

SIX INJURIES REPORTED IN 68 ACCIDENTS

Of the 48 automobile accidents which have occurred in Klamath Falls within the past month of August, but six injuries were reported according to the month-end statement of the police department filed with the city council Monday night by Chief of Police Frank Hamm.

But one automobile accident resulted in fatal injuries since the first of the year, according to the report.

Following is the statement as accepted by the council:

Burglary, breaking and entering, 4; larceny, over \$50, 4; under \$50, 5; auto theft, 16; total, 62.

Other assaults, 1; forgery and counterfeiting, 1; embezzlement and fraud, 1; stolen property, 1; sex offenses, 1; liquor violations, 5; drunkenness, 107; disorderly conduct, 2; vagrancy, 52; drunken driving, 1; violation of road and driving laws, 5; violation parking regulations, 152; traffic laws, 9; prowlers and peeping toms, 5; all other offenses, not above, 8; total, 351.

Total persons arrested, 180; auto accidents reported, 48; injuries to auto accidents, 6. Thus far in the year 1,394 persons have been arrested; 579 automobile accidents have been reported resulting in 48 injuries and one death.

Fines and bail reported collected by the police judge for the month of August totaled \$589.59.

Additional reports included the following: Missing persons, 20; miscellaneous public, 17; department orders, 1; receipts, 8; lost animals, 2; found animals, 1; lost property, 3; impounded bike, 1; suspicious characters, 3; insane persons, 1; juveniles, 2; sick and injured cared for, 1; larceny, 2; breaking and entering, 2; wanted, 15; information, 1; escape, 2; impounded auto, 3; attempted breaking and entering, 1; bum check, 1; total, 94.

PERSHING ADVISES FULL ARMY POWER AS PREPAREDNESS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13 (AP)—General John J. Pershing urged today, on his 79th birthday, that congress provide funds at its coming special session "to carry the military establishment to its full peace strength."

Full strength would be 280,000 men in the regular army and 424,000 in the national guard. Since the war broke out in Europe, President Roosevelt has already ordered expansion of the army to 227,000 and the guard to 235,000.

The A. E. F. commander-in-chief said in a birthday statement to the press:

"I must again recall our deplorable situation when we entered the World war 22 years ago. Then not a single move had been made, from a military point of view, to prepare for it. That experience, with its costly lesson, I am happy to say, appears certain to be avoided in the event that we should again become involved in war."

The general issued his statement from Walter Reed hospital, where he is undergoing a periodic physical checkup and watching Europe's new war from his bed and easy chair.

The student congress went on record at their first meeting as approving a plan which will throw the bleachers open for the use of students, while the grandstands will be used exclusively by the townspeople.

Rules for Employers to Pay Internal Revenue Released

Commissioner of Internal Revenue Guy T. Helvering today announced the issuance of regulations in regard to the time when employers should report and pay over to collectors of internal revenue the employers' and employees' taxes with respect to the wages paid for services performed on and after January 1, 1939, by employees after they attain 65 years of age.

These taxes are imposed by subchapter A of chapter 3 of the Internal Revenue code, as amended, which subchapter supercedes title VIII of the Social Security act. The regulations are contained in Treasury Decision 4935 and are made necessary by a provision of an act dated August 10, 1939, known as the "Social Security Act Amendments of 1939," which provision eliminates the exemption of employees over 65 years of age and makes the taxes with respect to the wages of such employees retroactive to January 1, 1939, unless they are engaged in agricultural labor, domestic service or one of the other types of exempted occupations.

As a result of the amendment employers are now required to deduct from the wages paid to employees over age 65 for services performed by them on and after August 10, 1939, the date of enactment of the amendment, not only the one per cent employees' tax on those wages, but also employees' tax at the same rate on all taxable wages paid to such employees for services performed by them from January 1, 1939 through August 9, 1939, both dates inclusive. The employer is liable for all of such employees' tax collected by him.

LONG HIGHWAY PASSES DREAM STAGE, REPORT

The Pacific International highway, an Oregon-born project, has passed the dream stage and is assuming form, according to an announcement of the Oregon State Motor association.

North from Vancouver to Hazelton, Canada, as well as southward into far reaches of Mexico, the highway already has been built and is being used. On to Fairbanks, Alaska, is the present slogan, and a commission representing the United States and Canada have already agreed on major points.

Although the route is approximately four-fifths in Canada the United States expects to foot the major part of the bill. A road through or west of the coastal mountains would be terrifically expensive, but Uncle Sam needs the highway for national defense reasons, it is felt in Washington and thus willingly assumes a greater part of the cost, as advised by the war department.

It was on April 14, 1939, in Portland, that the Pacific International Highway association was formed, in response to a call issued by President E. R. McDaniel, of the Oregon State Motor association. Highway enthusiasts from several coastal cities responded to the association's call.

