

FOREST FIRE WORK KEEPS MODOC BUSY

Forest fires have been raging in Modoc and neighboring forests during the present period of high temperatures and acutely low humidity. A smoke fire at East Sand butte on the Modoc which started last Friday afternoon was controlled by several hundred CCC enrollees and woods workers from neighboring logging camps. Four tractor trail-builders were used on this fire, together with a tank truck and one grader. The blaze covered an area of approximately 1200 acres and cost in the neighborhood of \$2,000 to extinguish. A squad of CCC boys are still patrolling the area this week. Ranger Larry Smith and Ivan Cuff were in charge of suppression activities on this fire and were also assisted by several members of the supervisor's staff and all available improvement crews on the forest.

An employee of the Great Northern railroad eluder pit crew who was working at the point where the fire started was apprehended by Fire Prevention Officer Stuart Schick and on a plea of guilty before Justice of the Peace George Courtright was fined \$100.

The Lassen and Shasta forests both called upon the Modoc forest for fire fighters to assist in the suppression of fires in their forest over the weekend. Fifty CCCs and two foremen from Juniper Flat camp east of Lakeview were transported to the Viola fire near Mt. Lassen by school buses from Lakeview. One-half of this group had been transferred to Big Valley mountain near Fall River Mills and was engaged in fighting the Shasta forest fire as late as Tuesday of this week. Seventy-five CCC enrollees and two foremen from the Sheldon Refuge camp at Dufferin ranch in Nevada were dispatched by the Modoc forest to the Shasta's Big Valley mountain fire Saturday evening and were also still in active fire duty Tuesday. Twenty-five additional CCC enrollees from Hackamore camp under the leadership of Chester Cannon were also dispatched to this fire Sunday evening. George Fischer of the Modoc forest supervisor's staff is also on the Shasta fire as relief fire boss.

Special fire weather reports received in the forest supervisor's office Tuesday morning indicated a continued high fire hazard for the next few days and the public is requested to cooperate in the fire prevention by using every possible precaution against the starting of fires.

THREE MEN, TWO DEER TRAPPED 10 HOURS BY FLAMES

MADRAS, July 27 (AP)—Three men and two deer shared a small grassy plot for 10 hours last Monday when the grandview-Geneva grass fire surrounded them.

The men, Ray Kemp, George Mills and R. V. Jenkins, Jr., were trapped at the mouth of Squaw creek on the west side of the Deschutes river.

The fire was reported under control last night after four days of work by 165 CCC enrollees and a local crew.

EXPANSION POLICY MAY ELIMINATE NEW VET HOSPITAL

ROSEBURG, Ore., July 26 (AP)—The policy of the U. S. veterans administration is to expand present facilities by means of the addition of new units, rather than construction of hospitals at new locations, Senator Charles L. McNary reported today to the Roseburg chamber of commerce.

The senator said he had conferred with General Hines, head of the veterans administration relative to the proposal by Congressman Lea for a veterans hospital to be located in northern California and had discussed the matter of enlarging the facility at Roseburg to meet needs of veterans in southern Oregon and northern California for hospitalization.

He was informed, he said, that the veterans board now is studying the whole problem of veterans hospitalization and facilities and will soon make a report to the president.

HEAT DAMAGES OREGON WHEAT IN INLAND AREAS

PORTLAND, July 27 (AP)—Intense heat has caused "considerable damage" to inland Oregon and Washington spring wheat, an Oregon Journal market survey showed today.

The report said, however, potential losses were "not much more" than during normal seasons.

Many Yakima valley cantaloupes have dried and the crop may be offered within a short period.

Hot weather has rushed the peach season and hastened the end of the berry period. Tomatoes have been damaged in some sections but a large northwest crop was foreseen. The pear outlook remained good, although conditions were slightly less favorable than ten days ago.

HIGHWAY BUYS LAND FOR ROADSIDE PARK

PORTLAND, July 27 (AP)—The state highway commission opened bids on three projects today and purchased 14 parcels of park acreage along the Wolf creek short-cut to the beaches. The 652 acres along the Wolf creek highway, selected for natural beauty and accessibility to water, will be developed as park sites. The parcels stretch between Sunset camp and Necanicum Junction. The cost was \$19,000.

The commission set a temporary speed limit of 35 miles per hour on the unfinished Wolf creek sector between Elsie and Necanicum Junction.

The commission also accepted recommendation of Judge Robert Sawyer, Bend, retaining Botsford, Constantine and Gardiner as advertising counsel in the 1940 tourist promotion program.

A Lane county delegation was advised the commission would inspect a proposed improvement of the Sluslaw primary highway to the sea within two weeks. A tunnel has been suggested to shorten the winding route over the pass.

SMALLER CROP OF LAMBS PREDICTED

WASHINGTON, July 27 (AP)—The agriculture department estimated the nation's 1939 lamb crop today at 31,867,000 head, compared with last year's record crop of 32,167,000 head.

The crop was said to be about 8 per cent larger than the average annual production for the 1935-37 period. The decrease from last year was attributed to a smaller crop in western sheep states, particularly in Texas.

Production in the west was estimated at 20,730,000 head compared with 21,161,000 in 1938 production in the so-called "native" or eastern states was estimated at 11,037,000 head compared with 10,936,000 last year.

The estimated production in major sheep states, last year and this, respectively, included: Idaho 1,621,000 and 1,580,000; Utah 1,570,000 and 1,673,000; Washington 573,000 and 579,000; Oregon 1,550,000 and 1,522,000; California 2,489,000 and 2,630,000.

BETHLEHEM STEEL DECLARES DIVIDEND

NEW YORK, July 27 (AP)—Directors of Bethlehem Steel Corp. today declared a dividend of 50 cents a share on the common stock, the first payment on the equity issue since 1937, when a total of \$5 a share was disbursed on the common.

The last payment in 1937 was \$1 a share, which went to stockholders on December 24. Net profit for the June quarter this year was \$3,822,927, compared with \$150,305 in the June quarter of 1938 and \$2,409,059 in the March quarter of 1939.
