

BRITAIN SET TO AID POLES IF WAR COMES

His Holiness' summer palace, Castel Gandolfo.

"Let men return to mutual understanding," the pope implored, "let them begin their negotiations anew."

"Nothing is lost through peace," he said. "All is lost through war."

A DNB, official German news Agency, report in Berlin said "Polish troops were 'encircling' Danzig and a coup d'etat in the free city 'has come exceedingly close.'"

Chamberlain declared Britain's promise to aid in defense of Polish independence was "unaffected" by the German-Soviet Russia non-aggression accord.

He called the pact a "bombshell" which came as an "unpleasant surprise to the British government."

The house cheered his assertion that Russia, while discussing a mutual assistance agreement with Britain and France, had been negotiating secretly with Germany for purposes "which on the face of it were inconsistent with the objects of their foreign policy as we understood it."

Hope that peace might be preserved persisted, but throughout Europe nations were preparing for any emergency.

Two events indicated that the gravest moment since 1914 was near at hand:

1. Germany and Soviet Russia signed a treaty of non-aggression. The pact eliminated Russia as a possible ally of Great Britain and France and greatly strengthened Germany's hand in any test of force.

2. The senate of the free city of Danzig elected Nazi leader Albert Forster the city's chief executive.

In Germany, Fuehrer Hitler's troops stood ready for his command amid signs that Germany's resolve to settle the Danzig question promptly, even if it should mean bloodshed.

Reliable informants said Germany could be satisfied only by:

1. Unconditional return of Danzig.

2. Cession of Pomerania (Poznan), Pomorze (the Polish corridor) and Polish upper Silesia—all once-German.

3. Submission of what then would be left of Poland to the status of a German protectorate.

Britain's parliament assembled for an emergency defense session in a situation so acute that Ambassador Joseph Kennedy advised all American tourists to sail for home at once.

Despite the thunderbolt of the German-Russian pledges, both Britain and France prepared to back up their promise to fight the moment Poland feels she must shed blood to save her independence.

WOODEN BOX DANCE SLATED OCTOBER 28

The fall wooden box dance was scheduled for October 28 at a meeting of the central committee held in Eagles hall Wednesday night. The dance will be held in the armory with Biddle Gray's orchestra giving the music.

At the committee meeting Past Chairman Roland Central was presented with a gift from the committee. The presentation was made by Past Chairman I. A. Baker.

The committee voted to donate \$50 to the Pine Ridge disaster fund.

It was stated at the meeting that materials are being collected on a study of the export and import possibilities for box dance and seed mixtures.

Aliske clover from the Klamath basin is getting a nationwide reputation as the best seed available on the continent or elsewhere, for that matter, as growers are particularly careful in their seed stock and realize that the best seed for re-seeding purposes can be purchased at home and that only pure seed should be used. Systematic control of bad weeds is being undertaken and it carried out will maintain the quality of Klamath seed for many years.

While production of aliske clover in the Klamath basin has increased, the nation's crop as a whole shows a decided decrease, as reported by the agricultural marketing service of the U. S. department of agriculture. It is estimated that the crop this year amounts to 19,500,000 pounds, as compared with 25,500,000 pounds in 1938, or a 25 per cent decrease. This decrease is attributed to the reduction in acreage brought about by the dry weather in the summer and fall of 1938 in a number of important aliske producing districts. Biggest decrease in production is indicated for Ohio, Indiana, Michigan and New York. Larger production is expected in Oregon, Idaho and Minnesota. Harvesting of aliske got under way in Ohio and Wisconsin on July 20 and since that time other states are following suit. First harvesting reported in the Klamath basin was in the Malin district, starting about the middle of August. Prices being offered for the new crop show considerable improvement over those offered a year ago.

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The Line-Up In Europe

Here are the positions of European countries in the crisis over Germany's dispute with Poland:

Germany—Reichsfuehrer Hitler demands free hand in eastern Europe.

Italy—Allied with Germany and ready to fight with her, but still having hope, though diminishing, for peace.

Great Britain—"Resolved and prepared to employ without delay all forces" at her command to aid Poland if Hitler's demands should be carried to war.

France—As Britain's ally and a co-guarantor of Poland's independence ready to fight with Britain and Poland.

Soviet Russia—Newly pledged in her non-aggression pact with Germany neither to use force against Germany alone or with others nor to support warlike acts by a third power against Germany.

Poland—Determined to resist by arms if necessary any German attempt to force a solution of their dispute.

Rumania—King Carol says his nation will be neutral and will fight only to defend its own territory; but country is conscious it is an oil reservoir for Germany.

Hungary—Friendly to Germany and Poland, hopes to be independent but knows she is Germany's granary.

"Oslo power"—Belgium, the Netherlands, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Finland and Luxembourg are neutral and hope for peace.

Turkey and Greece—Members of the British-French front, holders of pledges from Britain and France of aid if they are attacked.

Bulgaria—Hopes to profit by any German-induced changes in the map of Europe.

Yugoslavia—Hopes to be independent, but lies between the pincers of Rome and Berlin.

ODESSA HOMESITE CASE CONTINUES

The case of Louis Boldischar against the California Oregon Power company continued in circuit court Thursday with the plaintiff still presenting testimony. Boldischar is suing for \$11,500, charging that Copco operations on the upper lake damaged a summer home on Odessa creek.

Plaintiff's evidence Thursday was intended to show that the property was flooded, with water entering the house and damaging the house and walks. Boldischar himself took the stand just before the noon hour.

Circuit Judge Arthur D. Hay is sitting on this case.

"We would like to have other suburban areas out of Klamath Falls, especially south and west of the main canal, contact the temporary officers and plan for similar organization," Cloyes stated.

550 OREGON WHEAT LOANS RECEIVED

CORVALLIS, Aug. 24 (AP)—E. L. Ludwick, state AAA officer, announced today 550 Oregon farmers had received federal wheat loans involving 1,500,000 bushels and \$950,000.

Loans were made last year on 7,334,111 bushels but this season's business is a month ahead of 1938.

Counties already receiving loans included Sherman, Gilliam, Morrow, Umatilla, Union, Walla, Jefferson and Wasco.

The loans have been made on the basis of 60 to 70 cents per bushel, depending on grade and distance from terminal market.

Wheat loans are made for a seven-month period, all maturing April 30, Ludwick said.

PORTABLE LAB IN VISIT TO KLAMATH

Completely outfitted with adequate facilities for field investigations and surveys of any type of sanitation, an interesting mobile laboratory has arrived in Klamath Falls for a week's work in the county. The mobile "lab" is located on the grounds of the Klamath Health unit, Pine and Eighth streets and will remain here until Sunday.

Director in charge of the mobile laboratory is E. C. Parkinson, and assisting him is L. W. Jensen. Both are from the home office in Portland.

Parkinson explained that the lab is used in all types of field work and making surveys of any type of sanitation and the work found necessary during epidemics or disease outbreaks in the state.

Thus far the work of the laboratory in the state has been with milk and water and other investigations. The mobile laboratory has been in use the past 11 months and has traveled extensively throughout Oregon. It is equipped with standard laboratory equipment including a three-plate gas-line stove, electric refrigerator, incubator, sink, still for distilling water, oven for the sterilization of all glassware, a centrifuge which separates the blood cells from the serum used in making tests in typhoid and undulant fever, and other diseases, and a plate counter for counting colonies of bacteria.
