

BRITISH FORCE REPULSES RAID ON COAST AREA

(Continued from Page One)

offensive against the allies unless his peace proposals were accepted.

A brief air ministry statement read:

"German aircraft attempted to attack coastal objectives in Scotland this afternoon.

"The royal air force have engaged the raiders and have inflicted casualties."

Meanwhile the admiralty declined to comment on a German statement that a torpedo had "severely damaged" the 32,000-ton battle cruiser Repulse.

An admiralty spokesman in answer to a query regarding German claims on the Repulse said officials would not go to the trouble of "denying all these reports."

At the same time, naval observers predicted the new German submarine offensive which sent the Royal Oak to the bottom and destroyed three allied merchant vessels over the weekend would be quickly brought under control.

Naval experts said that while loss of the 23,150-ton Royal Oak, one of Britain's 15 capital ships, was admittedly a severe blow, it was by no means critical.

The admiralty was silent concerning its construction program, but the government was understood to be speeding the building of new warships to assure maintenance of the blockade against Germany.

Nine new battleships were reported under construction. Several large merchant vessels also were being fitted out to augment the fleet.

Churchill was expected to make a statement on the sinking of the Royal Oak in his weekly report to the house of commons tomorrow.

The admiralty, meanwhile, listed 414 survivors of the warship, and acknowledged the chances were "remote" that any of the other 786 members of the crew would be found.

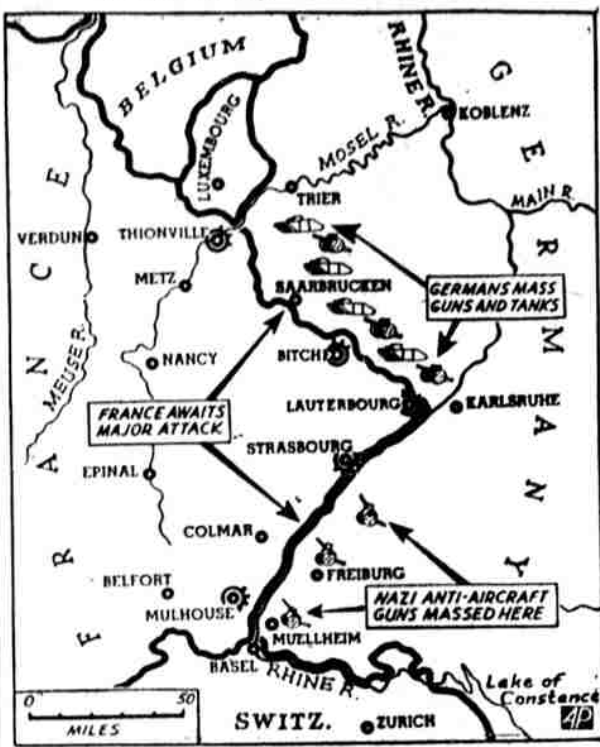
The three merchant ships sank were the British-owned 9,205-ton Lochaven and the French Lines' 10,108-ton Bretagne and 6,903-ton Louisiana.

No lives were lost in the sinking of the Lochaven, but at least 15 were reported missing from the other two vessels.

British warships landed more than 400 survivors of the three ships in English ports yesterday.

Survivors of a German submarine were landed at the same time, but official dispatches did

not say when or how the submarine had been sunk.

Masters of the three vessels said they had been attacked without warning, the skipper of the Bretagne declaring his first knowledge of the submarine's presence came when the wireless room, lifeboats and decks were shelled. The radio operator was wounded and seven persons were killed, a survivor said.

The Louisiana's officer said their wireless rigging and smokestack were the first targets of the submarine, which later came to the surface and offered food to the survivors in lifeboats. The Louisiana's first mate was killed by bursting shrapnel as he supervised the lowering of lifeboats, it was stated.

Brother of Lost Flier Found Dead

OAKLAND, Calif., Oct. 16 (AP)—Richard H. K. Smith, brother of the late Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith of trans-Pacific flying fame, was found dead in the garage at his home here today. Police started an investigation.

The officer expressed belief Smith was fatally stricken while returning to the garage to close the door after backing the car out. An autopsy was set for later today.

Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith was lost at sea in an attempted flight from England to Australia in 1935. He had previously flown from Oakland to Australia, in 1927, and from Australia to Oakland, in 1934.

CHINESE ATTACK

CHUNGKING, Oct. 16 (AP)—Chinese army sources reported today Chinese forces had stormed into the walled city of Hangchow, only 90 miles southwest of Shanghai, killed numerous Japanese soldiers, destroyed the power plant and set fire to an ammunition dump and the headquarters of the Japanese puppet regime.

Victim of Wreck At Hatfield Dies Of Injuries

Eugene Clifton, 25, son of Mrs. Gertrude Santl of Merrill, died at 9 o'clock Saturday night at the Klamath Valley hospital from injuries received Thursday night in a head-on collision near the Roosevelt tavern on the Hatfield-Canby highway.

Clifton, who was in a semi-conscious condition when brought to the hospital from head injuries and a fractured leg, was a passenger in a car occupied by two others, both of whom received lesser injuries. The three passengers of the second auto were also injured.

The accident occurred when a car driven by Roland Robideau of Milwaukie collided with a machine driven by Richard Turner of Kingsburg, Calif. Robideau was taken to Yreka, where he was treated for head injuries. The other occupant was Harvey Barnes, owner of the car. Robideau was driving.

Other occupants of the Turner machine were Buck Sherfield, Tulalake, and Virgil Hawkins, of Chelan, Wash.

Both cars were badly damaged. In a minor accident which occurred at the intersection of Portland drive and Sixth street shortly after 11 o'clock Saturday night, three were injured when the car in which they were riding went into a ditch after being sideswiped by another machine.

The injured, Norwood Brant, Michael Nider and Carl Johnson, all of Klamath Falls, were treated at the Klamath Valley hospital for cuts and bruises. Driver of the car which reportedly sideswiped the machine occupied by the three was Francis Parsons.
