LOOT SOUGHT ALONG TRAIL

DILLON, Mont., Aug. 8 (UP)—Road agents' gold was sought today following discovery of a long abandoned bandit trail across Fryman Pan basin where Henry Plummer, king of early day Montana badmen, was supposed to have buried thousands in loot.

The road, almost overgrown, was the outlaw route from the bustling frontier settlements of Bannack and Virginia city, now ghost towns.

Since vigilantes hanged the killer in 1884, the story has persisted that he and his gang, murderers of 100 men, had buried stolen nuggets and gold dust along the trail, but the trail could not be found. With its discovery, parties of Dillon residents were "prospecting" the road where the one time sheriff and his gang raced so often with laden saddle bags—and returned with them empty.

STOCKS LOSE EARLY GAINS LATE IN DAY

NEW YORK, Aug. 8 (AP)—An unconvincing early rally failed to follow through in today's stock market and initial gains running to a point or so were chopped down to inconsequential fractions in many cases or changed to declines at the close.

Transfers for the full session were around 450,000 shares, one of the smallest turnovers in about a month.

The generally cheerful business outlook, brokers said, remained as the principal selling deterrent and the day's erratic price shifts were believed due to so-called "professional" in-and-outers. While the public apparently shunned the buying side, some encouragement was derived from the fact liquidation in this quarter was virtually nil.

Technicians again held to the idea reactionary tendencies of recent sessions were a further normal "correction" of the broad upturn in July.

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NET SPREAD FOR PAIR IN ROBBERY

MEDFORD, Aug. 8 (AP)—Search was underway throughout southern Oregon Tuesday for Eddie Smith, 30, and James Hagler, 28, described by the sheriff's office as former inmates of the state prison at Salem, wanted for alleged grand larceny and the theft of an auto belonging to L. C. Brandon, Medford. Warrants have been issued for the arrest of the pair.

Hagler and Smith were employed as cooks by Marshall Beeson's establishment. Smith went to sonnette, operator of two local work Monday afternoon.

Early Tuesday morning, after the close of business the music box was robbed of \$40 at "The Shack," a downtown resort. Later at the "Pine Cone," on the northern city limits, two men locked Alfred Totty in the ice box. Totty after being held a prisoner for nearly two hours. Managed to kick out a small door, and emerge in a badly chilled condition.

Totty, according to sheriff's office, entered the ice box when
