

STATE FARMER COMMITTEEMEN VISIT COUNTY

Arriving in Klamath Falls Friday to discuss agricultural conservation matters with local committeemen were Will Steen, state committee chairman, and N. C. Donaldson, executive secretary. Steen is a farmer in the Milton-Freewater district of Umatilla county. The state committee, composed

of farmers, is charged with the administration of the farm program. Recommendations for development of a national program are formulated through conference with county committeemen.

Today's meeting follows closely the employment of Wayne Flak as assistant secretary for the local association. Flak is an Oregon State graduate and has been acting county agent in Lake county until his employment here.

Check-up of 1939 crop acreage to determine compliance in connection with the agricultural conservation program was started this week. Instructions this year call for measurement of all soil-depleting acreage, as well as wheat and potatoes.

Acreage of wheat on cooperating farms for which wheat allotments were established, and for which farm estimate sheets were signed, has already been deter-

mined in connection with 1939 wheat price adjustment payments. Information released by the county conservation office indicates that \$10,295.63 has been paid to wheat farmers to date. Practically all parity payments have been made. The separate parity payment is based upon 11c per bushel. An additional 17c per bushel wheat payment will be included in the regular conservation check at a later date.

Land signed under the program in 1939 has increased to 933 work sheet farms, including 239,840 acres of which 122,874 are cropland. Land included in the 1938 program totaled 781 work sheets with 212,043 acres of which 114,233 acres were cropland. The total acreage of cropland and plowing pasture as reported by the 1935 census is 229,625 acres, 145,224 acres being classed as cropland. The total irrigated cropland

BIDS INVITED FOR COUNTY INFIRMARY

Bids for the new Klamath county infirmary will be invited about September 6, it was announced Thursday by County Judge U. E. Reeder. Plans, now being prepared by Architect Howard R. Perrin, will be complete at that time.

Judge Reeder said the county has approximately \$30,000 to be used in the infirmary construction. Insurance payments for the old infirmary, lost by fire, totaled \$12,875, and \$2000 was paid for insured equipment. There is about \$15,000 in a special fund set up since the infirmary fire.

This is known as the infirmary

construction fund. It was made up of money transferred from care of poor, pension and relief funds in which it is anticipated there will be surpluses.

Judge Reeder said the infirmary cost may be about \$40,000. About \$30,000 is in sight in the special fund and insurance money. The plan is to budget for the remainder this fall.

"Thus we will avoid indebtedness in meeting this problem," said Judge Reeder. "We were disappointed that we could not get a federal grant, but we believe our program is going to work out satisfactorily."

The partially burned infirmary building on Summers lane is being razed by "force account." The job will be done in a few days.

Part of the material and equipment will be used in the construction and equipment of the new building.
