CHANGES MADE IN CCC SETUP AT CAMP BLY

BLY—Many changes are taking place at Camp Bly company 266 of the CCC. These changes embrace personnel, the CCC setup, and the camp itself. Under the new plan the officers are classified as civilians, and not as reserve officers on active duty.

The senior officer at the Bly camp is Preston E. Rohner and his ranking is that of CCC company commander. Under this system of civilian appointments the second in command is called sub-alternate. At present this position is unoccupied, but an appointee will be assigned in the near future.

A new forest service office is being constructed which will be entirely separate from the army office. The two have been in rather cramped quarters up to this time.

Cleanup Underway

A program of general cleaning up is taking place. The buildings are being stained, roofs tarred, interiors are being painted and kerosined, and floors are being replaced. Sixteen brand new porcelain wash bowls are being installed replacing the old tin sink in the bathhouse.

Company 266 is out to regain the district zone flag, the emblem of the best kept company in the district. This flag was in possession of the Bly company several times about a year ago, and the enrollees want it again.

Ten enrollees are being discharged to continue their education in institutions of higher learning. Twenty-five will leave soon, due to the expiration of their enrollment period, which has now been limited to two years. Approximately 50 new enrollees will be recruited in Klamath, Jackson, Josephine and Multnomah counties, and these will build the company strength to about 175.

Side Camps Included

Four large side camps are part

of the local company. These are located at Pike's crossing on the Sycan river, Hanna Springs, Drew's creek, and Lakeview. There are also two five-man road crews out of the camp. These enrollees work under forest service foremen working on spring development, telephone line construction and maintenance, forest service buildings, fish planting and propagation, and some will take part in a deer count project.

Camp Bly has Dr. Coniah Bigelow as camp surgeon, and Jack L. Menard as educational adviser, and a program of health, work, education and recreation is being carried on. The camp has a library, recreational hall, camp exchange, photographic darkroom, recreation field, and shop. Frequent recreational tours are taken to points of scenic interest, and to entertainment centers. Company Commander Rohner mentions with pardonable pride that chicken dinner is served on Sunday.
