

REDS HELD TO TWO HITS FOR RECORD GAME

was difficult to read the scoreboard from the stands back of the plate.

Crossetti let the count reach two and one then dumped a single in short left center, the ball just sailing over Myers' outstretched glove.

Crossetti was nearly picked off first by Lombardi's fast throw but just got back to the bag in time.

Rolfe bounced the ball to Walters who threw to Myers at second, forcing Crossetti but Myers peg to first was too late to catch Rolfe and he was safe on the fielder's choice.

Frey took Keller's hot grounder and stepped on second forcing Rolfe. Keller was safe on first as there was no play there.

DiMaggio backed Berger almost to the gate in front of the Yankee bullpen in deep left for his long fly.

No runs, one hit, no errors, one left.

Second Inning Reds: DiMaggio trotted into left center to take McCormick's loft.

Lombardi fouled off five pitches then sent a long fly to Selkirk deep in left center.

The Reds were lined up on the steps of their bullpen intent on the game while the Yankees as usual sat back on the bench and enjoyed the proceedings.

Craft worked the count to two and two then fanned swinging at a low breaking curve.

No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Second Inning Yankees: Dickey received a nice hand as he came to bat, apparently as a reward for his ninth-inning single which won yesterday's game.

Dickey was called out on strikes on three pitches as Walters worked the corners beautifully.

Selkirk dropped a Texas league single in short center but was out at second trying to stretch it, Craft to Myers.

Craft pulled down Gordon's fly in center.

No runs, one hit, no errors, none left.

Third Inning Reds: Except for the far reaches of the upper deck in left field, the stands were comfortably filled all around the park by this time.

Berger shot a long fly to Selkirk in left.

Myers was called out on three strikes, Pearson fooling him for the third strike on a drop that broke across the knees.

Rolfe took Walters' bouncer near third and threw hit, out easily.

No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Third Inning Yankees: Dahlgren's liner bounced safely in left field and into the left field boxes for a ground rule two-base hit.

Pearson laid down a nice sacrifice bunt and was thrown out, Walters to McCormick, Dahlgren going to third.

Myers momentarily tumbled Crossetti's grounder but recovered.

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in time to throw him out at first, Dahlgren scoring with the first run of the game.

Rolfe's fly fell safely in short right center between Craft and Goodman for a single and the crowd whooped it up as the Yankees appeared to be on their way.

Keller's high fly bounced off Berger's glove in the left field corner and fell safely for a two-base hit, Rolfe scoring.

DiMaggio topped the ball down the third base line and beat it out safely for a hit, Keller going to third. Walters picked up the ball but was unable to make a play at either base.

Dickey bounced a single through Frey scoring Keller and sending DiMaggio to third.

There was considerable activity in the Reds' bullpen.

Frey made a nice play on Selkirk's bouncer deep on the infield dirt and threw him out.

Three runs, five hits, no errors, two left.

Fourth Inning Reds: After taking two strikes, Werber walked as Pearson lost his control on four straight pitches.

He was the first of the Reds to reach first base in the game.

The Cincinnati cheering section howled lustily as Frey watched three balls go by. Then he fanned, swinging at a fast ball and Werber, attempting to steal on the play, was doubled off second, Dickey to Crossetti on a fast play.

Goodman went down swinging at a fast ball outside for a third strike, thereby completing eight and two-thirds innings in a row including the latter half of yesterday's game in which the Reds had failed to hit safely.

No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Fourth Inning Yankees: Werber made a nice play on Gordon's bouncer and threw him out in a close decision at first base.

Dahlgren's long fly sailed over Berger's glove and into the left field boxes for a home run, the first of the series. The ball bounced into the boxes and then back onto the playing field as Dahlgren trotted around the bases and the fans roared.

Pearson was called out on strikes.

Crossetti topped the ball about four feet in front of the plate and Lombardi threw him out at first by a good margin.

One run, one hit, no errors, none left.

Fifth Inning Reds: McCormick fanned, swinging at an inside pitch. He was Pearson's fifth strikeout victim, third in a row.

Lombardi bounced to Pearson and was thrown out by 15 feet.

With the count three and two, Craft went down swinging for the second time in the game.

No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Fifth Inning Yankees: Frey picked up Rolfe's roller and threw him out on a fast play.

