

AAA PAYMENTS MADE TO 11 IN KLAMATH BASIN

The first 1939 AAA payments made in Oregon have been distributed to eleven Klamath county farmers. Compliance checkup, started earlier this year, enabled preparation and forwarding of forms to the state office at Corvallis ahead of the flood of applications from other counties.

A large number of applications are being held in the county office pending signatures. Farmers who put off signing these forms may have to wait longer for checks to return, according to Wayne Fisk, assistant agricultural conservation association secretary. Notice is mailed to association members when the applications have been prepared. Farmers should visit the office to affix signatures as soon as convenient after receiving notice, Fisk stated.

Final 1940 wheat acreage allotments have been mailed out with a form which all wheat growers must sign and file at the county office before October 31. In order to be eligible for 1940 payments, wheat growers have a choice of two plans in 1940 and are required to indicate their choice on the form mailed to them.

The allotment option requires that no more than the allotted wheat acreage be seeded. A payment of 18 to 25 cents a bushel will be made on the yield established for that acreage. Overplanting the allotment results in rather severe deductions from the total farm payment. Other grains or a mixture of wheat and other grains may be substituted on additional land.

The other choice is that of the "usual" or average acreage of wheat on which the wheat acreage allotment is based. This choice carries no wheat payment but permits a larger acreage of wheat for grain without deductions against potato or soil-building payments. The "usual" acreage may be grown for grain and an additional acreage of wheat may be grown for hay.

Growers who have received no notification of the establishment of wheat allotments for their farms may grow a total of 10 acres of wheat without incurring deductions. No forms need to be signed in such cases.

Crop insurance is again available. October 30 is the last date on which applications for insurance on winter wheat may be accepted. Very little winter wheat is grown in Klamath county because winter wheat heads early and there is danger of frost damage in the bloom stage.

The elections of community committee-men and delegates to the county conventions for the selection of the county committees will be held in all Oregon counties on Friday, October 27. The officers chosen will be responsible for the administration of the 1940 AAA program in the counties. Klamath county agricultural conservation members will be notified of polling places.

DECORATIONS HUNG FOR IWA CONCLAVE

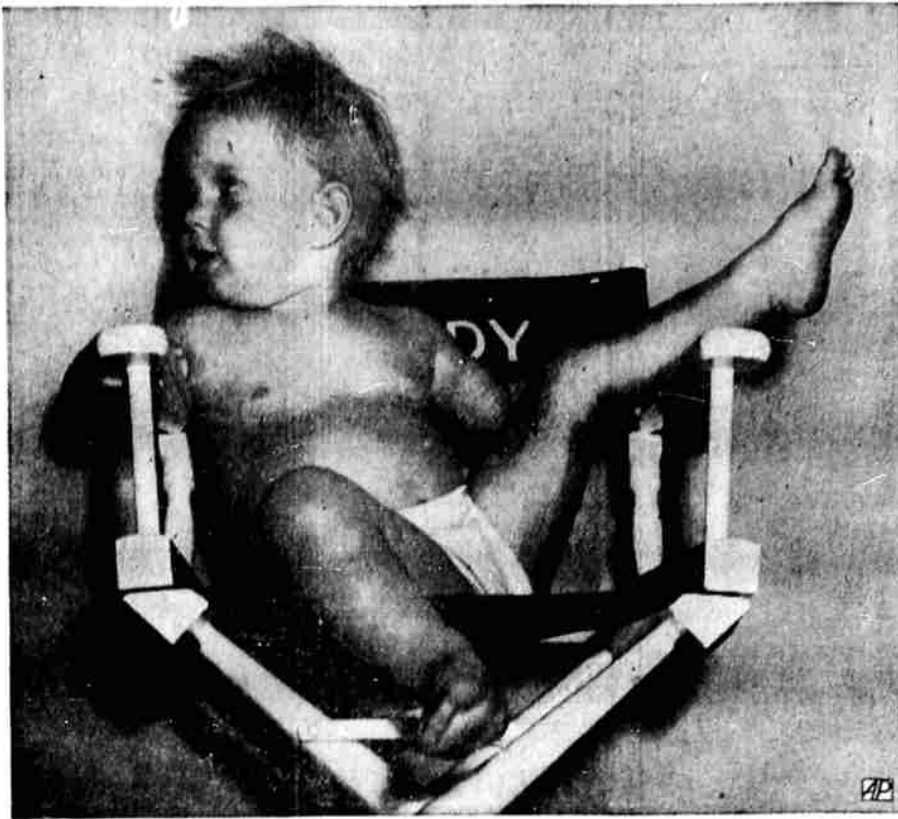

SELBY GIVEN GOOD CHANCE FOR RECOVERY

John Selby, sales manager of Turner Chevrolet company, was given more than a 50-50 chance to recover from injuries received Monday in an automobile accident, according to word Friday from St. Charles hospital in Bend.

Selby suffered a fractured left hip, crushed chest, three ribs were torn loose from the neck, severe lacerations of the neck and face, and his scalp was torn completely loose from the forehead to the crown, according to his employer, A. A. Turner, who has just returned from Bend.

It is understood that Selby was driving the car at the time of the crash. F. M. Metcalf of Falls City, driver of the second car, recovered consciousness Friday and has a chance to recover, it was said.

Funeral services for Marion House, who died Wednesday afternoon from injuries received in the crash, will be held at Yuba City, Calif., early next week.
