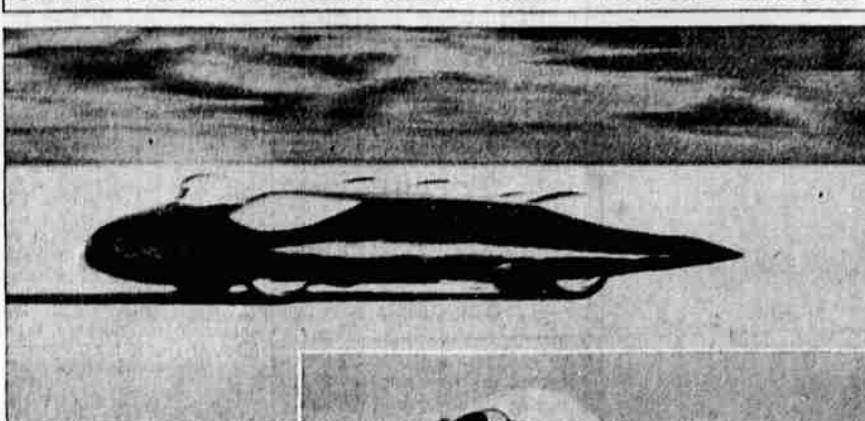

ILLNESS TAKES R. T. BALDWIN, LOCAL PIONEER

Robert Thompson Baldwin, 62, Klamath pioneer and member of one of the county's prominent old-time families, died here Wednesday.

Mr. Baldwin was born March 9, 1877, at Ashland, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Baldwin. The family moved to Klamath county in 1884. County Judge George T. Baldwin was a brother of Wallace, and uncle of Robert. Robert Baldwin was active in the building and operation of the first power plant at Klamath Falls, and he helped install the county's first telephone lines.

At the time of the war he engaged in shipyard work at Seattle. Returning, he established a radiator and fender works on South Sixth street, first exclusive shop of that kind in the community.

In 1934 he went into semi-retirement. He engaged in mining and more recently worked as nightwatchman for the county road department.

Survivors include his widow, Margaret C. Baldwin; a son, Wallace T.; a brother, Herb, of Winnemucca, Nevada, and a sister, Mrs. J. A. Werlings of Klamath Falls.

ATTENDANCE AT OREGON THEATRE PASSES 80,000

SALEM, Ore. (UP)—More than 80,000 persons have visited Oregon's tiny theatre on Treasure Island at the San Francisco world fair, Harold Say, head of the travel division of the state highway department has reported.

Kinney, Marshfield, Charles W. Tower, Medford; Joe L. Ross, Bend; Fay S. Baird, Pendleton, and William P. Perrin, ninth district representative.

PIONEER'S DEATH ANNOUNCED HERE

Word has been received in Klamath Falls of the death of John Whitney who died in a Lakeview hospital, August 7, following a brief illness.

Mr. Whitney was born near Tule lake, Klamath county, September 20, 1877, on his father's homestead. The elder Whitney filed on the land in 1872. It is the point where the shipping station, Malone, is now located.

Burial took place in the Lakeview cemetery August 9.

CIO ATTACKS AFL MOVE TO AMEND WAGNER LABOR ACT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23 (AP)—The CIO contended today that American Federation of Labor proposals to revise the Wagner labor act "constitute an act of deepest treachery to the workers of this country."

The assertion was contained in a statement by Leo Pressman, CIO general counsel, and was submitted to the senate labor committee as a supplement to previous CIO testimony in opposition to changes in the labor law.

"Self-styled leaders of labor" in the AFL, the statement said, are attempting to deprive the workers of protection against the merciless attacks of anti-labor corporations.

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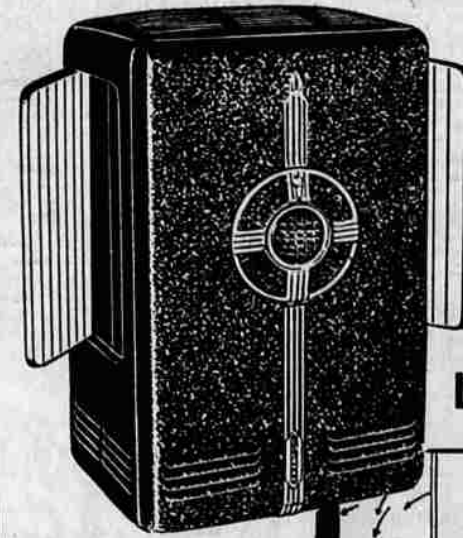
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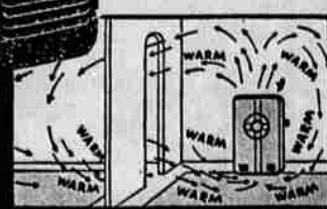
