Talent on Hand But TCU Lacks Former Power

DALLAS, Oct. 13 (AP) — Something vital is missing from Texas Christian's football team. Not so much the physical presence of Davey O'Brien, Ki Aldrich and the rest of those undefeated 1938 workmen, but more likely their drive and spirit.

Talent is still at hand. The Christians, a surging power that never stood still last year, are still a good football team. They have lost their first two games, but only by a total of five points.

Statistically, TCU is still a power. Against UCLA and Arkansas the Christians moved around for 32 first downs and 636 yards from scrimmage while the enemy managed only 23 first downs and 416 yards. The old aerial game that winged them to national supremacy last season hasn't faltered.

Not when they completed 33 of 64 passes in both games and actually gained 287 yards by air against Arkansas.

Where does the trouble lie? Coach Leo "Dutch" Meyer, tugging his hat brim after Arkansas scrapped back in the fourth period and pulled out a 14-13 victory, muttered:

"I'm afraid they outgrew us. I had no complaints after the UCLA game. The boys played fine football. But against Arkansas — yes, they outgrew us." (UCLA won 7-3).

OREGON SPORTS NOTES

The northwest football coach whose professional pet seems at the moment to be in greatest danger is James Phelan. His Washington team was humbled severely by Pittsburgh passes and run to exhaustion by UCLA's Messrs. Kenny Washington and Robinson.

Up where the breeze blows fresh off Puget Sound Jimmy's friends predict he will ditch Washington before Washington ditch him.

The campus grapevine says he is in solid where it counts most — with the regents — and is not at all disliked by the faculty and has a measure of support from the students, despite last year's unhappy season and this year's unpromising one.

"Unofficially," Phelan is quoted in one journal north of the Columbia river, "I have been named 933 times, which makes me a lifetime member of the Salmon Packers, local No. 494. Incidentally that does not include the time they tried to burn down the fieldhouse at Purdue to get rid of me."

An examination of the records shows that the greying Irishman has won prior to this year 49 games, lost 26 and tied eight since he took over from Enoch Hargshaw at the end of the wonderful '29. Included in the 49 wins are five in the last five years from Southern California. Almost every

one of them came at a time when the wolves were in full voice. The victories seemed to silence the pack. Not since 1934 has Phelan had to walk across the gridiron to shake hands with Howard Jones. Whatever he has failed to do, he has made Troy's chieftain take no less than five of those painful strolls. Phelan also put one club in the Rose Bowl and has won the cross-state game with Washington State — another engagement they take seriously in Seattle — for the last three years.

One of Phelan's champions in the fourth estate lays the recurring demand for his dismissal to Phelan's aloof manner. His independence, his refusal to accede to the outside demands made on a major-college coach. Now, they say, he has changed. All of a sudden he has dropped his detached manner. He is becoming a pal to the players, making more speeches to the service clubs and mingling freely with the downtown quarterbacks. The alumni growls have been slower to start this season and some of the boys in Seattle say he can preserve his \$10,000 job if he breaks even.

And if he doesn't win half of them and should finally be chased away from Lake Washington his supporters predict he will pop up somewhere in California where again according to his Seattle backers — everybody, especially the Los Angeles, likes him very much.