"We believed in the international highway then, both for its commercial and tourist possibilities, and we believe in it now," said President McDaniel. "Connecting the tips of the two American continents might have seemed visionary at one time, but no informed person doubts the wisdom and feasibility of the plan now. We'll have the tip-to-tip highway in a few years," he said.

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ARMY ENLISTMENTS REACH NEW PEAK

PRESIDIO OF SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 13 (AP)—Army enlistments in the Ninth Corps area, which comprises Oregon, Washington, Montana, Nevada, Idaho, Utah, California and Wyoming, amounted to 1,435, a record high, during the month of August, according to Major Chas. C. Quigley, corps area recruiting officer. Enlistments were heaviest in the San Francisco bay area. The previous record of 1,291 enlistments was established during July.

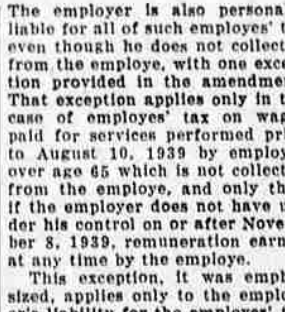
Of the total enlistments, 641 were original enlistments and 794 re-enlistments of men with previous army service. Approximately one-third of the men elected to serve with the infantry while the remainder were assigned to the other twelve branches of the army.

Most of the men selected stations in the Ninth Corps area but enlistments were also accomplished for service in other corps areas, the Panama Canal zone, Hawaii and the Philippine Islands, Major Quigley said.

With new authority for making enlistments and heavy air corps quotas for September, recruiting officers are anticipating a busy month. However, Major Quigley said he expects the number of qualified applicants for air corps service to far exceed the quotas and urges qualified men, interested in this service, to make application at the nearest army recruiting station without delay.

PLANS TO FEED 1000 MADE FOR BEEF BARBECUE

Plans to feed 1,000 hungry mouths at the annual barbecue planned as a highlight of the annual Junior Livestock and Baby Beef show sponsored by the Rotary club of Klamath Falls, were mapped Monday by a committee who visited the fairgrounds that day to look over the site.

The barbecue is slated for Monday, September 25, at 2:30 p. m. and admission to the big feed will be by presentation of invitation only. Those who will be invited to the barbecue include livestock show exhibitors, their families, members of Rotary and their wives and a few invited persons including stockmen of the county who have contributed to the success of the exhibition.

Last year 800 persons were fed within a space of 45 minutes. This year Rotarians say they have arranged to "turn the out of the chute" at a much faster pace and 1,000 persons are expected to be served within 40 minutes (time). Two serving lines will be prepared instead of one, speeding up the dinner service.

Joe Shirk has located several excellent beef for the barbecue and the usual accompanying dishes will be served up by the pound.

ARMAMENT RING SOUGHT IN S. F.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 13 (AP)—Federal officers are conducting extensive investigations. The Chronicle said today in an attempt to uncover "an armament ring of international proportions" which has been trying to sell more than \$5,000,000 worth of arms and munitions in violation of neutrality, customs and tax laws.

The Chronicle said it had learned from a "reliable source" that thousands of rifles, aerial bombs, cartridges, and shells had been stored in a cache in this section for several weeks.

Attempts have been made to dispose of them, the paper said, either to belligerent nations or to revolutionary parties in Central and South America. Several shipments already have been made. The paper said—many smuggled in cargoes of scrap metal Orient-bound.

The Chronicle said the federal bureau of investigation, the army and navy intelligence departments and the customs service have joined their forces in investigating this area as well as Los Angeles, New York and Mexico.

The asserted "ring," the paper said, "is linked with espionage activities of several foreign governments—and thus, attempting to bring about a legal sale of arms, the federal agencies are also dealing with powerful spy organizations."

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Markets and Financial

STOCKS TAKE ERRATIC PATH TO MIX LIST

NEW YORK, Sept. 13 (AP)—The stock market followed an erratic course today with some favored shares pushed 1 to 2 points higher at their best and others slipping with little support by about the same margin.

At the finish the list was very mixed. Trading was active and transfers approximated 4,000,000 shares.

Rails, utilities, rubbers, merchandising shares and specialties enjoyed demand most of the day but were inclined to drop away from their tops in the final hour.

Steels were subjected to penalizing from the opening on and while they managed some improvement were not given sufficient support for a lift. At times motors and aircrafts bid up a little.

The confused nature of the session reflected, brokers said, the bewilderment of traders who, anticipating some sort of business punch as a result of the conflict abroad, were chary about predicting its extent or the industries that might be benefitted.

The president's action in calling a special session of congress for September 21, earlier than had been expected, was followed by a slight boost based on the possibility of repeal of neutrality act, but it failed to hold.

Sober second thought was given to the idea that were the act to be ended, some form of profit restrictions might be adopted thus cutting the dividends that could be expected from our trade with the belligerents.
