WATER PROJECT PLANS CARRIED OUT BY COUNCIL

TULELAKE — The city council, in session Monday night, signified intention to proceed at once with installation of water and sewage systems without waiting for government funds applied for many months ago.

Tension in recent developments between two factions of citizens of the town lessened as the result and City Attorney Charles Lederer, Alturas, was instructed to take the necessary steps to prepare for a special election when voters here are expected to vote on the issuance of acquisition improvement bonds for installation of the sewage system. Bonds totaling \$66,000 voted some time ago for installation of water are general obligation bonds and self liquidating. No portion of these bonds may be used for sewage installation. Revenue for the disposal project must come from taxation of the city's 251 lots.

The first rough estimate made by Attorney Lederer and William Wales, city engineer, on cost of the dual installation project totaled \$58,000. Only the amount needed of the \$66,000 bond issue voted several months ago will be used in water distribution, the remainder of the total to remain unaided. While the total of the assessment bonds to be voted upon has not as yet been determined by the council, installation of both systems will not exceed the first estimate, it is believed. The session was largely attended with arguments for and against the systems highlighting the meeting.

Cleanup day, slated for the first week in August, came up for discussion and A. A. Rodenberger, and E. P. Fitzpatrick will work with Fire Chief Floyd Boyd in preparing untenanted city lots for weed burning. Lots will be mowed by the city, unless the work is done by owners, and an assessment of \$1.00 per lot will be made.

MAN CONVICTED ON DRUNK DRIVING

Lester Wright, charged with drunk driving, was found guilty of the charge by a jury which heard the case early Thursday evening before Police Judge Carl K. Cook.

Wright, who is at liberty on a \$100 property bond, was represented by E. E. Driscoll. D. E. Van Vactor represented the city. Wright will be sentenced later, Judge Cook stated.

Buying Lags In Retail Stores, Survey Shows

NEW YORK, July 21 (AP)—Buying in retail stores at leading centers of distribution throughout the United States this week lagged under last, but ran 7 to 12 per cent above a year ago. Dun & Bradstreet reported today.

Meantime, buying in wholesale markets continued to expand. "Although consumer demand continued brisk for light summer apparel, vacation necessities, and some lines of house furnishings, retail activity on the whole was moderately lower than a week ago," the survey said.

"To some extent, the decline seemed attributable to shortages of desirable merchandise; this was an important factor in department stores, where stock of many types of summer goods were frequently reported too low to warrant the usual heavy clearance promotions."

A few stores felt that the reduction in WPA rolls was already cutting into sales totals, but the majority found no appreciable change as yet in this type of buying.

ALASKA-U. S. HIGHWAY ROUTES UNDER STUDY

(Continued from Page One) the province than any other feature of the highway scheme—on grounds the United States may be interested primarily in a military road.

However, Premier Pattullo has argued that the United States would not obtain control of the road by reason of such a loan. As to the highway being a military road, he said:

"If the road serves military purposes for the United States it will also serve Canada. If the United States gets into a tight box in war on the Pacific we're in it whether we like it or not."

Members of the Canadian commission are: Charles Stewart, Ottawa, chairman; Brig. Gen. T. L. Tremblay, Quebec; J. M. Wardis, department of mines and resources, Ottawa; and Arthur Dixon, British Columbia, public works department, and J. W. Spencer, both of Victoria.

Rep. Warren G. Magnuson, (D-Wash.), is chairman of the American commission. Other members are James W. Carey, Seattle engineer; Donald Macdonald, Fairbanks, Alaska engineer; Ernest H. Gruening, director of the division of territories, department of interior and Thomas H. Riggs, New York.

Two British Columbia survey parties now are working slowly through the province's northland, mapping out two suggested routes for the road. A \$25,000 grant was approved by the last provincial legislature to pay for the preliminary surveys.

One route follows the coastline, the other lies behind the towering coast range mountains.

The coast route would be north from Hazelton, then west through Telegraph creek and Atlin with a maximum altitude of 6000 feet at some points.

The interior route, slightly longer, would follow the Peace, Liard and Pelly rivers from Finlay Forks, through Whitewater, Liard Post, Frances Lake, Ross River and Pelly Crossing, then on to Dawson, Y. T. Maximum altitude of this route would be about 3150 feet and its sponsors claim the longer distance would be compensated by better weather conditions in the winter months, making it easier to keep the road open all year.

HOUSE APPROVES CAMPAIGN BILL

WASHINGTON, July 21 (UP)—The house tonight passed the Hatch "clean politics" bill which may serve to cripple the democratic national committee's political machine in 1940 and favor the nomination of a presidential candidate who might not have full support of the national organization.

The bill, which would divorce politics from relief and outlaw political activities by all federal employees except the president, vice president, cabinet officers and other policy-making officials, has been approved by the senate which is expected to concur in minor house changes.

The roll call vote on passage, which came after the house had been in continuous session for 112 hours, was announced as 243 to 143. A few minutes earlier the house had refused by a record vote of 232 to 146 to send the measure back to committee. This motion was introduced by Arthur D. Healey, (D-Mass.), who assailed the bill as "unconstitutional."

The measure, authored by Sen. Carl Hatch, (D-N.H.), first was introduced last year as an amendment to the 1939 federal relief bill but was defeated at that time on the plea of Senate Majority Leader Alben W. Barkley, (D-Ky.). A senate committee investigation into the alleged coercion of relief workers in last fall's election resulted in revival of the legislation. Barkley's state of Kentucky was one of those denounced by the senate committee.

While President Roosevelt has never expressed himself definitely for or against the measure, it was opposed vigorously by house democratic leaders and the national democratic organization headed by Postmaster General James A. Farley.

Republicans and a group of democrats led by Rep. Jack Dempsey (D-N.H.), stood solidly behind it and succeeded in restoring drastic provisions which the house judiciary committee struck from the senate version.

The provisions bar U. S. district attorneys, postmasters, internal revenue collectors and other vote getting officials whose jobs are considered definitely of the patronage variety, from participating actively in political campaigns.
