NEUTRAL ACT REVISION FOR SAFETY ASKED

said, was repeal of the embargo, which forbids shipments of munitions to combatant nations, and a "return to international law."

The president took occasion, too, to renew his plea for non-partisanship during the present international crisis and to reassure the nation of his belief that America could keep from being embroiled in Europe's conflict.

"Let no man or group in any walk of life," the president said, "assume exclusive protectorate over the future well-being of America—because I conceive that regardless of the party or section the mantle of peace and of patriotism is wide enough to cover us all."

"Let no group assume the exclusive label of the peace 'bloc'. We all belong to it."

Mr. Roosevelt added that "in my candid judgment" the United States would "succeed in these efforts" to keep out of war.

When and if the embargo is scrapped, the president said there were other phases of policy "renewing American safety" that should be considered.

He listed: Restricting American merchant vessels, so far as possible, from entering danger zones.

Preventing American citizens from traveling on belligerent vessels.

Requiring foreign buyers to take transfer of title in this country to commodities bought by belligerents. (Cash and carry).

Preventing extension of war credits to belligerents.

Two other objectives, the chief executive said, have been attained amply under existing law. These are the regulation of collections of funds in this country for belligerents and the maintenance of a license system covering foreign trade in arms, ammunition and implements of war.

The president left to congress, however, a choice of methods by which these "safeguards" should be set up—"So long as the method chosen will meet the needs of new and changing day to day situations and dangers."

To those who say that this program would involve a step toward war on our part, the chief executive asserted: "I reply that it offers far greater safeguards than we now possess or have ever possessed to protect American lives and property from danger."

"It is a positive program for giving safety. This means less likelihood of incidents and controversies which tend to draw us into conflict, as they did in the last war."

"There lies the road to peace."

After relating steps already taken to strengthen the nation's defenses, Mr. Roosevelt said he saw no need for additional legislation nor for further executive action under his proclamation of a limited state of national emergency.

Mr. Roosevelt said the executive branch of the government had done its utmost, within a traditional policy of non-involvement, "to aid in averting the present appalling war."

"Having thus striven and failed," he said, "this government must lose no time or effort to keep the nation from being drawn into the war."

Here he predicted success "in these efforts."

Mr. Roosevelt said the disaster abroad was not of American making, but that "we find ourselves affected to the core, our currents of commerce are changing, our

minds are filled with new problems, our position in world affairs has already been altered."

A moment later he asserted: "Fate seems now to compel us to assume the task of helping to maintain in the western world a citadel wherein that civilization may be kept alive. The peace, the integrity and the safety of the Americas—these must be kept firm and serene."

Thus the president, for some of his audience, gave reassurances that the United States would stand firmly behind the Monroe doctrine.

His message also gave his backing to the neutrality proposals transmitted to congress at its last session by Secretary Hull.

Before Mr. Roosevelt drove to the capitol to address the congress called together only seven weeks after adjourning the regular session, 17 senators opposed to repeal of the arms embargo met to plan their strategy of opposition to revision of the neutrality act.

"perfect order and calm reigns throughout the country."

Immediately after the death of the premier a crown council was called by King Carol to meet the resultant crisis in Rumania's position in internal and international affairs. It was still sitting late today.

The British-French allies and Germany were engaged in a bitter struggle, each side attempting to influence Rumania's policy to their advantage. Calinescu had been known as an advocate of political and economic cooperation with Britain and France.

Rumania's oil, needed by Germany's mechanized army and air force, was the major prize. (In Budapest Rumanian diplomats said the slaying was "highly significant just at a moment when German and Russian troops are approaching Rumania's northern frontier.") Other Budapest sources said they believed a long-expected revolt of the iron guard had come.

The Rumanian legation in Belgrade said after vain attempts to telephone Bucharest that it looked as if the iron guard already was in charge.

The premier was driving in his car on Bucharest's main street, on his way to the royal palace, when he was shot.

His car was suddenly blocked, reportedly by three other machines. The three cars converged on that of the premier while a peasant cart blocked the road ahead.

One car drew alongside. Masked men jumped out and opened fire with sub-machine-guns. Calinescu slumped in his seat. Bullets had riddled his chest and abdomen from side to side. The shots were fired at 2:16 p. m. (4:16 a. m. PST). The premier's chauffeur was killed instantly. Calinescu was rushed to University hospital but died en route in a motor car.

Eight of the alleged assassins and accomplices have been arrested. The troops were called to surround their cells and public buildings and to guard against any attempt at a coup.

Thirty cartridge shells were found around Calinescu's car, indicating the slayers had fired wildly before hitting the premier. Police said six shots were found in his body. After the slaying, the assassins got into two waiting automobiles and sped to the radio station. There they shot the doorman in the leg and rushed past him into the building, tossing explosive rockets.

They broke into the announcer's room, and covered the announcer with their revolver while one man shouted into the microphone: "Premier Armand Calinescu has been shot by a group of iron guards."

The wounded doorman gave the alarm and police and troops surrounded the building, arresting

WARSAW RADIO SILENT AFTER SHELL BLASTS

told the outside world the "morale still is good."

BERLIN, Sept. 21 (AP)—The army high command reported today only four centers of resistance to Nazi forces remained in Poland and Germans expected they would fall without shelling.

The command's belief the remaining resistance was negligible already had been indicated by the departure for the western front of Col. Gen. Walther von Brauchitsch, commander of the German army, to assume direction of the struggle against Britain and France.

The points still held by Poles, a high command communique said, included: 1. Warsaw, besieged capital of Poland. 2. Modlin, fortified center 18 miles northwest of Warsaw. 3. Gora Kalvarja, on the left bank of the Vistula 23 miles southeast of Warsaw. 4. On the Hel peninsula, narrow finger of land poking out into the gulf of Danzig. Its extremity is 19 miles northeast of Danzig.

German officers indicated no lightning strokes against these centers were planned, but rather, since they are surrounded, that the feeling is time will work for Germany and the Poles will surrender.

One of the generals in Reichsfuehrer Hitler's entourage, discussing the situation of Warsaw, said on Tuesday: "Our fuhrer does not think it worth while to risk the life of a single German soldier to take Warsaw. Cut off on all sides it has no alternative save to surrender."

"Why, then, should we shell it and give food—though unjustified—to anti-German propaganda?"
