

AUTHOR-PREACHER TO SPEAK SUNDAY

Klamath Falls will shortly have the rare opportunity of hearing an internationally famous man, when Dr. Richard Ellsworth Day, author and preacher, will begin a brief series of Bible studies at the First Presbyterian church. Dr. Day is best known as the author of "Bushy Aesop," the life of Dwight L. Moody, and "Under the Broad Aisle," a corresponding life of the celebrated Charles H. Spurgeon, as well as several other volumes. He is the pastor of the Hamilton Square Baptist church, San Francisco.

On two different occasions Dr. Day delivered the daily Bible studies before the northern convention of the Baptist church in Oregon and this past August supplied the pulpit at the Hinson Memorial church of Portland.

"Some three years ago," says the pastor of the First Presbyterian church, "an invitation was extended Dr. Day by the churches of the city to lead in a city-wide evangelistic mission. This was before the coming of Dr. James Rayburn. But at the time Dr. Day was scheduled for a series of meetings in London, England, and so he declined the request for his services. Ever since that time various efforts have been made to have Dr. Day visit Klamath Falls. Through the efforts of certain laymen and others, in particular E. W. Merriam, he finally consented to come to this city. The dates set are Tuesday, October 17, and Sunday, October 22. The good people of other churches are most cordially invited to share in this feast of good things."

It is understood that Emanuel Baptist church, the Rev. Clarence Orr, pastor, will unite with the local Presbyterian body in this series of Bible studies, or Bible conference. Other pastors have also expressed great interest in the coming of Dr. Day. Efforts were made to have Dr. Day for two Sundays, but this was found to be impossible. Hence the beginning of the series on Tuesday.

DEMAND FOR OREGON LABOR LAID TO WAR

PORTLAND, Oct. 13 (AP)—The CIO and AFL attributed the first substantial labor demand in two or three years today to the European war, the threat of more war and general business improvement since last year's recession.

The Teamsters union with a membership of several thousand cleared its hiring hall twice within a week. Not more than 80 of its members are without jobs. The machinists' organization reported the "best conditions in two years," primarily because of railroad activity and employment at Seattle's Boeing aircraft plant.

The Holtermakers' union exhausted its list of 500 to 600 workers with jobs in Oregon, Idaho and Vancouver, Wash. The Office Employees' union spokesman said no bonafide member was without a job and the big culinary joint council had only 5 per cent of its membership idle.

All members of the Electricians union are at work compared with 150 idle a year ago. Because of the demand for workers by the Bonneville project, Northwestern Electric and Portland General

Electric, the union has issued work permits to provide extra hands. A number of carpenters are unemployed but Grand Coulee dam has placed a standing order for men who can pass physical examinations.

Although lumber unions have a jobless list, many said more men were at work than in 1938. The cabinet makers revealed 500 members at work against only 150 last year.

Other unions reporting increased activity included the longshoremen, painters, furniture workers, plywood and building trades.
