MOOSE ELIMINATE WORD 'DICTATOR'

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 30 (AP) — The Loyal Order of Moose, by unanimous resolution, today struck the word "dictator" from its rituals and titles of elective officers throughout the English-speaking world.

The action was recommended by U. S. Senator James J. Davis of Pennsylvania, director-general of the order, in his report to 1000

delegates attending the 51st international convention. The word "dictator" has been used by the order since it was founded 32 years ago. It will be replaced by "governor."

"The present meaning that is read by the public into the word, dictator," Davis told the delegates, "makes it hardly a suitable title for the presiding officers of an organization such as ours, devoted to democratic ideals of free men, free government, freedom of speech and the press, freedom of assembly and freedom to worship God in our own way."

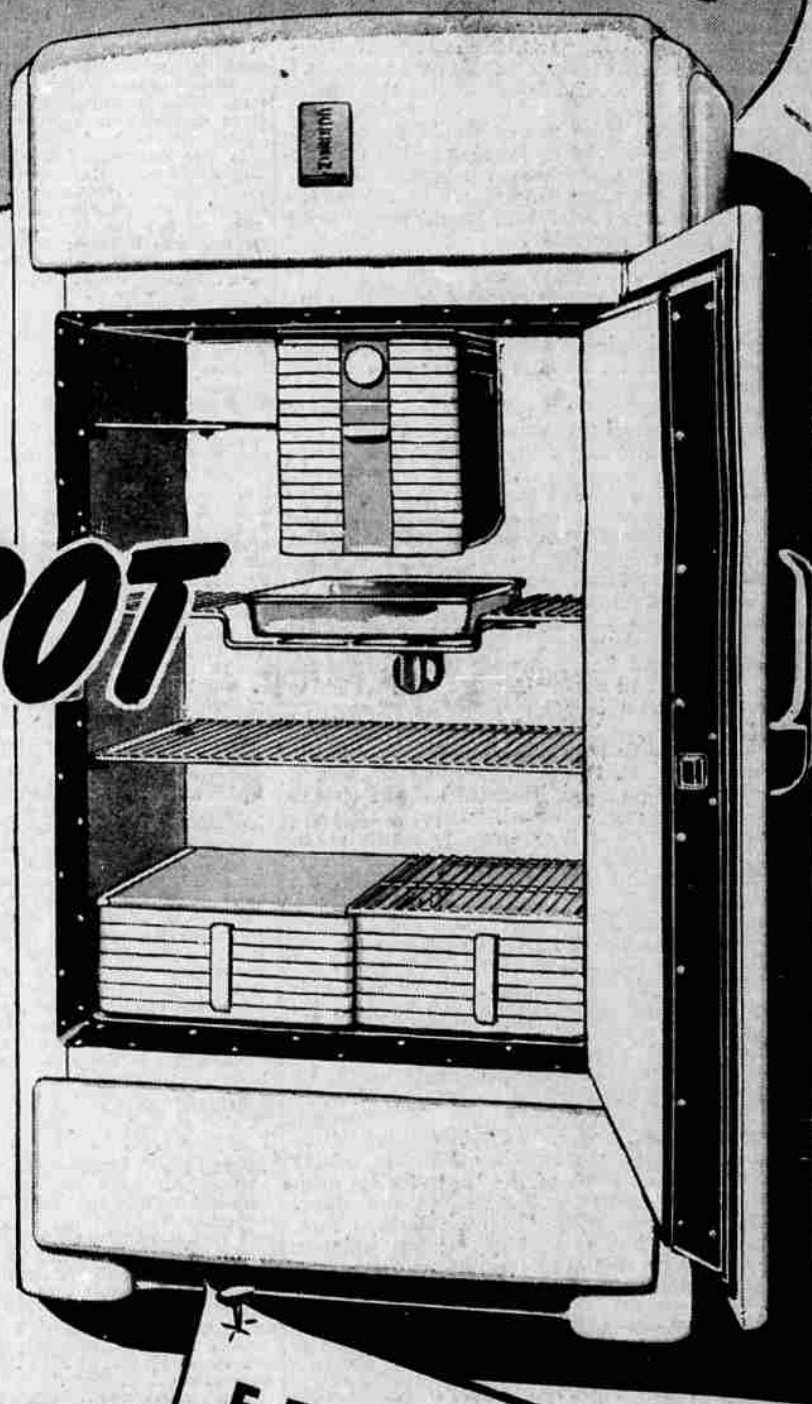
