

Records Show Dr. McLoughlin Was Not Friend of Pioneers

SALEM, July 28 (UP)—Records of the Hudson's Bay company in the early days of Oregon, soon to be published, will show that Dr. John McLoughlin, factor at Fort Vancouver, was not the altruistic friend of pioneers that history has shown him. In the opinion of Dr. Hurl Brown Barker, vice president of University of Oregon.

The Hudson's Bay company is now preparing a book on its early records, now in the London offices of the company.

Dr. Barker, after examining those records, told the Salem Rotary club that history books have fixed Dr. McLoughlin's salary at \$12,000 a year and state he gave most of that to pioneers. The fact, Dr. Barker said, is that he got no salary, was paid on the basis of share-the-profit, an old company system.

Most of the early history of the state was written from word-of-mouth traditions, and is highly

inaccurate, Dr. Barker said. He states that much of the history will have to be rewritten when the company's reports are printed.

The factors and traders of the company were compelled to keep a day-to-day account of their affairs, and these old records will shed new light on early Oregon history, Dr. Barker believes.

Records of the Northwest company, rival of the Hudson's Bay company, have not been found. Later information compiled by Jason Lee, and information relative to the Applegate train is known.

Dr. Barker believes that by piecing the known records with the accounts of the company when they are published an accurate chronological history of the northwest can be written.

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Alcoholic Drinks Should Be Accompanied By Food

BERKELEY, Cal., July 28 (UP)—he drinking of alcoholic beverages always should be accompanied by eating, Norman Jolliffe of Bellevue hospital, New York, warned in a speech to the sixth Pacific Science congress here yesterday.

Drinkers, who do not eat as they consume alcoholic beverages, are "subject to the so-called alcoholic diseases," Jolliffe said, while those who eat well "seldom develop these symptoms."

"The factors furnished by alcohol that increase the presence of nutritional deficiency diseases are its direct action of the gastric mucosa, the substitution of alcohol for food, and the increased vitamin requirements in consequence of the calories contained in alcohol."

A study based on the reaction of dogs, monkeys, rabbits and rats showed excessive use of alcohol "greatly accelerated the accumulation of fat in the liver and resulted in some fatty degeneration and cirrhosis," a paper presented by C. L. Connor, I. L. Chalkoff and L. L. Ginston, of the University of California, said.

Herman Worts, New York City, said studies which he conducted seemed "to justify the assumption there is a large nutritional factor in the production of nervous and mental changes in chronic alcoholics."

These American philanthropists are "serving to bring America and England even closer together," Sir William added.
