LIGHTS IMPROVED FOR ASHLAND SHOW

ASHLAND, Ore., Aug. 1.—Robert Stedman, technical director of the Oregon Shakespearean Festival, stated today that the plays this year will be better lighted than ever before.

Stedman said that over sixteen thousand watts are used in the lighting equipment. About ten new lights have been installed. The additional lights, he declared, while not large in number, give the added touch necessary for the festival. In all, 40 different lights are used in the plays offering innumerable combinations.

The scene in the forest of Arden is perhaps the best lighted section of any play, he said. The lights there give an illusion of a forest in a suggestive manner without artificial trees.

Stedman is one of the five members of the festival group who have been present for each season of the plays. He is a teacher of drama in Henley, Klamath county, schools. His training in lighting was gained at OSC, Southern Oregon College of Education and practical experience in many theatrical productions.

Assisting Stedman are Delmar Solem, stage manager, Mark Seely and Mabel Wittrock, switchboard operator.

PERSONAL INJURY TRIAL UNDER WAY

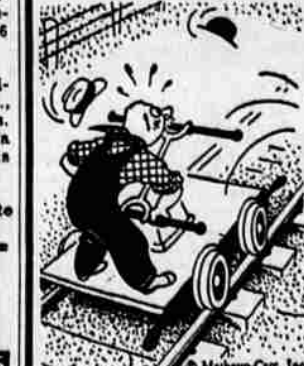
A jury trial of a personal injury case growing out of an automobile accident started in Circuit Judge Edward B. Ashurst's court Tuesday morning.

CUTOVER LAND RELIEF PLANS TO BE STUDIED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1 (P)—President Roosevelt submitted to congress yesterday a recommendation of the national resources committee for a long range program to rehabilitate residents of the cutover timber areas of northern Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota.

The committee suggested long time capital loans to settlers on land suited for agriculture, relocation of other residents, elimination of "uneconomic" units of government, development of co-operative marketing and a large scale public works program for forest reclamation.

The recommendations, covering 57,000,000 acres in 35 counties, were based on studies begun more than a year ago through regional committees.

In submitting the report, Mr. Roosevelt said "exploitation of our resources has created many problems, but none more pressing than in those areas of the United States where a basic resource has been mismanaged and the principal industry has moved or waned, leaving the working population stranded."

"The cutover region in the northern part of the states of Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin was once the scene of a flourishing lumber industry," he continued. "Today a large section of the population in that area depends for its very existence on public aids, work relief, and security payments. The large expenditures for these purposes in the area have enabled these people to survive, but could not provide a satisfactory permanent solution to their problem."

Mr. Roosevelt added members of congress from the cutover region had appealed some time ago for assistance in "developing a program to assist the people in that area to find a way of life that would provide opportunity and reasonable security." The

problem, he continued, "is now to make the best use of the natural and human resources of the area."

In recommending elimination of "uneconomic" units of government, the committee suggested that the counties should take over the towns' roads and should be made responsible for health and welfare activities. It also recommended that school and assessment districts be enlarged.

Some of the interesting points of the demonstration are the use of the tin can sealer, which is becoming increasingly popular, and the use of the pressure cooker. Everyone is invited to attend the demonstration, and is asked to bring a sack lunch of a cup. The meeting will be held from 10 a. m. to 3 p. m. and will be under the direction of Mrs. E. E. Kirkpatrick of Merrill.

A number of canning publications are available at Mrs. Gillen's office, in the federal building, among them are the following: Home Food Preservation, EX 479; Home Canning, FB 1762; Pickles and Relishes, HE 750; Fruit Jellies, preserves, jams, marmalades, conserves, and butters, HE 498; and Jellies, FB 1800. At forty our grandmothers were usually prematurely old and worn.

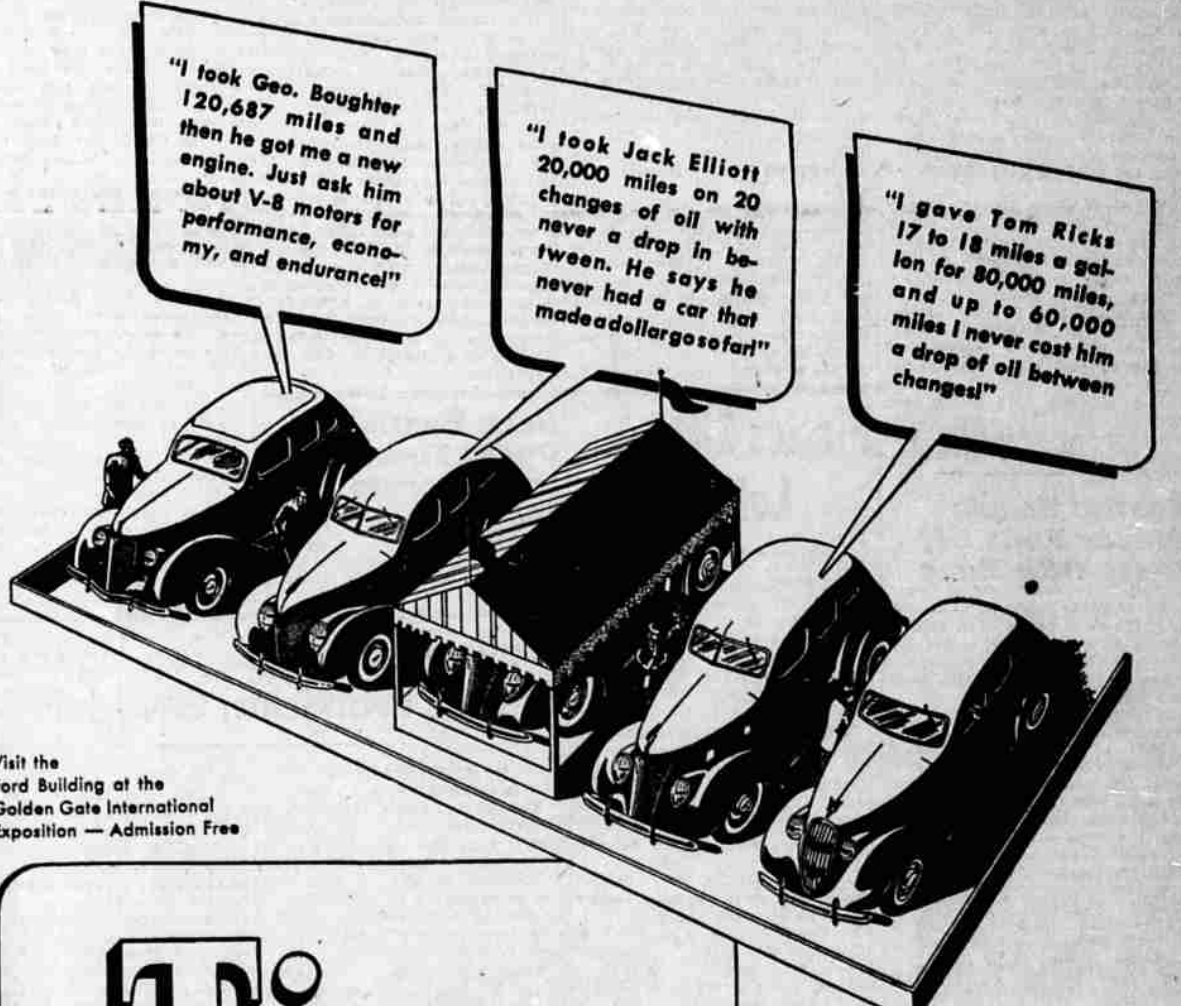
