

REPORT SWITCHOVER HELP TO BE GIVEN

Klamath county employers whose businesses are covered by the state unemployment compensation law will have an opportunity this week and next to obtain expert guidance in complying with the commission's switchover to quarterly reporting.

Auditor W. L. Fowler will head-quarter during this period at the Klamath Falls office of the Oregon state employment service, 1126 Main street, and arrangements can be made through Manager Jack Almeter to contact him there.

Full wage data on every covered employee is due in the commission's central office here by August 31 and checkover of records by the firm and register division shows a number of employers have failed to comply with the regulation.

Even though contributions have been paid, employers are reminded that this change to quarterly reporting which will enable the commission to process claims during 1940 without calling upon them for wage data at the time of separations must be furnished now.

Wages earned during the last quarter of 1938 and the first two quarters of 1939 should be reported now. Wage data for July, August and September is due in October.

EMPLOYEES SUPPORT STRIKE OF UNIONS

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 30 (AP) The unusual spectacle of employers supporting a strike among their own workers was presented today in an intra-union dispute involving more than 50,000 building tradesmen.

The Master Carpenters and Builders company, representing 49 Philadelphia contractors, announced contractors are "working closely with the Building Trades Council, AFL, in assisting the strike the council has called."

"We are 100 per cent behind this strike against a strike," declared Thomas S. Keefe, president of the contractors' group. The building trades council called 50,000 members away from work and succeeded in shutting down half a dozen large projects, including federal and municipal court buildings, and hospital, public school and low rent housing projects.

James L. McDevitt, president of the council estimated that of the 50,000 workers involved, 15,000 already have laid down their tools. Because of the contractors' cooperation, he added, the number expected to quit will not exceed 25,000.

The situation, believed to be unprecedented, is the result of a dispute between the council and two of its affiliates, the Steamfitters and Plumbers unions, recently ousted from the council because they allegedly called unauthorized strikes in violation of council agreements with contractors.

Keefe said contractors were dismissing plumbers and steamfitters as demanded by the council as a prerequisite to withdrawal of the general walk out order.
