JUDGE DENIES MILEAGE FOR PRIVATE JURY

Circuit Judge Arthur D. Hay refused Tuesday to permit Klamath county to pay transportation costs for a private jury to visit property involved in the case of Louis Boldischar versus the California Oregon Power company.

Just before court adjourned at noon, Judge Hay said that the plaintiffs wished the jurors to see the property, a summer home on Odessa creek. Boldischar alleges that Copco has damaged the property to the extent of \$11,500 in its operation of Upper Klamath lake.

"Who is going to pay for the transportation of the jurors?" asked Judge Hay.

"Why, the sheriff usually arranges that," said Attorney J. H. Carnahan, representing Boldischar.

Judge Hay declared: "I am not going to permit Klamath county to be 'stuck' for the cost of transporting a jury in a private case. I never heard of such a thing. Why should the taxpayers be expected to pay such costs?"

Attorney Carnahan said that the sheriff had always handled jury transportation in any cases with which he was connected. "I don't care what has been done in the past," said Judge Hay. "The county is not going to pay for that transportation."

Arrangements were then made between Carnahan and Copco attorneys to transport the jurors to Odessa creek, on the west side of Upper Klamath lake, in private cars.

After nearly a day and a half, a jury was completed Tuesday just before noon in the case, another chapter in a long series of litigation over Copco's operations on the Upper lake. Judge Hay, circuit judge in Lake county, is sitting on the case, Judge Edward B. Ashurst having been disqualified.

Members of the jury are William Wiley, Jr., Ray Telford, Paul Hillon, Lee Sutton, Clarence Poole, Rex L. Jarrett, Amos L. Michael, John B. McCulley, Eugene Argraves, Jack Gove, Paul Lambert and Victor C. O'Neill.

Another unusual incident occurred at the opening of the case in court Monday.

Copco attorneys had suggested that Al Brandt, Judge Hay's court reporter at Lakeview, act as a reporter in this case.

Judge Hay refused to do this, stating that when he sat in a strange court he tried to keep the regular attaches of that court unless some unusual circumstances required a change. It was then agreed that Garnett Hall, Judge Ashurst's court reporter, would report the case.

Copco attorneys then asked if Brandt could sit at their desk as their own stenographer. To this, Judge Hay agreed.

Shortly thereafter, it was reported that Circuit Judge Ashurst had objected to Brandt's participation as a stenographer in the case. There was a conference in Judge Ashurst's chambers and Brandt did not resume his work for Copco in the court.

Brandt was circuit court reporter under the late Judge William M. Duncan of Klamath county.
