COMPLAINANT HELD ON DRUNK CHARGE

A 22-year-old man, Clyde Wilson, who said he had been here but a short time, was arrested by city police and charged with being drunk and disorderly after he had appeared at the police station to report an assault.

Wilson appeared before Acting Police Judge Jerry Thomas and was sentenced to \$50 and 30 days in the city jail. In the meantime officers are investigating the youth's record.

According to Chief of Police Frank Hamm a report was received from Herschel Hadley that a man had been peeping into his windows on Michigan avenue. Hadley told officers he followed the man and lost him up town. He then walked to the police station and gave a description of the peeping Tom.

Later the man is alleged to have knocked on the door of the Kenneth Clark home on North Fifth street, and told Mrs. Clark that "a bank had been robbed." The Clarks later advised police of the incident. According to Chief Hamm, young Wilson was identified both as the peeping Tom and the caller at the Clark residence.

Wilson is understood to have relatives in Dorris.

Lewis Supports Neutrality Change

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10 (AP)—John L. Lewis supported President Roosevelt's neutrality program in remarks at the opening of the second annual convention of the Congress of Industrial Organizations here today.

"The president's program upon neutrality should be supported by the congress and by the people and cavilling should cease," said Lewis, president of the CIO.

"The wording of the neutrality act, the classification of commodities and lethal weapons and the question of credit or non-credit to purchasers are questions, which compared to the issue of peace or war, are of secondary importance."

COUNCIL PONDERES SUNDAY DANCING

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It was thought possible the amendment, if it stands would be vetoed by the mayor, but there was a stronger possibility it would never reach that stage. It all came about because New Year's eve occurs on Sunday this year.

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Youths From 16 to 24 Lead Criminality, Says Speaker

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10 (UP)—Youths between the age of 16 and 21 years contribute more than any other age group to criminality involving serious offenses against property, which dominate among felonies, O. W. Wilson, professor of police administration at the University of California, said last night.

Wilson, speaking to the international police congress convention, said youth "doubles its expected quota in robberies and thefts, troubles it in burglaries and nearly quadruples it in auto thefts."

Wilson, former police chief at Wichita, Kan., said federal bureau of investigation statistics for the first six months of 1939 show that more 19-year-old boys were arrested than any other group.

Figures showing that in 1937 out of 63,522 sentences passed in the United States, a total of 12,188 were for crimes committed by persons under the age of 21 years, were read by Wilson.

Wilson also cited statistics showing that in 52 municipalities arrests for homicide, robbery, rape, burglary, assault, larceny and automobile thefts for the 16-20 age group totaled 1,639 as compared with only 955 for the 21-year age group, the next largest.

Most states have no provisions for legal machinery to handle the young criminal, Wilson said, pointing out that "as children grow beyond the juvenile court age they go into the adult machinery, are sent to penal institutions and the great majority commit some new crime shortly after release."

The youth of from 16-21 years of age "considers himself both tough and smart," Wilson said, adding that "in some cases he is prepared to prove both to the forces of law and order."

Memorial Trophy Awarded For Safe Air Unit Work

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—Lieutenant Commander Rufus C. Young, Jr., a native of Lawrence, Kans., will have custody during the coming year of the Rear Admiral William A. Moffett memorial trophy, symbol of the highest safety record for operation of ship-based naval aviation units during the past fiscal year.

Lt. Cmdr. Young was senior aviator during the year of the aviation unit aboard the battleship Tennessee, which won the trophy, and under the rules of the award, it will remain aboard the Tennessee until won by another unit.

The trophy, a large silver plaque mounted on a walnut base, is awarded annually to the battleship or cruiser-based aviation unit which flies the greatest number of hours with the fewest injuries to personnel and least damage to material. Forty six units were in competition for the trophy during 1939.

The plaque was purchased in 1936 from voluntary contributions of naval aviators in memory of Rear Admiral Moffett, former chief of the bureau of aeronautics and a leader in the development of naval aviation.

Previous winners were the battleships California and Texas and the cruiser Northampton.

Lt. Cmdr. Young was born in Lawrence, August 13, 1900, and was appointed to the naval academy from Oregon in 1920. After graduation from the academy in 1924, he served on the USS New Mexico until 1926, when he was assigned to the Pensacola, Fla., naval air station for instruction. He has served with aircraft

Fog Delays Hunt For Lost Plane

TACOMA, Oct. 10 (AP)—A low hanging fog over southwest Washington stalemated today aerial efforts to locate two fliers missing since yesterday on a flight from Spokane to Fort Lewis.

Four army planes remained earth bound at Gray field, Fort Lewis, while three national guard planes scheduled to fly here from Spokane to aid in the search were held up until weather cleared.

Missing in a Washington national guard plane are Lieut. Edward B. Saxton, 23, of Spokane, 41st national guard aviation pilot, and Private W. Shane of Hamilton Field, Calif., who was being transferred to Gray Field.

POTATO FORECAST SLIGHTLY LOWERED

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years, 1928-37, was 2,309,674,000 bushels.

The combined wheat crop was forecast a month ago at 736,115,000 bushels; production was 930,801,000 bushels last year and the 10-year average production was 752,952,000 bushels.

Winter wheat production was put at 550,710,000 bushels, compared with 686,537,000 bushels last year, and 560,160,000 bushels, the 10-year average.

Spring wheat, including durum, totaled 188,735,000 bushels, compared with a forecast of 185,405,000 bushels a month ago, 244,164,000 produced last year, and 192,792,000, the 10-year average.

Durum wheat production was estimated at 33,144,000 bushels, compared with last month's forecast of 32,552,000, last year's production of 40,445,000, and the 10-year average production of 35,076,000.

A 542,250,000 bushel oat crop was predicted. This compared with a forecast of 529,368,000 last month, 1,053,839,000 produced last year, and 1,049,300,000, the 10-year average.
