PELICANS UNPOLISHED;
SOX POINT FOR FLAG

Klamath shook off the tie jinx Friday night with an impressive score over Ashland, but the Pelicans will need considerable polishing up before they are ready to meet Medford in the conference main event next weekend.

The Ashland game showed loose playing and lack of finesse, despite the fact that the Pelicans were able to steam-roller the Ashland team at will. It was a matter of individual playing to a great extent and the scoring drives centered on the brilliant broken field running of Anacker, Rush and Christiansen. Of course power in the line accounted for wide holes in the Grizzly wall which enabled these runners to break away.

Surprise of the game was the work of Christiansen, substitute fullback, who displayed a ball-packing technique nearly as good as Anacker or Rush. In fact his technique was a combination of Anacker's swivel-bipped broken field style and Rush's line plunging. Christiansen looked exceptionally good, despite the fact that he's only a yearling. Give him time and he'll make them all sit up and take notice.

The calling of penalties was exceptional, and gave rise to ill feeling among the fans, although Joe Grey and his fellow officials apparently had good cause for every penalty. The game is slowed considerably by such a technical style of officiating, however. Results are better all around when the players are allowed a little more freedom.

The Pelicans were hitting the lighter Ashlanders hard and playing for keeps, which accounted for the large number of injuries.

The Northern California league pennant will be at stake when Klamath's Red Sox meet the McCloud Loggers Sunday afternoon at the fairgrounds, but Klamath will go into the fray on even terms because of the fact that five St. Mary's players have been deleted from the McCloud lineup.

Along with O'Neill, stellar hurler who pitched his teammates into the finals, Simms, Cardozo, Lingua and Burns will be unable to take part in the contest, according to word received here from St. Mary's, where the boys are enrolled this winter. It seems that too many trips away from the campus put the skills under their league playoff hopes, and they are being kept after school.

Carpenter, incidentally, plays football for the frosh at Cal, and pitched for Franco's Market and the San Mateo Blues of the Peninsula league this season. He's good in the pinches, as is demonstrated by the fact that he allowed 14 Klamath runners to die on base last Sunday and came through with nine strikeouts.

The Loggers will probably miss O'Neill next Sunday, and the Sox are pointing for their first league pennant since they entered the Northern California league three years ago.

KUHS PUNCHES TO 39 TO 0 VICTORY FOR LEAGUE START

Rolling up scores almost at will to completely dominate a loosely played game, the Klamath Pelicans opened their conference schedule in a Friday the 13th contest on Modoc field by defeating Ashland high 39 to 0, decisively breaking a three-game tie jinx.

The heavier Pelicans tore the Ashland line to pieces on scrimmage plays and criss-crossed the field with long and sweeps. Only twice did Ashland threaten, once at the opening kickoff when a Grizzly player recovered a Klamath fumble on the Pelican 10-yard line, and again late in the last period when Smith gathered in another Pelican muf on the Klamath 34. Both attempts bogged down when Grizzly passes failed to connect.

Long gains by Bob Anacker, Pelican left half, Rush, fullback, and Christiansen, substitute full,

marked the game. All three slashed through the line to break away time and again.

Statistically, Klamath Falls held a heavy margin. The Pelicans' net gain was 321 yards, compared with 13 for Ashland.

Klamath Falls was penalized repeatedly, long gains being called back for pushing, unnecessary roughness, holding and offside. Klamath's total loss from penalties was the full length of the field, an even 100 yards.

At the start Ashland was placed in position to score by the Pelican fumble but lacked the drive to push the ball over from the 10-yard stripe. The Grizzlies advanced to the eight, where three successive passes failed, giving the Pelicans the ball.

Rush stood back of the line and booted a beautiful 60-yard punt which pulled his teammates out of the hole nicely and gave Ashland the ball in their own territory. The Klamath Falls scoring parade started immediately after Ashland, unable to advance, returned the kick.

Anacker squirmed six yards through the line, Salsbery picked up two on a quarterback sneak, and then Anacker broke away for the prettiest gain of the contest. Sweeping around right end, he raced for the sideline, broke through four tacklers, and cut back smartly for a long slant to the Ashland eight yard marker. From there Rush scored the first touchdown on a long end sweep. Anacker's kick was wide and the score stood 6-0.

Wilson's kickoff for Ashland was short, traveling only 14 yards, and the ball changed hands three times in midfield. Then Anacker intercepted a wild Grizzly pass from Herrin and raced 24 yards, adding 18 more on the next play to put the ball on the one-yard line. The quarter ended and on the first play of the second period Rush scored through the line. This time Anacker's kick was good.

On the kickoff, Ashland's fullback criss-crossed the ball to Warren for a net gain of 20 yards, but passes failed to connect and the Grizzlies kicked.

Christiansen opened his brilliant series of gains by twisting the ball back 20 yards on receiving the punt, and on the next play traveled down the field for a 27-yard gain to be tackled by the heels on the 12-yard stripe. Ramos put the ball on the one foot line, and Christiansen scored. Hopkins kicked the point to run the score to 20-0.

Klamath Falls was set back on two penalties as the ball changed hands again in midfield. Silver, Ashland captain who sparked the Grizzlies on defense, was injured and taken out of the game.

