RECLAMATION BUREAU EYES BIG PROJECTS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24 (P)—More monumental works of the Grand Coulee-Boulder dam type may rise soon in the west because congress saw fit at the last session to vote the reclamation bureau wide authority to venture further into the field of multiple-purpose projects.

Bureau officials predicted today the authority would greatly accelerate development of the west's open spaces and mean untold benefits to a wide variety of interests besides those of the irrigation farmer—if congress, in subsequent sessions, provided the necessary funds.

Count on Acceptance. Some westerners still in the capital said privately they thought that it would. But they were counting mainly, they indicated, on congressional acceptance next session of President Roosevelt's lend-lease program, remembering that it includes \$90,000,000 for reclamation projects.

The bureau's new powers were set forth in a little noted section of a new reclamation project re-employment law enacted near the close of the last session and signed by the president August 4.

That section gives the secretary of the interior the right to determine that a project is engineeringly feasible; estimate its cost; and allocate the cost among the purposes which will be served in proportion to the expected benefits.

Bureau Limited. Heretofore, except in instances when congress specifically authorized construction of a multi-purpose project—the Boulder dam, Grand Coulee and Central valley undertakings for example—the bureau has been limited to projects which could be paid for 100 per cent by the irrigation farmers and receipts from power sales.

Now, however, in determining the feasibility of a project it may also take into consideration such factors as usefulness from the flood control standpoint and as a source of municipal water supply. Having determined a project would serve several purposes together with any allocation secretary then would determine how the charges were to be allocated.

Authority Granted. If he found that the repayable and returnable allocations to irrigation, power, municipal water supply or other miscellaneous purposes together with any allocation equalled the total estimated cost of construction, congress said, the secretary could regard the project as having been authorized and proceed with its construction.

Bureau officials said this grant of authority to the secretary was a "logical development" of the government's reclamation program.

"It will mean," said one, "that from now on we can study a proposed project from a variety of angles, giving thought to other benefits aside from irrigation."

SEASONED TIMBER, by Dorothy (Canfield) Fisher. In her study of a poor academy in rural Vermont the author has symbolized the present day struggle between the dictatorships and democracy. Timothy Hulme, middle-aged principal of the academy, is stimulated into full action when a wealthy graduate leaves the school a million dollars, provided certain un-democratic policies are adopted. The whole village takes sides, and when the rumpus is over, Timothy Hulme and the broad-minded policy of the academy are intact, although Hulme's love affair has not prospered.

AN UNFINISHED LIFE, by Ruth St. Denis. This is an autobiography of the American dancer, emphasizing the part played in her career by her mother, and the importance of the spiritual significance of her dances. Ruth St. Denis writes with a candor which is generous as well as self-revealing.
