**INTEREST ON FHA LOANS REDUCED**  
WASHINGTON, July 31 (AP)—Families planning to borrow money for new homes on government-insured mortgages will get a lower interest rate beginning tomorrow.

Officials announced last night the maximum rate on FHA-insured mortgages for small homes would be cut from 5 per cent to 4 1/2 per cent, and the maximum rate on large-scale rental projects would be reduced from 4 1/2 to 4 per cent. It does not apply to mortgages already insured.

Steward McDonald, the housing administrator, said the new rates would extend to the public "the benefits of generally lower interest rates now prevailing in the money market."

## POTATO CAMPS TO REQUIRE INSPECTION

Persons anticipating the construction of camps for the potato harvest in Klamath county this fall must make application to the Klamath county health office prior to their occupancy so that inspection may be made, it was announced by W. J. Cloyes, recently appointed Klamath county sanitarian.

Inspection of labor, industrial and tourist camps is now underway by the county sanitarian. "It is evident that persons in Klamath county are unaware of state law concerning the establishment of such camps, either temporary or for permanent quarters," Cloyes stated Monday. "First it is necessary to obtain permission to establish such camps. The person in authority in such camps should make application so that an inspection of the site may be made by the sanitarian. Applications should include the name of the owner or manager, location of the camp site, water source, sewage facilities, number of accommodations and for what purpose the camp is to be erected or maintained."

Cloyes further stated that managers of camps are to be held responsible for the condition of camps.

## Among the New Books

**GUNS OF BURGOYNE**, by Bruce Lancaster—This is the story of Burgoyne's expedition and defeat at Saratoga told from the point of view of a young Hessian officer in the English army. Mr. Lancaster has given us a first class story from the American point of view. It is part and parcel of the narrative. This is the sort of book we need in large quantities. It is exciting adventure, presenting believable people, made of flesh and blood, whose behavior is neither idealized nor vulgarized. It is particularly a man's book—mightily robust in language and concerned with men's affairs, though at least one of its few women characters is memorable for charm. It is a long story, but there is a fresh vividness to the telling that carries the reader steadily along.

**THESE ARE REAL PEOPLE**, by Rosita Forbes—This book gives true stories of real people, most of them men, whom the author has met in her years of travel in distant lands. Some of the stories are of that type of the idealist in Sumatra who committed murder because he hated all things ugly; the story

of the convict who escaped from Devil's Island; the Northampton bookmaker whose love story began in Ecuador and ended in central Asia. Rosita Forbes sees things that travelers cannot see easily and are not expected to see at all. She has an intense and imaginative curiosity about her fellow humans, makes friends with them everywhere, shares the most appalling living conditions with a gay heart. And she writes of all this with cleverness and a vibrant personal quality of vividness and wit. By and large, this collection of far-flung adventures is exceedingly interesting.

**TRYST**, by Elswyth Thane (Hebee)—In an English country house a young girl enters a room, supposedly not to be used by the tenants. Little by little she learns what she can of the young man whose room it had been. In India, a British secret service officer, dying in the desert, prays for England rather than heaven. A ghost haunts the house in England, and girl and ghost fall in love, and are eventually united.

The author tells this love story with delicacy and humor. No feeling of horror or the macabre creeps in; and the solution is exactly what you might expect in an affair between a girl who reads too much and has to learn about her lover through his books and collection of butterflies, and a ghost-lover who is having trouble with the "indefinable between-worlds" etiquette. This new novel is up-to-date fantasy, exquisitely done, a narrative filled with humor and sympathy, and its unpretentious character puts no strain on the reader's credulity.

**ADMIRAL DEATH**, by Hanson Baldwin—Among these 12 true stories of men's adventures with the sea are the Titanic disaster, the torpedoing of the Lusitania, the sinking of the Jeannette in the Arctic, the wreck of the frigate Medusa, and the mutiny on the brig Somers. Baldwin has a staccato way of writing
