

# Seattle Evens Playoff Count With Los Angeles

## SOLONS BEAT SEALS SECOND TIME IN 10 INNING TILT

Los Angeles and Seattle were even today in their half of the past-season Bloughnessy playoffs in the Pacific coast baseball league, but Sacramento was two up on the San Francisco Seals.

A five-hit, three-run blast in the first inning helped the pennant-winning Seattle club to a 5 to 1 victory over the Angels at Seattle last night, while Sacramento won its second straight from the Seals at San Francisco, 5 to 4, in 10 innings.

Seattle's Les Webber had strong fielding support as he let the Angels down with only five hits, two of them in the sixth when Arnold Stutz drove in Lou Stringer with the sole Los Angeles tally.

The five-hit Seattle splurge in the opening frame drove Ray Prim from the hill. Jess Flores took over and pitched effectively the rest of the game. Prim and Flores together gave up 12 hits.

Art Garibaldi's single, an intentional walk, and double steal and Joe Orenzo's sacrifice fly to left scored the winning run for Sacramento in the 10th inning after the Seals had knotted the count at 4-4 with a three-run rally in the ninth.

## CARDS STILL HOLD CLOSE TO REDS IN FLAG DASH

Like the break of dawn, it's constantly becoming clearer that the National league pennant race isn't going to be decided until the Cincinnati Reds and St. Louis Cardinals come to grips in the waning hours of the season next week.

For days the two have been separated by the smallest of margins, unable to make a decisive gesture.

This situation was emphasized yesterday as Bucky Walters pitched the Reds to a 3-2 victory over the Phillies and the Redbirds swarmed over the Brooklyn Dodgers, 10-4, to maintain their stern vigil 2 1/2 games out of first place.

The day wasn't static throughout the circuit, however, because the Chicago Cubs lost to the New York Giants, 4-2, and saw their

last hope of repeating their 1928 pennant parade go glimmering. Carl Hubbell's hex put them ten games behind the leaders with only nine left to play.

The New York Yankees, their American league flag safely stowed away, showed no signs of letting down as they walloped the Chicago White Sox, 8-4, for Steve Sundra's 11th victory against no defeats.

Coupled with Cleveland's 7-2 triumph at Washington, this dropped the Pale Hose into fourth place. The Indians' victory was accomplished on a six-hit pitching performance by Mel Harder.

The St. Louis Browns meanwhile undermined the Boston Red Sox second place position with an 11-8 victory in 16 innings, the longest game of the year in the American league. Bob Harris worked nine innings in relief for the tail-enders with four-hit hurling and his teammates helped with a three-run outburst off Fritz Ostermueler as gathering darkness threatened to end the game.

The Philadelphia Athletics edged out the Detroit Tigers, 5-4, in another marathon which ended in the 13th inning when Catcher Frank Hayes tripped and raced home on an infield grounder.

Coach Jim Phelan said he wanted to check on the effectiveness of the early seasoning campaign in preparation for the Pittsburgh opening game here Sept. 30.

Phelan indicated after yesterday's scrimmage that nine lettermen had virtually clinched starting posts unless they suffer let-downs. A guard and tackle berth remained in doubt.

PULLMAN, Wash., Sept. 21 (AP) Coach Babe Hollingbery was ready today to write the name of a sophomore into the Washington State college starting lineup for the Saturday football opener with Gonzaga university.

The rookie was tow-headed Frank Oliver of Kennewick, who has been a standout at right half-back in the early seasons. Oliver was one of the "Lost Battalion" of sophomores who were ineligible last season.

Hollingbery's main chore for the day, however, was to pick a guard to replace the veteran, Don Knapp, who injured a shoulder in yesterday's scrimmage.
