There is great need for such a work, and it comes none too soon. Many pioneers have already passed on, carrying with them information of early-day events that should be placed on permanent record.

Unless something is done now, much of this unwritten history will be lost for good. Mrs. Good and her assistants do not intend to permit that to happen.

She has asked for, and certainly deserves, cooperation in her efforts. Many persons possess pictures, documents, newspaper clippings and other material which will be useful in compiling this history.

Mrs. Good has asked that these be placed at her disposal. There should be hearty response to this request.

For a number of years there has been talk of a pioneer museum in which relics of the earlier days of the county's history could be placed for exhibit and safe-keeping. Not much has been accomplished as yet along that line.

Klamath county has a most colorful history. Too many people who live here now know little about it. It makes living in this area more interesting and pleasant if one knows the historical significance of its various localities. One's imagination is pleasantly stirred if one knows that in this spot a treaty was signed, or over there an important council held, or yonder a battle fought.

The Daughters of the American Revolution have done much to make this possible through the placement of historic markers. An authentic volume of history such as is now proposed will carry on the work of preserving Klamath's glamorous past for the pleasure and information of those who live here and will live here in the future.

NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS

(Mr. Mallon is taking a vacation from news by writing purely personal news behind the news for a two weeks period.)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18 — The "confessions of a Washington columnist" would not be good material for true detective mysteries. They would fit more comfortably into the Princeton quarterly review.

I have read letters and articles for the past few years depicting the news behind the news writer here as a purveyor of falsehoods, propagandists, maligner of character, cave-dropper, wiretapper and practically everything except what he is supposed to be—a reporter.

The misconceptions have increased since one minor politician denounced as a 100 per cent all-time prevaricator the newswriters who failed to represent his partisan viewpoint.

These following are my ideas of it. They are purely personal, and should not be taken as reflecting the views of any other column living or dead.

NO KEYHOLES
Keyhole journalism does not exist here. It never did, never will. If anyone had a mind to try it he would not succeed. The keyholes are too well guarded—by secret service men, capitol police, departmental guards. I have never known of an important transom being left open at any critical moment.

Nor is eavesdropping considered any better form of news elsewhere. There is a sort of unwritten law against it, stronger than any statute. The 500 men who make up the Washington news corps adopted it silently not because they are magnanimous, but because they are wise enough to know good news that will stand up does not come from overhead conversations. The average Washington official conversation outside the White House is just not worth overhearing.

If there are dictaphones here, they are not in the hands of the press. If any telephone wires are being tapped, the tappers are within officialdom. No one outside has facilities which exist in several government departments for such work.

NO FUDGING
Contrarily there are daily instances in which the press protects officials from inadvertent disclosures of government secrets. I know many cases where reporters have seen letters left lying around on government desks and overheard telephone conversations conducted in their presence by government officials during interviews. It is not customary for reporters to take advantage of information so gained. It might mean the loss of a job to the incautious official. It would certainly mean the loss of a news source to a reporter, and news sources are the bread and butter by which newsmen live—and the people of a democracy learn what is going on.

An understanding of mutual confidence exists between source and reporter which must be maintained if fair news is to be sustained on a continuous basis to the people. It is never violated by statesmen or newsmen, only rarely by politicians.

PROS AND CONS

News behind the news comes here from the conflict that is politics, and it comes under unwritten ethical laws. No man here "knows all the answers." No one here can find them out, but if a reporter will apply himself to developing as many as he can, he will find the better political system encouraging to his efforts of a democracy learn what is going on.

There are always people here on either side of every question willing to talk straight if they are not quoted. You have republicans and democrats, conservatives and liberals, government press agents

The Family Doctor

THERE is plenty of evidence that every animal species is calculated to live a certain length of time. The experts call this the "biologic life cycle." Prof. A. J. Carlson, distinguished physiologist, says there is also evidence that this hereditary time-clock of the peak of living varies considerably in the different organs of our bodies.

Since all organs are more or less necessary for life, the weakest organ becomes the weakest link in the chain of life, and thus determines how long the individual will live. Even if all of us had a perfect diet, ideal conditions for living and work, and were able to avoid infectious disease and accidents, we would still grow old and die.

From time to time various scientists have declared that the glands are the important structure for determining the length of life; still others will say that it is the heart or the nervous system.

Prof. A. J. Carlson also says

that probably the sex glands, on which most of the attention has been focused relative to increasing the length of life and rejuvenating the elderly, are one of the least important tissues concerned in the life span.

Most important perhaps would be the heart and the circulation. In the majority of people who live beyond 60 or 70, the heart and circulation have already begun to fail. No one knows how much of this failure of the heart is due to old age and the wearing out of the machine, and how much of it is due to infectious diseases, to wrong diet, to overwork and overstrain.

We do know, however, that all of these facts are important in relationship to the ability of the heart to carry on its work. In the exceptional people who live to be 100 years old, it is found that the heart has done its work well and is still in fairly good condition at the time of death. In such people, it is usually the nervous system or the lungs to which fail.

Inasmuch as the heart is responsible for pumping the blood and carrying nourishment to every other tissue in the body, the heart is especially vital.

SQUALUS RESTS FOLLOWING TOW

WITH THE SQUALUS SALVAGE FLEET, off Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 18 (UP)—The sunken submarine Squalus, being towed to shallower water by navy salvagers, grounded last night in 90 feet of water four miles off Rye beach.

The ill-starred submersible, with its 26 dead, was raised 70 feet from the bottom earlier in the day and towed at a "rapid" rate over a five-mile zig-zag course before coming to rest on a soft bottom.

Despite two minor mishaps, the second "lift-tow" went off very smoothly. Operations were delayed somewhat when the chains around the bow of the ship slipped 30 feet aft. As a result the bow pontoons bore most of the weight during the three-hour tow.

A broken cable from the Squalus to the Falcon also threatened to interfere with the towing, but an emergency hawser from the Falcon to one of the lifting pontoons prevented trouble.

The Squalus and the Falcon were towed at the rate of two miles an hour by the tug Wandank, maneuvering back and forth to take advantage of currents and to dodge any shallow spots.
