

GAME OFFICES ONLY TO SELL TAGS FOR DOE

Tags for shooting antlerless deer in the Klamath-Lake counties area will be obtainable only at the state game commission offices, according to a letter received by the Klamath county clerk Wednesday.

Five hundred doe tags are to be issued, according to a decision of the commission. Receipt of the letter at the clerk's office indicated that probably the ruling will stand, despite opposition that has developed in this area.

Many petitions opposing the ruling are out and are being widely signed. Ray Tatlow of Klamath Falls is understood to have taken a petition to Lake county, obtaining 100 names or more in a short time.

Although the Klamath-Lake tags are not available here, special permits for doe shooting in Grant county were received at the clerk's office.

WELL KNOWN MEN IN ROUNDUP LIST

LAKEVIEW, Ore., Aug. 16.—Three names well known to followers of the Lakeview Roundup for the past 20 years make up the list of judges for this year's show. Boss Richardson, Merle Jacobs and William Hotchkiss will make the final decisions on all arena questions from the sounding of the first gun Saturday, September 2.

All three of the men are widely known in Klamath county too, but especially Richardson, who had the honor of being the father of Queen Lorraine of this year's Klamath show. Lake county claims a big interest in the Richardson family as the gracious Mrs. Richardson was a member of a well known Paisley family. Though still a young man Boss has created a legend in Lakeview Roundup history. Down through the years from the time he was one of the youngest riders in the arena, Boss won the wild acclaim of local crowds through his daring rides and spectacular showmanship, and going from here to win some of the highest honors in the cowboy world. It might be said that no one rider has held his popularity year after year as Boss has. Even now his appearance in the arena will bring a wild cheer from the crowds.

The Lakeview arena would seem an unfamiliar spot without the picture of Merle Jacobs resting his elbow on the saddle horn and solemnly contemplating everything in general. Merle is an exacting judge and gets a lot done but his hearty laugh and quick wit make him a friend of local and outside riders.

The many hours of valuable time given by Bill Hotchkiss to the Roundup association since its beginning could never be accounted for. Not only has Bill given his own time, but he has supplied horses at the show for many years and the help of his men on the ranch. Bill's home is a boon to the weary directors when the last lap is reached in the show and many a pleasant hour is spent talking it over and relaxing when another annual mark is reached.

Another man who deserves much credit for his hearty cooperation in the local show is Senator Harold "Butch" Powers of Cedarville. Through this cooperation the directors were able to secure the services of the Standard Oil announcing car for this year. "Butch" is probably one of the most popular stockmen in this section of the country.

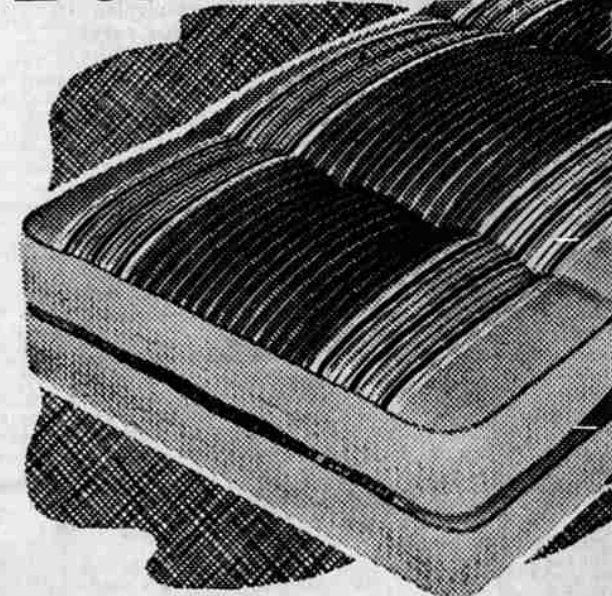
