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BILLY ARNOLD DIES AT PLAY SUNDAY NOON

minutes they had the pulmotor at the lake. Efforts continued for two hours to resuscitate the Arnold boy. An ambulance had been called, and finally when all hope had been abandoned his body was brought to Klamath Falls. The grief-stricken father followed in a car with C. D. Moore, with whom Arnold and his son had gone to the lake.

Dr. Adler, given an account of the incident, referred it to District Attorney Herditt Blackmer. Blackmer said that he was obtaining statements from witnesses. No inquest, he said, will be held, but if it is felt advisable information may be presented to the grand jury to clear up any misunderstandings.

Dr. Adler said that a wound on the top of the Arnold youth's head is of the type that it was not sufficient, however, to cause death, and he believes the youth drowned after being struck and going under. Condition of the body indicates drowning, he said.

Abrasions on the boy's face may have been caused from friction with the dock during the resuscitation efforts, Dr. Adler stated.

Members of the boy's family and those at the lake at the time of the incident said that much credit is due the boys who brought the body to shore, those who worked on it, and Miller and Yost.

It was said the boys who had been playing with the rocks were badly broken up over the incident. They said they did not actually see a rock strike Billy.

Young Arnold was an active Boy Scout, but was not under scout supervision at the time of the accident. His father is with the sales department of Lorenz company. The Arnolds have a small son, Dickie.

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Byrd Chuckles Over Letters Of Application for Venture

BOSTON, Aug. 5 (AP)—Chuckling as he reads, Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd is busy these days perusing the applications of hundreds of young Americans who want to go with him on his next trip to the Antarctic, the expedition for which he is preparing. "Please, Admiral, take me with you—I am not afraid of the cold, never wear winter underwear and sleep with both windows open," is a fair sample of the type of pleading messages the expedition's leader is receiving. "You won't find me a hindrance," says another. "But unfortunately I was born a girl. Don't let this prejudice you, dear Admiral."

BOARD TO DRAFT RETIREMENT PLAN

SALEM, Aug. 7 (AP)—A statewide retirement plan for Oregon's state, county and city employees will be drafted by a special committee to be appointed by Gov. Charles A. Sprague, the governor said today.

The plan, to be submitted to the 1941 legislature, would provide retirement pensions for 8000 state employees, and also would be an enabling act to permit counties and cities to do the same for their employees.

It might be the first step toward the establishment of a civil service system for governmental employees in Oregon.

The governor said that employees of state, county and city governments should receive the same pension benefits as private employees now receive under the federal social security program. Public employees are barred from benefits under the federal system.

When the governor vetoed the firemen's pension bill passed by the 1939 legislature, he promised to sponsor a plan to provide pensions for all public employees, assuring that a pension for firemen was not a solution of the problem.

FILMING STARTS EAST OF EUGENE

EUGENE, Aug. 7 (AP)—Filming of the play "Abe Lincoln in Illinois" began this morning on the McKenzie river a few miles east of here.

Although only 70 were needed, nearly 3000 Eugene residents sought extra parts. Raymond Massey, Broadway actor, will handle the Lincoln role he portrayed on the stage.

Massey followed cameramen, directors and other executives here yesterday. Mary Howard, who will play the part of Ann Rutledge, Lincoln's sweetheart, Minor Watson, Trevor Bardette, Sid Taylor, Harlan Briggs, Lewis Haydt, Aldrich Bowser, Herbert Rudely, Howard De-Silva and Maurice Murphy arrived today at the New Salem, Ill., set.

Early morning found Cameramen James Wornoff Howe, famed Chinese photographer, shooting scenes in the green Oregon setting for the next 17 days.

THIRD TERM TREND SEEN BY REPUBLICAN

SALEM, Aug. 7 (AP)—A belief that President Roosevelt "is maneuvering in the direction of a third term" was expressed today by Franklin W. Wadsworth of Washington, D. C., publicity director for the Republican national committee, but he added that "Roosevelt would be the easiest man for the republicans to beat."

Wadsworth, who met Oregon republicans here today on a tour of the west, said "The third term issue would be worth several million votes to the republicans. There are a lot of democrats who like Roosevelt, but who wouldn't vote for him because they oppose a third term for any man."

He said he believes Senator McNary, Oregon's senior senator and senior minority leader, is "One of the geniuses of the republican party. He has a grand personality, and he deserves a lot of credit for the splendid position the republican party is in today."

McNary is sagacious and tenacious, and the way he handled the small group of 23 republican senators during the popular days of the new deal was marvelous.

The "congressional revolt" against President Roosevelt might change the president's mind about seeking a third term, Wadsworth said, asserting the "defeat of his leading bill is an indication that sentiment all over the country is turning against the new deal."
