BRITISH MAY BUY ARGENTINE WHEAT

BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 29 (AP)—British sources said today they believed their government was negotiating for the purchase of large supplies of wheat in Argentina.

These authorities said it was likely such purchases would be made on an option basis, rather than outright, due to the shortage of ships available for transporting grain to England.

Cesar Urien, sub-secretary of agriculture, said reports that Great Britain was negotiating for Argentina's whole wheat crop surplus were "inaccurate," but that he lacked details on the actual status of wheat sales in progress.

HITLER GOES ON SHORT RATIONS

BERLIN, Aug. 29 (AP)—Adolf Hitler, in keeping with his government's emergency measures, has put himself and the staff of his Wilhelmstrasse chancellery on a strict one-course meal basis.

BUYING RUNS STRONG WITH STOCKS LIFTED

NEW YORK, Aug. 29 (AP)—With the European political poker game still under way, and the players seemingly indisposed to call a war bet, Wall Street turned to the buying end of the stock market today and lifted prices fractions to around 3 points.

Dealings were slow from the start. There were intermittent letdowns in the advancing trend but final quotations were near the best. Transfers for the five hours approximated 500,000 shares, one of the smallest turnovers for a full session in two weeks.

Steels, motors, rubbers, coppers, rails, utilities and specialties ran about neck-and-neck in the forward tilt.

The New York market took a cue in the forenoon from foreign centers where, as a result of a mild revival of optimism over the international scene, prices were bid up at London, Paris and Amsterdam.

On the domestic board prominent stock gainers included U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors, Chrysler, U. S. Rubber, Westinghouse and General Electric.

WHEAT MARKET RESUMES DECLINE

CHICAGO, Aug. 29 (AP)—The last vestige of the past week's wheat price rise due to the European war scare was erased today as the market resumed its decline.

Prices here tumbled as much as 2 cents a bushel at one time, with other world markets off as much or more. Compared with the levels reached last Thursday at the height of the war scare, today's closing prices were almost 6 cents lower.

Wheat rallied fractionally from early extreme lows and steadied at a level near the close, which was 1 1/2c lower than yesterday.
