HEAT BENEFITS CROP OUTLOOK, AGENT REPORTS

Hot weather of the past few days has been in general beneficial to Klamath crops, bringing them along in good shape, County Agent Charles A. Henderson said Friday.

The potato vines wilt at the middle of the day but "snap out of it" nicely in the late afternoon, Henderson said. Evaporation is high and farmers are pouring great volumes of water on their crops to keep them coming along.

Henderson has been in many fields the past few days with G. R. Hyslop of Oregon State college, who is making his first field inspection for certified seed.

The checks indicate that the potato crop is running about normal as to stand. In the hot two weeks the potatoes have caught up rapidly on the growth schedule, and now are not more than a week behind.

Certified seed inspections will cover about 1500 acres of crops, about half being potatoes and the remainder small seeds and grains. Sixty-seven growers asked for seed certification this year, a new high record.

Late in August Hyslop will make another inspection here.

'Kid Mouthpiece' Protected From Gang Vengeance

NEW YORK, July 28 (AP)—J. Richard (Dixie) Davis, one-time "Kid Mouthpiece" for the Dutch Schultz policy racket, was a "free" man today—guarded carefully in an undisclosed hide-out against gangland's vengeance for informers.

Accompanied by four detectives who will go wherever he goes, Davis hustled from the Bronx county jail shortly after 1 a. m. and into a waiting automobile which carried him swiftly away, perhaps to an early rendezvous with his red-haired sweetheart, Hope Dare, Broadway show beauty whom he plans to marry.

Davis, his one year sentence for his part in the racket conspiracy pared by 170 days spent in the tombs while he waited his turn to testify against his mates, and by 69 days off for good behavior, must return Monday to Manhattan as a federal grand jury witness. He carried a government subpoena when he left the jail.

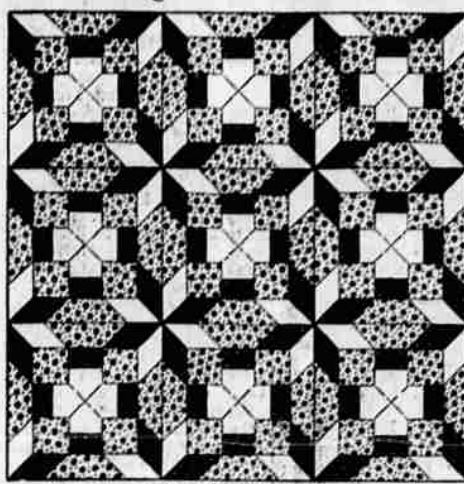

CAR SHOVS BUS OFF HIGHWAY 99

WEED—Thirty-two passengers were endangered Sunday morning when a southbound bus was struck by an automobile and forced 15 feet off the road into an irrigation ditch six miles north of here on Highway 99.

The bus belongs to the Pacific Greyhound but was in the service of the Dollar Lines. It was driven by John Vincent Vaughn of Salinas.

Vaughn stated he observed the headlights of a car across the white line and on the wrong side of the road. He declared he drove the bus off the pavement in an attempt to avoid a collision, but in spite of this the car struck the bus and shoved it into the ditch.

The auto was driven by Tong Louie, 24, Chinese merchant from Vancouver, B. C. With him were his brother John Louie, 17, and Dan Chang, 28, also of Vancouver. No one was injured.

Captain George Daley of the California state highway patrol arrested Louie for reckless driving. He was taken before J. P.

Bradley and fined \$50 or sentenced to 20 days in jail. Louie was unable to pay the fine.

Scouts Evacuate Blue River Camp As Fire Spreads

EUGENE, July 27 (AP)—At 12:30 today Eugene's official weather reading was only 88 degrees, compared with the 99 mark for the same time yesterday. Smoke from the Blue river forest fire, described as not quite under control but not dangerous, cast a pall over the city. The blaze had covered about 400 acres.

Twenty Boy Scouts, encamped at Camp Lucky Boy on Blue river, were evacuated and brought to Eugene last night after the flames had blocked them in the camp by burning snags which fell across the road. Ninety other scouts, away from the camp when the fire was discovered, will be brought to Eugene as soon as they return from various overnight hikes in the mountain region. The third period at Camp Lucky Boy has been postponed from Sunday until August 5, H. B. Salles, director, said today.

EXTENSION TO BE BUILT BY UTILITY

ALTURAS, July 28—E. G. Keefe, manager of the Surprise Valley Electrification corporation just returned from a conference with REA officials. Keefe states that the new extension for which \$122,000 was appropriated some time ago, will be built by force account.

The SVE corporation is receiving bids on all materials to be used in the construction of the 60 miles of territory which the new line will cover and are to be opened on August 10.

The new line will add approximately 123 consumers to the 555 which are now being served. Construction is expected to start by August 15.
