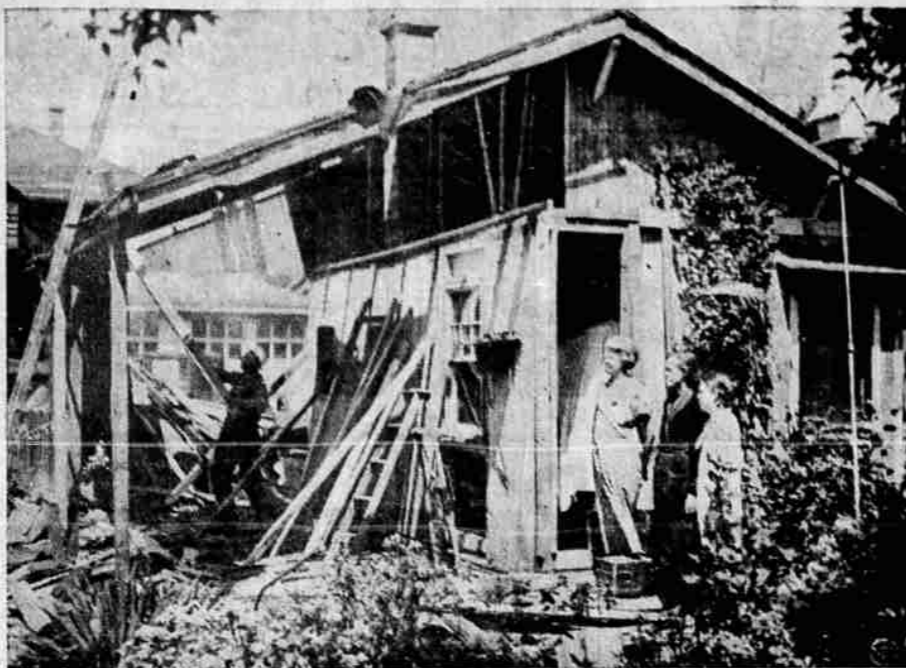

## DEATH HAS LEAD IN TRAFFIC LIST

CHICAGO, Aug. 30 (U.P.)—Death increased its lead over traffic safety by one per cent during July, the National Safety council reported today, and accidents in rural areas were blamed again for the upturn.

Highway accidents claimed 2,750 lives during July, 30 more than in July, 1938, the council said. Fatalities in June were two per cent above those of June, 1938, after 18 months of continued declines.

Rural area fatalities increased seven per cent in July to offset a nine per cent decrease in metropolitan deaths. It was the fourth consecutive increase in rural area deaths.

The council said increased travel because of world fairs may have been responsible in part for the increased highway death rate in July. Mileage increases for June failed to justify the increased death total for that month, however, the council added.

New Hampshire led the states in percentage decrease of fatalities. It saved 17 lives during the first seven months of 1939, a 33 per cent decrease. Kansas City, Mo., led the cities of more than 250,000 population with 26 lives saved, a 58 per cent decrease.

## SCHOOL SETUP CHANGED OVER FOR NEW YEAR

MERRILL—Merrill schools will open on Wednesday, September 6, having been reorganized this summer on the six-six basis, or six years of elementary education, and six years of high school education, following the latest ideas in modern educational theory.

In the elementary school, Wilbur Robinette will continue as principal. Other teachers are Miss Estrid Johnson, Miss Thelma Storey, Miss Ellen Konop, Mrs. Della Eagle Winthers and Miss Mildred Shipman.

## Teachers Listed

E. E. Kilpatrick will be principal of the six-year high school. Teachers in the various departments of the high school will be as follows: E. Van Ness Johnson, formerly of Maine will take C. M. Haas' place as shop instructor, teaching science and coaching basketball; Earl Shin will continue as instructor of typing and social science and handle football and band; Mrs. Geneva Glenn Duncan will head the English and girls' physical education departments; Mrs. Norma Storil Petrasek will teach home economics, English and world history; Mr. Robert Christner, an ad-

dition to the faculty from the Merrill elementary school last year, will teach social science, arithmetic and business law; Miss Elizabeth Evanson of Medford, a graduate of University of Oregon school of music, Mills college in California, and Armstrong Business college of Berkeley, will teach shorthand, English, and have charge of glee club and orchestra.

Under the new plan the high school schedule of subjects will be enlarged to include considerable more music than in the past year. A larger staff will permit the better supervision of such activities as debate, dramatics, physical education, newspaper and other student activities.

## Building Opens Saturday

The high school building will be open Saturday, September 2, and Monday, September 4, for advance enrollment of senior high school students of grades 10, 11 and 12, at which time schedules will be made out, books and lockers assigned, and fees for rentals taken. The junior high school division, and students of the senior high school division who cannot enroll in advance, will assemble Wednesday, September 6, for registration.

The new Merrill high school gymnasium is now complete and ready for use. It adds considerably to the effectiveness of the high school plant, as well as being an addition for which the Merrill community can be proud. It is finished with maple floor, has a large bleacher space for spectators and with a commodious stage and dressing rooms on each side, the entire setup is well fitted for student and community activities.