The Pelicans again started a scoring drive, with long gains by Lowe and Ramos, but three times the gains were nullified by penalties. The half ended after Lowe fumbled a punt and recovered on the 25.

The second half opened with Rush picking up 28 yards through right tackle, and scoring on the next play to bring the tally to 27 to 0.

Still another score came on a neatly executed lateral and forward pass. Rush received a toss from Salsbery and heaved a long pass to Love, who gathered in the ball in the end zone with no interference. Anacker's kick hit the cross bar and fell back, to leave the score 33-0.

Early in the fourth period

Anacker reeled off 25 yards through right tackle, placing the ball in scoring position on the Ashland 15. Anacker carried it to the five, where the Pelicans were set back by a five-yard offside penalty. Rush made the final touchdown with another of his sweeping end runs, and this time Anacker's kick was blocked.

The last Ashland threat came after Smith recovered Ramos' fumble on the Klamath 34. Jandreau, Grizzly left half, picked up nine yards on a wide end sweep. Bostwick lost four yards, then picked up one. On the next play Jandreau's long pass, intended for Rush, was incomplete, and Klamath took possession on the 26 yard stripe. The game ended after an exchange of punts.

Three thousands fans were entertained during the half by an exhibition staged by Klamath high and the Chiloquin high school band, who were guest entertainers.

Rooks Defeat Oregon Frosh

PORTLAND, Oct. 14 (AP)—Two blocked punts and one sustained offense brought the Oregon State Rook football team three touchdowns last night and a 19-0 victory over the University of Oregon Frosh.

After Reddin of Bend had scored from the one-yard line in the first period and Wickett of Aberdeen had converted, the Rooks snatched touchdown No. 2 in the second quarter when Wickett blocked an Oregon punt on the Ducklings' 25-yard line and Fox of Milton-Freewater scooped up the ball and ran over the goal line. Clement blocked a punt in the fourth quarter and OSC got the ball on the Oregon 4-yard line from where the Rooks scored in three plays.

The Rooks made 171 yards from scrimmage to the Ducklings 101 but Oregon made 7 first downs to Oregon State's 6.

Gonzaga Beats Vandals, 19-0

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 14 (AP)—Employing bewildering razzle-dazzle plays, Gonzaga university's Bulldogs yesterday swamped the University of Idaho, 19 to 0, in a non-conference football game.

Gonzaga scored once in the opening period and twice in the second, and then attempted nothing more than to preserve its advantage. Coach Ted Bank's Vandals were completely outclassed although they had gone into the contest slightly favored.

Halfback Ray Hare first went over the Idaho goal only a few minutes after the game got underway in Gonzaga stadium before 4000 persons. Hare caught a 33-yard pass from the other Gonzaga halfback, Tony Canadeo, on the Idaho 22 and ran over the goal from their standing up. Shortly after the second period began, Hare ran 63 yards on a reverse from Canadeo and crossed the Idaho goal again but the touchdown was nullified when officials ruled both teams had been offside on the play.

However, only a few minutes later Canadeo, on a fake reverse, repeated the performance from the Idaho 43. Halfback Ted Stanek kicked the conversion point to make the score 12 to 0.

Thirty seconds before the end of the half Canadeo plunked over the Vandal goal for the third touchdown after a drive from mid-field placed the ball on the two-yard line.

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TIGERS CUT TIE TO BEAT EUREKA TEAM BY 24 TO 12

MEDFORD, Oct. 14 (AP)—Medford turned on the power, in the fourth quarter, with the score tied at 12-all, to defeat the Eureka (Calif.) high school, 24 to 12, in an interstate game here Friday night before a crowd of 5000.

Five minutes remained when Medford marched from its 30-yard line with passes and plunges to the half-yard line, where Orr went over for a touchdown. Lewis Re-elected Head of CIO by Conclave Ovation

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 14 (AP)—The Congress of Industrial Organizations Friday reelected John L. Lewis to its presidency with a tumultuous, 45-minute convention ovation, then drove toward a unanimous critical of the department of labor and the national labor relations board.

Lewis, who tried vainly to restore order among the singing, shouting, parading delegates during his election acclamation, accepted the presidency for the second time but disclosed he had come to the convention "with the hope you would select another leader."

In his acceptance speech, Lewis made no direct reference to the American Federation of Labor, but said the CIO was the "only instrument in 50 years that has proven capable of dealing with industry on equal terms."

"The CIO intends to go forward on a platform that America can endure," Lewis said.

During the election demonstration, some of the delegates took off their shoes and pounded on desks to show their enthusiasm for Lewis' return to office. Business was suspended until the uproar was quieted. Then Lewis was installed for the second term as head of the labor organization which he founded five years ago and which made him its first president when it became a permanent organization last year.

SAN MATEO, Calif., Oct. 13 (UP)—A Milrose, a four-year-old filly, astounded a Friday-the-thirteenth crowd at the Bay Meadows race track yesterday, galloping home first in a sixfurlong sprint to reward a lone, and unidentified backer at the rate of \$207 for a \$2 ticket.

The evening's ground gaining record was hung up by Christiansen, who averaged 22 yards on three runs. He hopped away on one 27-yard spring. Christiansen made several other good gains that were nullified by penalty calls.

Rush's punting averaged 42 yards. He got off one long one that went 60 yards. Ramos' punts averaged 36 yards.
