HEAT SPELL AT MEDFORD SETS RECORD

MEDFORD, Aug. 11 (AP)—The current hot spell is the longest on record for the Medford area of the Rogue river valley, the weather bureau, whose records go back 28 years reported Friday. No relief is in sight.

The heat wave began July 21, with a maximum temperature of 102 degrees, and completed its twenty-first day Thursday with a high of 100 degrees. Ordinarily hot spells last nine or ten days, at the most, the weather records reveal.

For the three weeks period, the heat averaged 100.2 degrees daily. The mercury dropped below 100 degrees, on five of the 21 days. The lowest reading was 90 degrees on July 31, and the highest on July 26 with 105 degrees. The time high was 110 degrees on July 16, 1911, the year the weather bureau was established.

No damage to crops or fruit has resulted from the heat, the county agent said.

Smoke from upstate forest fires has shrouded the nearby hills all this week. No fires are reported burning in this section.

FIRM INTERESTED IN POTATO MILL

A letter recently received at the county agent's office from John Rust, general manager of the Potato Products company of Shafter, Calif., indicates that that company is particularly interested in the establishment of a potato dehydrating plant in the Klamath basin this fall.

Rust writes that he is now making a sales trip into northern California and southern Oregon to determine the possibility of selling Klamath potato meal, as the outlet for this product is just as important as the securing of the necessary raw material.

Such a plant, if established, would be of benefit in disposing of cul potatoes and might, in years of over-production, take care of some of the undergrades as well.

In response to the request of C. A. Henderson, chairman of the Klamath midge control committee, Dean Schoenfeld, director of the Oregon experiment station, has agreed to continue midge control work for the month of August with experiment station funds for investigational work in entomology.

Klamath county, Klamath Falls, and the chamber of commerce budgeted \$500 for three months' work starting May 1 of this year. Survey work was started here by Stanley Jewett at that date, and was continued later in the season by Don Bonnell, assistant entomologist of the experiment station of the Oregon State college.

The additional cooperation of the experiment station will permit carrying out survey work until early in September.

The midge control committee, appointed by county and city, consists of C. A. Henderson, chairman, Mayor Clifton Richmond, Commissioner W. F. B. Chase, G. Krause and Earl Reynolds. The committee will meet in the near future to discuss progress made to date in the work now being carried on into the third month.

COPCO BEGINS NEW PROJECTS AT SEED MILLS

Erection of three new seed mills in the vicinity of Klamath Falls has created new power projects for the California Oregon Power company. It was made known Friday at the Klamath Copco offices.

Installation of a three-phase power circuit to replace the single phase circuit at Hatfield was made necessary by the erection of a mill there by Louie Drager, who for the past five years has operated a seed mill for Haskins brothers. The load for Copco consists of motors totalling 13 horsepower, for which two miles of the new three-phase circuit must be installed.

On the Great Northern siding west of Henley, motors of nine horsepower are to be installed for another seed mill operated by Harold Dixon and B. E. Whitlatch. The single phase line at the vicinity must be converted to a three-phase circuit and a bank of transformers must be installed.

A third new seed mill, located at the Geary brothers place on the Rock Creek road, calls for installation of larger transformers to handle motors of 12 horsepower. The mill is expected to operate under a heavier schedule than previously.

Copco officials said that installation of the three projects should be completed by Aug. 15.

STOLEN CAR FOUND IN CHEMULT BRUSH

Sheriff Lloyd Low reported Friday that a Plymouth sedan, located in the brush near Chemult, is shown on a Portland police bulletin as a stolen car.

The sheriff had the car towed to a garage at Chemult and is endeavoring to locate the owner.

The car bore an Oregon license registered to G. M. Calkins of Banks, Ore. Officers here believe the license plates were stolen from another car.

HOP-PICKERS FOR ROGUE AREA SOUGHT

The Klamath Falls office of the Oregon employment service has received a call for 300 hop-pickers in the Rogue river area.

Picking will start Monday, August 14, with the best crop in history ready to be harvested.

Families are preferred and good camping facilities are provided, with wood and water furnished. The pay is 14 cents a pound, with 20 to 30 days of picking assured.
