TULELAKE HIGH TO OPEN ON AUGUST 28

TULELAKE—August 25 has been set as the date for the opening of the Tulalake high school for the 1939-40 term. It was announced Friday by George Reiben, principal of the high school. Attendance this year will be increased from last year's daily average of 155 to 165 or 170 and the faculty will be increased by one instructor, Lloyd P. Darley, Bray, California.

Mr. Darley, who took his higher education at Oregon State college and the University of California will teach shop, mechanical

drawing, geometry and will assist Coach Don Smith in basketball and baseball. The faculty successor to Miss Elizabeth Trueb, who will teach this year at Dunsmuir has not as yet been announced. Personnel of the remainder of the faculty is the same as last year.

A slight change in class arrangement is being taken under advisement. Reiben stated, with three long periods of one hour each to be offered in the morning and four forty-five minute class periods during the afternoon sessions.

In preparation for the opening date, the building has received two coats of new paint in a creamy yellow and the shop, in the near future will be doubled in size to accommodate the increased demand of students for placements in agriculture and handicraft classes.

A teachers meeting will be held August 26. No announcement has

as yet been made as to the date of the opening of the Tulalake elementary school by Jerome Keefe, principal.

Winema school on the west side will open September 4, with the faculty to include G. M. Burt, principal, Miss Evelyn Corliss, who taught here last year and Mrs. Helen Lind, Isleton, California. The school building has had interior and exterior coats of paint during the summer months. Attendance is expected to be the same as last year.
