automobiles for public duty.

WPA HEAPS WRATH ON CONGRESSMEN

Police prevented WPA workers and sympathizers in New York today from hanging two congressmen in effigy, a scheduled part of a nationwide protest demonstration which drew an undetermined percentage of workers off WPA projects.

Some 2000 demonstrators, as estimated by leaders of the 450 police who shepherded them in New York's Columbus Circle, had gathered at the call of the workers alliance. Police stopped cars, took work on a gallows for two stuffed figures representing Representatives Woodrum (D-Va.) and Tabor (R-N.Y.), of the house committee which investigated WPA.

Louis F. Schilling, deputy chief inspector, said the mock hanging "was liable to cause trouble."

To this, President David Lasser of the alliance said in Washington: "We wouldn't want to do anything that would cause trouble."

Meanwhile, incomplete reports indicated few workers left their jobs to demonstrate, as asked by the alliance, against new relief restrictions.

In Los Angeles, an alliance spokesman said his tally showed 7500 walked off 85 projects. Other reports, however, used such figures as 40 or 50 in Port Worth, Texas; 17 at Columbus, Ohio; and 81 at Milwaukee, Wis.

Senator Maloney (D-Conn.) predicted at Washington there would be "severe suffering" after September 1 when existing WPA wage differentials are to be altered and a 30 day payless vacation is to begin for relief workers who have been on the rolls 18 months.

He urged senators appeal to WPA authorities not to cut wages of workers in the north and west.

GRANTS PASS, July 20 (AP)—Still impressed with the danger

of spread from three Provolt farming community brush fires which merged into one before being controlled late last night, Fire Warden John Kincaid sent 75 men to patrol lines this morning. Ruth Williams, Provolt telephone operator, said no buildings nor grain burned as the three fires sprang up in quick sequence Wednesday afternoon. Kincaid said that he was unable to estimate the area covered during the night but that it might be only 100 acres. It was the fifth Applegate valley fire in two days.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 20 (AP)—Brush fires in widely scattered sections of California kept weary firefighters busy, but reports today indicated no valuable stands of timber were in immediate danger.

Two hundred men were fighting a brush fire that broke out near the southwestern boundary of the Sequoia national park in Tulare county, and destroyed at least five buildings of the CCC camp at Yucca. The nearest timber in the forest was about 10 miles from the fire.

About 150 men battled a grass and brush fire which burned over five square miles between Paynes creek and Mineral near the Lassen Volcanic national park. Forest fighters expected to bring under control today a fire that had destroyed more than 1000 acres in the Sierra forest near the middle fork of the San Joaquin river in Madera county.

Six hundred acres of brush were burned 15 miles southwest of Redding, where 75 men were assigned to fight the flames.

In Happy valley, Shasta county, a 6000-acre brush fire still burned.
