REPORT SHOWS
TIMBER STAND
FOR 2 STATES

Results of a study to determine the character of the sawtimber stands of the ponderosa pine region of eastern Oregon and eastern Washington are given in a report, "Volume Distribution in Saw-Timber Types in the Ponderosa Pine Region", recently released by Stephen N. Wyckoff, director of the Pacific Northwest forest experiment station.

In the study data obtained in the regional forest survey, conducted by the station as part of the nation-wide survey of forest resources, were analyzed to determine the average volume per acre of the various saw-types by geographic unit, the distribution of the volume by diameter class, and the volume in residual stands on selectively cut-over areas. The analysis shows that the pine stands in eastern Oregon average 10.2 thousand board feet per acre compared to 6.8 thousand board feet in eastern Washington. Also pine timber in eastern Oregon averages larger in diameter than that in eastern Washington. In the region as a whole 50 per cent of the pine saw-timber volume is in trees more than 25 inches in diameter.

It is believed that information resulting from the study will be of value in formulating plans for management of the region's forest resources.

POTENT ISSUE
OF DEBT LEFT
BY LAWMAKERS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8 (UP)—The 76th congress ended its first session leaving a dynamite laden issue to be settled in 1940—the problem of raising the national debt limitation above \$45,000,000,000.

Before leaving, congress set a new record in peace time spending appropriating approximately \$9,732,622,633 in regular funds in addition to permanent appropriations of \$3,624,812,065.

Despite the economy drive congress exceeded President Roosevelt's budget by more than \$300,000,000.

This spending has brought estimates of a \$4,000,000,000 deficit at the end of the fiscal year next June 30, and will push the national debt up to the \$45,000,000,000 deadline set by the liberty loan act of 1919. On August 2 the gross public debt was \$40,652,600,215.36.

Congress then will be faced with three alternatives, drastic reduction of expenditures, a drastic increase in taxes to put the nation on a "pay-as-we-go" basis or increasing the debt limitation.
