

SHOOTING RANGE NEAR COMPLETION

Klamath Falls police officers will have one of the finest shooting ranges in the state with completion of the range under the Walnut street property in the rear of the city hall.

Under the direction of Police Judge Carl K. Cook the shooting range for pistols has been under construction for several months. It will be completed and ready for use within 30 days, Cook stated. The range room is 10 by 12 feet and placed under ground with a fresh air vent installed in the roof. The tunnel is approximately two or three feet under ground and the purpose of the shooting range is for safety as well as quiet, Cook pointed out. The tunnel is 50 feet long, reinforced with steel pipe. The target is reinforced with heavy steel.

Similar target ranges are operated by police officers in Portland, Salem, and other points in the state. Most of the work is being done by officers and much of the equipment is donated.

Lakeview Round-up Queen Runs Ranch Following Death Of Both Parents in Year



LAKEVIEW, Ore. — Fitting and proper was the choice of the people in the election Saturday night of Beatrice Menkenmaler of Fort Rock as queen of Lakeview's twentieth annual round-up.

Orphaned during the past year by the death of both parents Beatrice has portrayed a real western spirit by taking over the duties of a big ranch, supporting a younger brother, and really getting into the business of raising blooded horses. Her love of horses has been surpassed by one thing, the thrill of being elected queen of the round-up. The round-up is a round-up in the real sense of the word for Queen Beatrice. Horses, cattle and all the other things which are her everyday life are dressed up in the glamour of the show and she is right at home among the cowboys who respect her for her gallant spirit and the crowds in the stands who thrill with her because of her real enjoyment of her position as queen.

Twenty-one year-old Beatrice has had her taste of college life enjoyed by so many of Lake county's students. She has spent two years at Oregon State college where she fostered her interest in horses by taking up veterinary work, but was forced to postpone her schooling because of the death of her parents. However, she plans to eventually go on with her course so that she can really be fitted to realize her ambition and raise a strain of Arabian horses.

This slender blonde girl can ride a horse like a veteran. Living in the wide open spaces of the Fort Rock country has made her somewhat shy and it is hard for her to express the pleasure which her friends afford her, but a keen sense of humor, and a wealth of common sense will always find good things in life even though sorrow was early in placing its stamp on her memory.

"Bub," as she is affectionately known to her friends, is a popular resident member of the northern section of Lake county, but

she was not so well known in the rest of the county before her selection as one of the candidates for round-up queen. Her first appearance at one of the Queen's dances in Lakeview started a tide

of votes which ended in an avalanche last Saturday night. The imagination of the crowds was caught by her personal history and her fitness for the position of queen, until factions on all sides were rallying to her support. Five popular girls of the county were in the contest with her and every one of them was genuine in her congratulations Saturday night when the final count of the votes was announced.

The round-up crowds will have a chance to see one of the finest horses in the county when Beatrice rides her own prize pinto during the three days of the show. The queen will be dressed in an outfit of white buckskin and will have for her use a beautiful black saddle decorated in gold and silver. Princesses Eileen and Bernice will also be decked out in fitting array and the royal court is expected to present as effective a western picture as could be produced anywhere.

The annual pageant held on the background of the Lakeview hills will again be the setting for the coronation of the queen Saturday night. Floodlights will throw the line of horsemen on the hill as each rider solemnly makes his way in the wake of Queen Beatrice, who will be escorted to the actual scene of the crowning at the coronation dance. The pageant proved a thrilling spectacle at its inception last year and Director Clifford Howard has even more elaborate plans for its staging Saturday night.

Early next week the three girls will leave for San Francisco on their promised trip to the fair. They will return to Lakeview Thursday in order to enter into the full swing of the round-up at the first dance Friday night.

THE DALLES JUDGE RAPS PENALTY FOR HABITUAL CRIMINALS

THE DALLES, Aug. 23 (AP) — Circuit Judge Fred W. Wilson and District Attorney Leland Brown criticized the application of the Baumes habitual criminal act yesterday except for "violent crimes."

The opinions were expressed during the sentencing of Walter Ellis Cunningham to ten years for forgery. The prosecutor said

Cunningham had served in Colorado, Wyoming, California and Washington prisons. Brown explained he did not invoke life imprisonment for the fourth felony conviction because he believed it should be reserved to "cases of violence or use of dangerous weapons."

Judge Wilson, who said he wanted to "share the responsibility with the district attorney," declared the law "can work a hardship at times" and there should be a distinction between "violent crimes" and peaceful crimes, if there is such a thing.

D. Smith, certified federation wheat; 11:25, E. M. Millard, netted gem potatoes; noon, pot luck luncheon at West Side grange hall.

Beginning at 1:30 p. m., inspection of Harry Crowl ranch for alfalfa varietal nursery; 1:45, A. J. Swift ranch, certified Grimm alfalfa for seed; 2:10, J. S. Bernard ranch, Red clover for seed and Lakdak alfalfa; 2:45, the George Stockburger ranch for irrigated hill land, legumes and grass for seed.

Purpose of the annual crop tour is to promote more interest in the furtherance of farm projects with Lake county farmers and stockmen.
