

WILSON KAYOED BY SCHULTZ

CRAB SUBDUES BOB KENASTON AS JAP LOSES BY TOEHOLDS

Hans "Hitler" Schultz made an impressive debut at the armory last night—his first bout—and his main event foe, George Wildcat Wilson, left the ring on a stretcher after a headlong trip against the ringpost.

In the earlier bouts Joe Smolinski put Sergeant Bob Kenaston down for the count with a Boston crabhold, and a newcomer, Bill Venable, put a stop to Taro Ito with a brace of toeholds.

Schultz hewed a big niche for himself in the meanie class in his first bout here. Early in the match he had Wilson growling with chokeholds, hairpulling and other abuse, and it was Wilson's attempted revenge that brought the bout's spectacular end.

Wilson Gets Mad
Time and again in the early minutes of the match Wilson rose up in righteous wrath and smote the 218-pound German down, but he always cooled off before the clincher. Punishing scissor on both sides and one beauty of a full Nelson by Wilson provided most of the orthodox wrestling of the event, while the German's headlocks mostly turned into chokeholds.

The end came after Wilson, refusing a fall from the referee on a foul, waded in and smashed Schultz to the canvas with a good half-dozen sizzling clouts on the jaw. Then he backed into the ropes and sent Hans jolting down with two flying tackles.

It looked like the finish when the Wildcat dived at the groggy German the third time but he missed his mark and sailed through the ropes to the concrete. He salvaged what he could with a dive over the second strand that again floored Hans but Wilson had shot his bolt. The German felled him with a pair of rabbit punches and finished the job by dragging him along on two quick trips to the ring posts, leaving Wilson writhing in his corner until the crowd marched out.

Free-For-All Staged
Smolinski and Kenaston staged a free-for-all in their bout. Smolinski had the best of it in the first round, using up a good part of the 10 minutes by dragging Kenaston around the ring in a headlock, after rubbing the ex-marine's head on the ring ropes a while.

Kenaston came back in the second frame with his head dripping wet, blocking the headlock treatment, and chalked up the first fall with his pet Gold Hill swivel.

Smolinski's finishing Boston crabhold came while Referee Earl Yonkley was trying to untangle himself after a dive into the ropes. Kenaston was unable to continue and Joe was given the deciding tumble by default.

Bill Venable had a big job on hand for his opening trial here when he tackled Taro Ito, the Jap who calls on a store of oriental jiu jitsu to get out of tight spots. The Nipponese tricks, however, failed in the important places last night and Ito, after winning the first fall, was forced to pat the mat and give Venable the next two, both on toeholds.

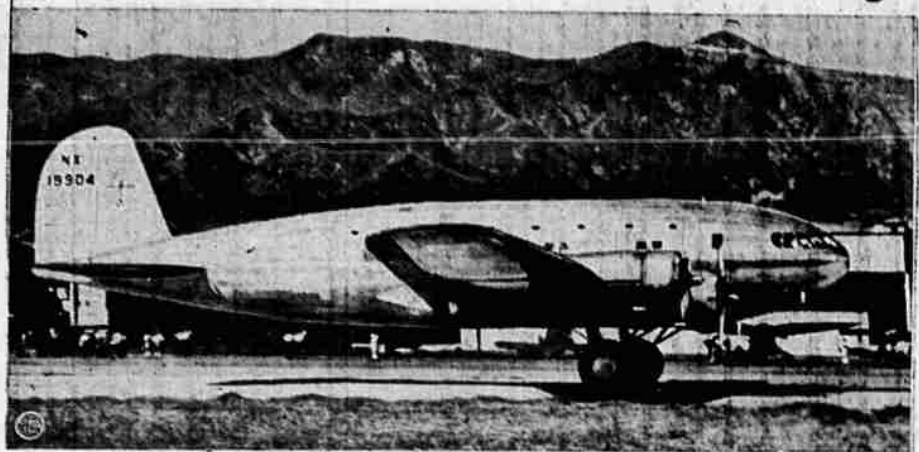

PITCHERS GET BIG HELP OF HOMERS IN MAJOR TILTS

"Way back in the good old days, the old professor once said pitching is 80 per cent of baseball, but the big league managers will tell you today there's nothing so handy as the home runs to prove it.

Fellows like Will McKechnie, Oasie Vitt, Joe McCarthy, Gabby Hartnett and Ray Blades will take you no further back than yesterday to paint a picture about what they mean.

For it was a set of four-base knocks which cashed in on elegant pitching all around the tilts involving the leaders in the majors, breaking up every game and leaving this situation: (1) Cincinnati's Reds still 31 games in front of the National League; (2) The Yankees' American League edge trimmed to 16 games; (3) the St. Louis Cardinals still in the thick of the senior circuit fight and (4) the Cubs with a slightly tighter grip on third place.

Out in Cincinnati the Reds, opening a home stand, were collecting a basketful of goose eggs from Hot Potato Luke Hamlin and the blazing Brooklyn Dodgers. Then, with two out in the ninth, and a man on base Billy Myers parked his eighth homer of the season out of the lot to tie the score. After that, Buck McCormick's single in the tenth, sending the winning run across for a 3-2 decision and Bucky Walters' 24th pitching victory, was an anti-climax.

