PERMITS FOR THREE HOMES START MONTH

Three new home builders were granted permits as the opening week of October gave promise of a good all-around building month according to Henry Schortgen, city building inspector.

WEATHER FORECAST INDEFINITE FOR OREGON AREAS

Klamath county was in for an unsettled weekend with every possible forecast in the weatherman's vocabulary used for Saturday and Sunday.

With rain in the north portion, clear and bright in the south portion, snow over the mountains and possible frost, local residents could prepare for anything. Pheasant hunters were hoping for a bright, clear day inasmuch as Sunday of last week which happened to be the opening day on birds, was a cold drizzly one and few had luck in bringing home the limit.

Local thermometers fell to 35 degrees in some parts of the city and in others the mercury was recorded at 34 degrees, just two degrees above freezing.

Many Oregon fields were white with harvest frosts but Baker's 27-degree minimum, Bend's 26-degree, and Lakeview's 32 were the only freezing temperatures reported in the state. It is understood that with the setting in of the fall season, the government discontinued its fire weather forecasts for the forested regions.

BONANZA CAMP TO BE MOVED

VANCOUVER, Wash., Oct. 7 (AP)—Three CCC companies stationed in the Fort Lewis district and one in the Medford district will be transferred to the Vancouver district by Nov. 15, CCC headquarters here announced last night.

Companies 219, 3270 and 252 will move to Vancouver district locations, along with Company 5487, now at Bonanza, Ore., which will go to Bear Creek, Ore.

INSTALLATION OF PIPE NEAR FINISH

Work is nearing completion on a water extension project for Copco along Lakeshore drive, it was made known Saturday at the
