NEW YORK, Oct. 21 (AP)—A mild revival of the war-buying urge came into the stock market today and steels, motor trucks, aircrafts and specialties were lifted fractions to more than a point.

Dealings, slow at the start, picked up a little momentum later with several large blocks of low-priced issues changing hands at about where they finished yesterday. Transfers for the two hours approximated 600,000 shares, or more than double last Saturday's total.
