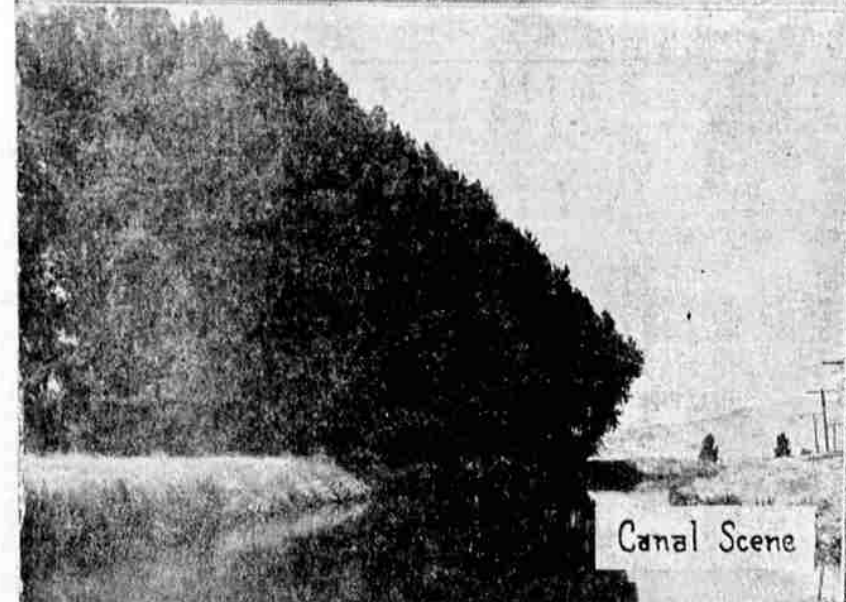

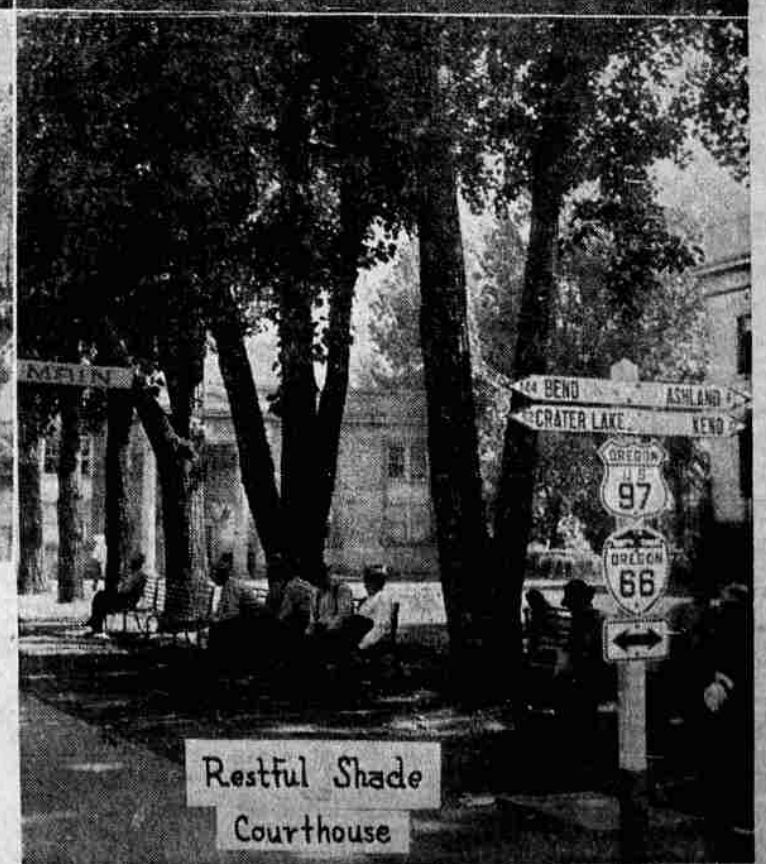

TREES spread their friendly branches today over more of Klamath's streets and residential properties than ever before. Year by year the process of community beautification progresses, as Klamath Falls assumes more definitely the status of a "home city."

Tall poplars in the older part of the city attest to the foresight of the pioneers who first settled along the banks of Link river. But in the years of extremely rapid growth beginning in the 'twenties, Klamath Falls spread out faster than trees could be grown. And in the rush of those years, city beautification was to some extent neglected.

But trees, lawns, flower gardens and shrubbery have been set out in increasing numbers in recent years. Plants both large and small have responded to the soil, the climate and the water. On hot days of this summer, cool shade has been easier to find than ever before. Home surroundings have become more attractive.

In the hope of encouraging this development, today's picture page is devoted to shade and ornamental trees in Klamath Falls and the surrounding area. The large picture at the top right shows a general tree-studded view of the city, and the others are close-ups of trees and tree-shaded spots. They tell a story of development that should continue.
