BEET HARVEST SEES INCREASE ON TULE LAKE

TULELAKE.—Beet harvest in the Tule lake basin will be at its peak next week, according to Clark G. Fensler, local representative for the Spreckels Sugar company who stated Thursday that early fields harvested have yielded an average of 16 tons per acre, slightly above last year's yield. The sugar content of 17 per cent is a bit above last year's record. The crop is being loaded at Tulelake to be shipped to Nantec, Calif., for grinding. Satisfaction is expressed by the growers and the crop, first grown here two or three years ago as an experiment has passed that stage to be included as one of the coming crops of the basin.

HUGE TREE FOUND IN LAVA DISTRICT

In the Modoc lava beds north of the old Lava ranger station, a Ponderosa pine tree of special interest was recently cut during logging operations on a government sale. Trees growing in the rough lavas are usually stunted but this one evidently tapped a water supply which accounted for a growth of well over 100 feet high and 40 inches in diameter in a period of 145 years. This is twice the growth of other trees in the same area. The tree grew in diameter 16 inches in the first 40 years, and increased to 30 inches by the time it was 80 years old. Six logs, 16 inches in length, were obtained from this tree and the total log scale was 2660 board feet. The growth increased at the rate of 18 board feet per year.
