ed from the California checking station with Williams' Oriental rug, prepared to press burglary charges against Barkley.

Barkley, 33, is a blond with a long record. In 1923 he was sent to McNeil's island for assault with a dangerous weapon. In 1925 he went back for violation of the Dyer act, and in 1933 he did a hitch at the Oregon state penitentiary for assault and robbery while armed with a dangerous weapon.

If he is convicted of another felony, a habitual criminal charge may be pressed against him, with life imprisonment the result.

Shortly after the robbery of the Pelican grill, a complaint was filed in state court against a white man, charging burglary not in a dwelling in connection with the case. Authorities did not indicate what they intended to do about that charge. The white man was not found for arrest in the case.

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steeply of the First Methodist church. A bucket brigade saved the rest of the church, the parsonage and a nearby warehouse containing about \$100,000 worth of rice grass seed. Two firemen were overcome but not seriously affected.

Louis Grell, Tangent, was credited with saving the Sharpe mercantile store across the street, by carrying hose to the roof. Several times he extinguished fire from a nearby tree and played his hose on sparks that landed on the roof.

When the heat grew too intense, he turned the water on himself. An unidentified CCC enrollee saved the municipal water tank—and possibly the entire town—when he climbed a rickety ladder with wet sacks to a cornice of the tank where hoses couldn't reach, and beat out the fire.
