HOME MORTGAGES OVER 24 MILLION

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3 (AP)—Home mortgages on city and town property financed by all types of lenders the first six months of 1939 amounted to \$24,695,000 in Washington and \$12,810,000 in Oregon, the Federal Home Loan bank board reported today.

By types of lender, recordings were: saving and loan associations—\$4,187 loans amounting to \$5,337,000 in Washington, 1,733 loans amounting to \$3,775,000 in Oregon; insurance companies—\$45 loans amounting to \$291,000 in Washington, 307 loans amounting to \$1,229,000 in Oregon; banks and trust companies—\$120 loans amounting to \$6,753,000 in Washington, 345 loans amounting to \$2,502,000 in Oregon; mutual savings banks—588 loans amounting to \$1,720,000 in Washington, 64 loans amounting to \$196,000 in Oregon; individuals—\$1,826 loans amounting to \$2,611,000 in Washington, 1,912 loans amounting to \$2,693,000 in Oregon; others—1078 loans amounting to \$2,983,000 in Washington, 755 loans amounting to \$2,415,000 in Oregon.

New dwelling units constructed or projected in Washington cities of 10,000 population or over in the first six months numbered 1,640 and were valued at \$5,276,400; in Oregon, 831 dwelling units, valued at \$3,002,800.

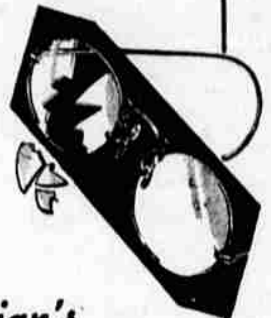
