

FORMER BIEBER PASTOR STRIKES RICH OIL FIELD

BIEBER—Orin Wade Sidenor, a former evangelist who was pastor of the Bieber church in 1932-34 and used to walk 12 miles to hold Sunday morning services in Gougeon community north of Looking when he could not afford to buy gas, now owns eight oil wells that are yielding about 10,000 barrels a month, he said while on a visit here this week.

Sidenor said the wells are on a farm belonging to his mother and himself near St. Elmo, Illinois, where oil was struck last fall. He exhibited typewritten sheets that appeared to be an oil company's reports on the Sidenor wells and which showed a flow of more than 300 barrels per day.

He is negotiating for purchase of a farm near Visalia, Calif., he said, and plans to live on it. His mother has become nearly blind since their oil strike, and doctors have been unable to help her sight. He will bring her to California.

Sidenor left Bieber five years ago to go to a church at Live Oak, Calif. He said his health failed and he had to give up preaching for good, even relinquishing his ordination papers as a minister of the Church of God.

His main interest since then has been writing biographies of his relatives and ancestors and compiling a family history which he said goes back 10 generations. He had the manuscript, some hundreds of typewritten pages, with him here, and said he would have it published as a book if it did not cost too much.

REPORT SHOWS COST INCREASE IN GOVERNMENT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31 (UP)—A study reported today by the department of commerce tells the story of the rising cost of operating and maintaining state governments.

The total cost for the 48 states in 1937, the last year for which complete figures are available, was \$2,601,887,000, an increase of 67.6 per cent over the \$1,552,075,000 expended in 1932.

The cost of Oregon was \$19,755,000 in 1937, compared with \$16,755,000 in 1932.

Interest Excluded
The cost was exclusive of operating public service enterprises and of payments for interest and outlays as well as payments for debt retirement and other non-cost payments.

The state functions covered by the cost report included the legislative, executive and judicial branches, highways, protection, natural resource development, health, hospitals, charities, corrections, schools, libraries, recreation and miscellaneous operations. Oregon's cost of operating its "general government" was \$1,452,000 in 1937, compared with \$1,261,000 in 1932.

(General government includes the legislative, executive and judicial branches of the state government, staff administrative offices and finance and law, elections and general government buildings.)

Highway Costs Increase
Protections cost, including highway patrols, militia, armories, etc., for the state amounted to \$1,328,000 in 1937 and \$1,330,000 in 1932.

Highway costs for Oregon amounted to \$4,582,000 in 1937 and \$6,400,000 in 1932. Oregon spent \$1,454,000 in 1937 in the development and conservation of its natural resources and \$1,538,000 in 1932.

Health and sanitation cost \$224,000 in 1937 and \$147,000 in 1932.

Miscellaneous payments (including pensions and gratuities to former employees or their dependents, unemployment compensation administration and benefits, employment services, administration of public trust funds and investments, etc.), cost \$308,000 in 1937 and \$300,000 in 1932.

Charities Increased
The state spent for hospitals and institutions for the handicapped \$1,279,000 in 1937 and \$1,151,000 in 1932.

Its charities cost \$5,087,000 in 1937 and \$3,355,000 in 1932. Correction, including prisons, pardons and parole boards, cost \$342,000 in 1937 and \$644,000 in 1932.

The state's schools cost amounted to \$3,288,000 in 1937 and \$3,796,000 in 1932.

Library costs were \$45,000 in 1937 and \$50,000 in 1932, while recreation cost \$35,000 in 1937 and \$94,000 five years before.

DELAY POINTING TOWARD PEACEFUL END FOR CRISIS

his war colonies back, and nobody could tell where a general conference would land if it once got started. The great pyramids were built by hand, you know.

While the present pause in the rush for ruin cannot be other than pleasing, and must give rise to hope for peace, there is danger in too much delay in getting down to business.

All the countries concerned are continuing to put the finishing touches on their preparations for possible war. Everybody is just so ready for action that if anybody fired a big gun the war machines would start to function automatically at full speed.

Somebody's patience might snap, and result in the decision that since the general controversy between the Anglo-French allies and the Berlin-Rome axis has to be settled sometime, it might as well be thoroughly ironed out by war now.

Proposals of this, there is a good deal of food for thought in the quiet but grim speed with which France is getting set. Premier Daladier and his cabinet aren't doing much talking. They are leaving most of that to the rest of the crowd. But Daladier's jaw is set with the fighting expression which has brought him the nickname of the "Bull of Provence."

It is highly important not to overlook that there is a very considerable group of highly placed Frenchmen who long have wanted to wage a "preventive" war against Germany. This has been on the basis of belief that Germany would attack France again sooner or later.

That is not to say that France wants war now, because she has made it clear she prefers peace. But it is to say that she might not be in the frame of mind to bicker over a long period with Germany.

When I was in France soon after Munich a highly authoritative source, in telling me the story of why France and England didn't fight for Czechoslovakia, implied in about so many words that France would have fought if she had been sufficiently supported by Russia and England.

That would be a point of argument probably between Britain and France. But the fact remains that France's memory still burns with the terrible devastation and civilian torture that the world war brought to her territory. She isn't overlooking, either, that Mussolini is making claims against her.

While France wants peace, these thoughts make her sensitive. I

ASTORIA, Ore., Aug. 31 (AP)—Thirty-nine years after its construction was proposed by a navy commission, work was started today on the million and a half dollar Tongue Point naval base.

A few hours after a contractor began tearing away weakened piers—the first step in construction of docks—the Columbia river defense unit was dedicated at 10:45 a. m.
