These two clubs are all tied up in third place and a hot old contest is expected with a record crowd.

The Klamath Falls Red Sox invaded the hunting grounds of the dangerous Redding Tigers. The Tigers will be coming back on the rebound before their home fans after losing at Hill last Sunday and will be fighting to retain the league leadership which they have possessed all season.

Six straight victories have sent the Red Sox right up to the top of the league in a hot tie with Redding and local fans believe Sunday's contest will be a real baseball classic.

Clyde Carlstrom, the lad with the crooked ball, has won seven games and lost one so far in league competition. Manager Shipman of the Red Sox will send Clyde back to the mound Sunday in quest of an eighth victory which would put the Oregonians all alone on top of the pile.

"Gabby" Fryer will receive Carlstrom's slants behind the plate as usual.

How much effect the heat in Redding will have on the Klamath Falls team remains to be seen but the Klamath boys are at a disadvantage right from the start due to Redding's tremendous heat. Inasmuch as Carlstrom works his best on hot days, the two teams will go into the battle on fairly even terms.

Cliff McLean, who starred for the Red Sox against McCloud last Sunday, will again be in the lineup and playing his first contest in the classic Redding game. McLean has added slugging power to the Oregon club and in addition is an all-around player.

Little Marshall Eyston joined the list after last week's game, overtaking the slugging Quinn, who has rested at the top for many weeks.

Klamath Aces To Stage Hill Climb Sunday

Twenty-six errors marred a doubleheader softball program at Cook field Thursday night as Junior Chamber of Commerce defeated Southern Pacific, 13-6, in the opening tilt and the Elks overwhelmed Veterans of Foreign Wars in the nightcap, 25-3.

The Jaycees, playing without the services of their star center-fielder, Bud Dockery, touched Pitcher Murray of the Railroad nine for 12 hits, which with seven SP miscues, enabled the winners to score in every inning. The loss for the Trainmen was their tenth straight. Not since the opening game against VFW when they won, 5-2, has Southern Pacific emerged from a league encounter with a victory.

Fred Whitlesey, with three hits in four attempts, led the service club men to their fourth win in ten starts. Jim Busch, Joe Lemen and Jake Stahl contributed two hits apiece to the Jaycees total. Southern Pacific garnered four of its runs in the second and added single tallies in the fourth and seventh frames.

The infield of the losing Railroaders went sky high during the fray, erring in practically every inning. Seven fielding mistakes were chalked against the SP infield defense.

The Elks landed hard on the last-place VFW contingent in the second tilt of the night with a 21-hit attack that netted runs in every inning except the fifth. Eight runners crossed the plate in the sixth, seventh and first and six in the fourth as the firstmen enjoyed three big scoring episodes.

VFW players fumbled the ball with great frequency, and during a three innings it seemed that they never would retire the Elks on three outs. It was the largest total of the year for the victors, and marked the tenth consecutive defeat for the Veterans. Center-fielder McCandless collected three of the losers' nine soft balls.

SUDS CLING TO LEAD WITH 12-INNING WIN OVER OAKLAND

A crowd of 16,750 paying customers, a record in Seattle baseball history, watched their hometown Rainiers cling to a game and a half lead in the Pacific Coast league race by nosing out Oakland in the twelfth inning last night.

The Rainiers beat the sixth-place Oaks, 2 to 1, as Catcher Gilly Campbell cracked a line drive into right field to score Shortstop Alan Strang in the third extra frame.

The big feature at the Seattle park was Al Schacht, the major league comedian, and thousands were turned away before game time.

San Francisco's Seals, meantime, climbed back into their usual third-place berth by beating San Diego, 7 to 3, at San Francisco, as Sacramento was dropping a 4 to 2 decision to Los Angeles at the Angels park.

Win Ballou, the Seals' veteran curve-ball artist, kept the Padres under control throughout, giving up only seven hits. It was the first start for Ballou this season. He is ordinarily used in a relief capacity only.

Back on the mound after a three-week layoff because of injury, Julio Bonetti, the league's leading pitcher, twirled his 13th victory against two defeats as the Angels stopped the rampant Solons.

At Portland, Manager Bill Sweeney won a ball game for his last-place Beavers, singling with two out in the ninth to score Eddie Wilson with the run that gave them an 8 to 7 win over Hollywood.

PORTLAND, July 21 (AP)—Coos and Douglas counties were the favored lands in Oregon for fishermen this weekend, according to the game commission's weekly prospectus.

Angling was fair throughout the state.

LINN—Fishing good in most streams; fair catches made in Santiam and Calapooya rivers, limit takes in Quartzville fork of Santiam on salmon eggs. Clear, Parsh and Daly lakes all excellent.

CURRY—Salmon trolling on Rogue improving slightly, trout fishing fair. Trout biting well in other streams with the Checo a favorite. Steelhead not yet taking flies.

DOUGLAS—Diamond Lake yielding limit catches on flashers and worms as well as flies. Steelhead fly fishing reaching its summer peak on North Umpqua. South Umpqua low and poor. Fish and Buckeye lakes yielding excellent catches.

JACKSON—Bait fishing in upper Rogue and tributaries very good. A few salmon and steelhead taking spinners. Small trout and occasional steelhead taking flies near Grants Pass.

KLAMATH—Crescent lake fair. Miller lake poor. Stream trout taking flies well.

BAKER—Fishing good in all sections, with Eagle creek and West Eagle lakes yielding excellent catches.

CHICAGO SOX GRAB 15 OUT OF 19 GAMES

Wonder what kind of super-ethy gas Jimmy Dykes is using in that White Sox machine of his? The Chicagoans, in case you've been busy watching the Yankees, have won 15 of their last 19 games, have risen from the depths of fifth place to a challenging position in what is left of the American league race, and are just three and one-half games back of the runner-up Boston Red Sox.

Until two days ago the Sox hadn't been able to shut out an opponent but now they are boasting about a pair of whitewashing jobs.

The second consecutive one came yesterday and the Red Sox were the victims by a 4-0 score as Thornton Lee turned in a nine-hit job that was backed up by four neatly executed double plays.

The Yankees are at it again. The champions took No. 8 in a row from the St. Louis Browns by 2-1 yesterday in a game that was not quite as close as it sounds. Red Rutling's four-hit pitching, for his 14th win of the year, was more impressive than the fact the Yanks got 13 hits and threatened to bust loose any minute.

Bobby Estelle helped Washington to an 8-7 victory and a sweep of the series over the Detroit Tigers when he banged a home-run in the eighth with a mate aboard. Four-base blows by Hank Greenberg, Earl Averill and Roy Cullenbine couldn't match in effectiveness, the Estelle round-tripper.

In the other American league tussle, Mel Harder of Cleveland had to pitch himself out of a lot of trouble before he came up with a 3-2 decision over the stubborn Philadelphia Athletics.

The National league had only two games to offer but both were important in the general scheme of things.

The Pittsburgh Pirates, not feeling a bit sorry for the battered Giants, jumped from sixth to fourth place by virtue of their 8-4 victory over the taped-up Terriers. That showed the New Yorkers down to fifth place, just a game and a half out of seventh.

Ebbie Fletcher of the Pirates homered in the seventh with two on base. The defeat was the New Yorkers' sixth straight, their longest losing streak of the campaign.

The Boston Bees offered an unbeatable combination in stopping the Cubs again, this time 3-1.
