Before an altar backed with white gladioli, white lilies, and palms, Miss Forest Echo Schneider, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph A. Rev. H. W. Davis of Eugene read the ring ceremony. Preceding the ceremony "Hallelujah" from Tales of Hoffman, by Offenbach, was played by both organ and cello. The traditional wedding march of Wagner and Mendelssohn were played and during the ceremony "Ave Maria," Bach-Gounod, was played very softly. Mrs. Cecil Caldwell presided at the organ and Mr. Charles Devereaux of Eugene played the cello.
