

REQUEST FOR PEAR CONTAINER DENIED

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 31 (UP)—Frank McKennon, chief of the division of plant industry in the state agriculture department, announced that requests for a special container for pears for the 1939 season have been denied.

The refusal came after pear growers in Medford and Hood River at recent hearings came out almost unanimously against it. The proposed container was almost the same as the half box now in general use.

ACREAGE LOTS FOR WHEAT IN KLAMATH SET

Wheat acreage allotments and yields set on Klamath county farms for 1940 are being released this week by the county agricultural conservation association office, according to C. A. Henderson, county agent.

Farmers who grew no wheat during 1937, 1938 or 1939 but expect to grow wheat in 1940 and wish a 1940 wheat allotment should make written application within the near future to the county committee, stating the allotment desired, Henderson said. The county committee will be able to allocate up to three per cent of the total county wheat allotment to such "new" wheat farms.

In giving out the new wheat allotments, according to Henderson, the committee will govern their decisions by considering the ratio of wheat land to crop land in the community in question.

Farmers receiving notice of a zero allotment should consider that they may grow 10 acres of wheat for grain and additional acreage for hay without incurring deductions from 1940 payments. No wheat payment will be made in such cases.

Requests for allotments on "new" farms must be made in writing and cannot be considered unless received before September 16, 1939.

SIAMESE ROYALTY CHASES DEVILS FROM NEW PRINCE

LONDON, Aug. 31 (AP)—The excited royal family of Thailand—formerly Siam—solemnly set aside yesterday for chasing the devil from the house's youngest prince, Tejassakul, born five weeks ago in rural England.

It was really quite a business, with ex-King Prajadhipok in the role of chief devil chaser and 20 guests on hand for the 100-year-old ritual—and subsequent champagne feast. The scene was a modern, white-plastered house, not at all like the temples of Siam. On the other hand, the ceremony was far removed from modern things like war worries.

The child is the son of Prince Chiratsakul, adopted son of Prajadhipok. Chiratsakul explained the old Siamese custom was observed this way:

Every guest gets a little cord and passes it over the baby. Then it's tied around the infant's wrist for devil-chasing purposes. After that a priest—of in this case the ex-king—cuts a lock of hair from the baby's head, wraps it carefully in lotus leaves and floats it on the nearest stream.

Finally the baby is sprinkled with holy water from the temple. That for the ceremony today was brought all the way from Thailand.

Guests included, besides the baby's mother and father, the former queen, the dowager queen and other Thai court ladies.
