### Neutrality To Be Subject Discussed By Women at Monday Afternoon Meeting

Women of Klamath Falls who are interested in present world conditions and especially our country's stand on neutrality will be vitally concerned with the meeting Monday afternoon of the Klamath chapter, League of Women Voters, to be held in the city library at two o'clock at which time the foreign relations group will have charge of the session. This meeting of the group will take the place of the study session.

Mrs. Edward A. Geary, president of the League, pointed out that, "because of the seriousness of the debate on neutrality now taking place in congress, the directors of the League here have decided to have an entire program on this subject."

"Long before the present World War the League stood for a change in the present embargo act to a 'cash and carry basis,' and due to the present crisis in Europe it feels it is of added importance that the neutrality law be now changed."

Mrs. Geary and the directors continued in this vein: "However the League of Women Voters, above all else, wishes to stress to its members and public that nothing that is done or left undone about this neutrality act need get us into war. Nothing that congress does or does not do to it can ensure our keeping out. A frightened and hysterical people is the greatest danger we face today. Those who incite fright and those who yield to it are the country's worst enemies. We can keep out if we want to, and if we remain calm and think straight."