Keller's second straight hit was a line single to left.

DiMaggio smashed a bouncer to Walters who threw to Myers, forcing Keller, and Myers pegged to McCormick in time to retire DiMaggio for a snappy double play.

No runs, one hit, no errors, none left.

Sixth Inning Reds: The ball hit Berger's bat as he tried to duck away from a pitch and it bounced to Pearson who threw him out.

Crossetti came up with Myers' fast hopper and tossed him out. Walters received a nice hand as he came to the plate.

Walters bounced out, Pearson to Dahlgren.

No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Sixth Inning Yankees: Goodman backed up against the low wall in front of the right field stands to haul down Dickey's long fly.

Selkirk fouled off four pitches and Lombardi walked half way to the mound to confer with Walters. Selkirk then was called out on strikes as he watched a knee-high inside pitch go by. He stood at the plate arguing with Umpire Beans Reardon for a few moments and the fans booed.

Seventh Inning Reds: DiMaggio raced over to deep right center and took in Werber's high fly.

Dahlgren trotted in to the infield grass in front of first and took Frey's soaring pop up.

DiMaggio raced 50 yards across center for a fine catch of Goodman's fly and the Reds were still without a hit for the ball game.

No pitcher has ever hurled a no-hit game in world series competition.

No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Seventh Inning Yankees: Dahlgren went down swinging at a low-breaking curve. He was Walters' third straight strikeout victim.

As Pearson came to bat the fans applauded for a full minute. Myers raced onto the outfield grass back of third and took Pearson's pop up.

Myers had to race back into short left center to pull down Crossetti's loft.

No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Eighth Inning Reds: Selkirk ran over to left center and took McCormick's high fly and the stands roared.

Lombardi smashed the first pitch on a line over second base for a single and the first Cincinnati hit not only of the ball game but in 12 straight innings. Frenchy Bordagaray was sent in to run for Lombardi.

In holding the Reds hitless for 7 1/3 innings, Pearson it developed had equalled the world series record for such a performance set by Herb Pennock of the Yankees against the Pirates in 1927.

Craft went down swinging for his third straight strikeout of the game.

Berger topped the ball along the first base line and Pearson raced in, took it, and threw him out.

No runs, one hit, no errors, one left.

Eighth Inning Yankees: Willard Hershberger, a right-hand batter and a former member of the Yankee farm system at Newark in the International league, was sent in to catch for Cincinnati in place of Lombardi.

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Bizarre Story of Sudden Wealth Unfolded in North

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 5 (Canadian Press)—A bizarre story of an apparently poor man who suddenly found riches hidden within his own home—a story of dramatic tragedy and brutal killing—unfolded today in the police investigation of the bludgeoning to death of 75-year-old George Gray.

Gray's body was found in the humble home where Detective Supt. W. G. Grant disclosed that the retired sawmill worker had been enriched by \$7000 his wife had hidden before her death—hidden in old corsets, a mattress, in clothing, in books.

Authorities reported they had failed to find a single tangible clue to Gray's alibi in questioning scores of acquaintances since his brutally beaten body was found. They said \$1350 was unaccounted for out of \$2000 he had drawn from the bank in recent months on checks issued for "cash."

While Gray's death was one of stark brutality, his wife's death was tinged with tragic drama against a background of a fortune under the death bed. It was one his wife had hoarded, apparently from the earnings of his balmy days as a millworker.

The Grays lived in comparative poverty for many years.

Then—as related by Superintendent Grant—last February 10 the invalid woman propped herself up in bed and said in feeble voice: "George, we have lived happily. There is something I want to tell you..."

"Never mind that now," the one-time sawyer interrupted. "You just lie back there and rest."

Mrs. Gray lay back and rested. Fifteen minutes later she was dead.

After two weeks alone, Gray asked a neighbor woman, Mrs. Mary Maddison, to help him clean the cottage.

In a pair of old corsets, Mrs. Maddison found old Canadian currency sewed into inside pockets. A board of \$20 gold pieces was found in the mattress of the bed on which the Grays had slept for years.

A search of the house disclosed \$4,000, hidden in books, in Mrs. Gray's clothing and in other caches.

The widower began to draw upon his new reserve. Officers said he spent \$50 of the \$2000 drawn out in cash, on a trip with friends