The Cards, in St. Louis, were having a tough time with the Phillies. Johnny Mize and Ducky Medwick hit homers in the early innings, but Joe Marty came back with a two-run round-tripper in the seventh to put the Phils in front. So Terry Moore whacked one among the paying customers with a man on base in the last of the seventh to give the Gas House gang a 4-3 decision.

The Cubs used the most outspoken kind of homer—one with the bags loaded—and they did it early. Hank Leibler came up in the first inning and belted it. From there it was no trick at all for the Cubs to coast in with an 8-3 win over the Bees.

The American league's top tussle also followed the senior circuit's home-run suit. The Yankees had a tough uphill fight to deadlock the Cleveland Indians in the regulation nine innings. But Oasie Gromes settled the thing by leading off the tenth with his third homer of the year, and the Indians clicked, 4-3, ending the Yanks' eight-game winning streak.

The second place Boston Red Sox, behind Denny Galehouse's five-hit pitching, nipped the Detroit Tigers, 2-1.

The Athletics didn't hit a homer, but they collected 19 other assorted base knocks to wallop the St. Louis Browns, 9-1, behind steady seven-hit elbowing by Buster McCrabb, making his first start in the big time. The Chicago White Sox's Lefty Lee downed the Washington Senators, 2-2, with a four-hit elbowing job, but the Senators made a successful protest as the result of a sixth-inning play, and the game was ordered replayed today.

The Giants and Pittsburgh Pirates were rained out.

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VICTORY OVER ANGELS PUTS SUDS OUT OF DANGER ZONE

Seattle held the 1939 Pacific Coast league baseball pennant today—the Rainiers' first championship in 15 years.

Manager Jack Lelivelt's club, which finished second to Los Angeles last year, clinched the flag last night with a 4 to 3 victory over Los Angeles at the Seattle park to top the loop by seven games. The finale of the regular season is next Sunday.

Seattle took the lead away from Los Angeles in mid-season and led all the way in. After the first couple of weeks of play, the Rainiers never were lower than second place.

It was Seattle's first pennant since 1924. Last year the club finished second, sixth in 1937, and fourth in 1936.

Hal Turpin, Seattle mound ace, hurled his 23rd victory of the season as the Rainiers weathered a Los Angeles rally in the closing frames. Seattle was off to a 4 to 0 lead by the sixth inning but Los Angeles threatened with a run in the seventh and two in the eighth before the rally was cut short.

The third-place San Francisco Seals divided a double header with Portland at the Beavers' park and moved up to only half a game behind Los Angeles. Portland won a comedy of 11 errors in the opener, 14 to 4, but dropped the nightcap, 10 to 8.

San Diego's Padres bunched four hits in the final two frames to nick Hollywood, 6 to 2, at Hollywood, and at Oakland the fourth-place Sacramento Senators defeated Oakland, 11 to 6.

OREGON SPORTS NOTES

A 10-year misunderstanding concerning the northwest's most famous reverse-English football play of the last decade was cleared up in Vancouver, Wash., last week when Gob Wentworth, one-time University of Washington tackle, broadcast loudly that "it wasn't me" who tackled Bobby Robinson of Oregon from the sidelines in the 1929 game.

The Gob says that almost from the instant of the amazing episode he has been getting credit, or something, for being the chief actor in it.

The play, to refresh memories after 10 years, occurred late in the Oregon-Washington encounter at Seattle a decade ago. Oregon was handling Enoch Hagshaw's last Husky team a trimming. Bobby Robinson broke loose and made for the goal line. He dodged and outran the last of the opposition and had clear sailing ahead when from nowhere charged a giant in purple and gold. The negro went head over heels as the newcomer smeared him with a fervor that almost caused a groundswell on Lake Washington and rocked the rule book to its foundations. The tackle had come from the sidelines to halt the dusky Duck. The crowd gasped, the Oregon team was too stunned to protest. The officials, as soon as they collected their wits, waved the intruder off the gridiron and allowed Oregon the touchdown.

Larry Westerweller read Wentworth's denial the other day and said it was the first time he had ever heard the Gob get "credit" for the play.

"I'm willing that he should have it," Westerweller, now in the automobile business in Portland, recently of Medford, said. "But Hagshaw taught us to tell the truth and I'll have to admit it was me that tackled Robinson. I'm sorry they've been pestering Wentworth. They won't let me forget it either."

Westerweller, an end who later became a Washington star and played a season of professional ball with the old Wilson's Wildcats, organized by the great George Wilson, had been knocked out 10 minutes before the twelfth-man play. He was being helped down the sidelines toward the tunnel leading to the player's quarters. The roar of the crowd and the sight of the Oregon half-back in the open was too much for the befuddled Washington lineman. He pushed aside his convoy and nailed the Oregonian with a flawless tackle.

The fact that Westerweller and Wentworth were of about the same size and looked somewhat alike in moleskins may account for the 10 years of mistaken identity. Wentworth says people began congratulating him on the play the very next day and have been doing it ever since. "If that's the way they've treated him—who didn't do it, imagine how they've been treating me—who did it," concluded Westerweller. "How that Reigels must have suffered."

Alice Marble Holds Top At Forest Hills
NEW YORK, Sept. 13 (AP)—Alice Marble's vast superiority over the best of the other tennis girls has knocked about all the interest out of the Ladies' league in the national championships, now in the seventh day at Forest Hill.
