

Pioneer Business Days Recalled Here

Mrs. Rachel Applegate Good Discusses Olden Times of Linkville at BPW Meeting

Relating many interesting and surprising facts of the early day history of Linkville, Mrs. Rachel Good held the attention of the members of the Business and Professional Women's club at their regular meeting Monday night, October sixteenth, at Hotel Willard. Mrs. Good was the guest speaker on the subject, "Our Town's Business in Pioneer Days," which is the national theme of the club this year.

Mrs. Addie Walker, a pioneer guest, gave personal recollections of the hardships and sunshine of early pioneering, telling of a Fourth of July dance when overshoes were required for the snow storm, and of a dance at Devil's Garden when it took the afternoon to travel the twelve miles through sticky mud. At a short distance they were forced to clean the mud from the wheels. However, they danced all night and returned home the next day as happy as the modern youth. She related many up and downs of twenty-nine years of pioneering, mentioning sixty degrees below zero quite casually, insisting that the early settlers here really had a very good time through all the hardships and inconveniences. Her listeners felt that her happy sense of humor held a great deal.

Ida Nordine was the chairman of the interesting program and was assisted by Isabelle Brixner, Nedra Hunt, Winnifred Gillen, Cordelia Cantrall, Edna Russell and Frances Berry. Elsie Eschebeck directed the group singing and Marie Obenchain was the accompanist. Mrs. Gillen sang two solos, "Drink to Me Only With Thine Eyes," and "Smile Through."

The decorations carried out the pioneer theme, the tables being lighted by candle lamps and centered by bowls of St. Michaelmas daisies and old fashioned flowers. An ancient music box, donated by Ray Telford, furnished quaint tunes during the dinner hour and beautiful hand-made quilts furnished an appropriate background. The programs pictured a grandmother patching in an old rocker and Indians and soldiers fighting.

Eight new members were voted upon and accepted in the club, during the business meeting conducted by President Berenice Griffin. All were urged to remember the conference at Grants Pass on November eighteenth and nineteenth, and a large delegation is expected to attend.

Beginning with George Nurse, known as the father of Linkville, Rachel Good told of his buying the townsite in 1867, having arrived here in 1863 and established a store and hotel and also a ferry upon the river. John P. Roberts in the late sixties had opened a store with Albert Hanley at Merganser. Linkville outstripped Merganser and became Klamath Falls in 1892.

Mrs. Good had some of the early newspapers on display and read many amusing ads, with many familiar pioneer names in the professional cards. The first newspaper was the Klamath Weekly Star, published in 1891, and the Linkville Star followed in 1890, with Peter the Poet, editor. In 1895 the Klamath Falls Express made its appearance, bearing the new name of the town. She also read from the morning Express in 1909, advertising about seventy-five business houses in the "booster" number. Now there are about five hundred business establishments in Klamath Falls. From the one hotel, we now have forty-one hosteries. There are ninety-three business establishments based on the auto industry.

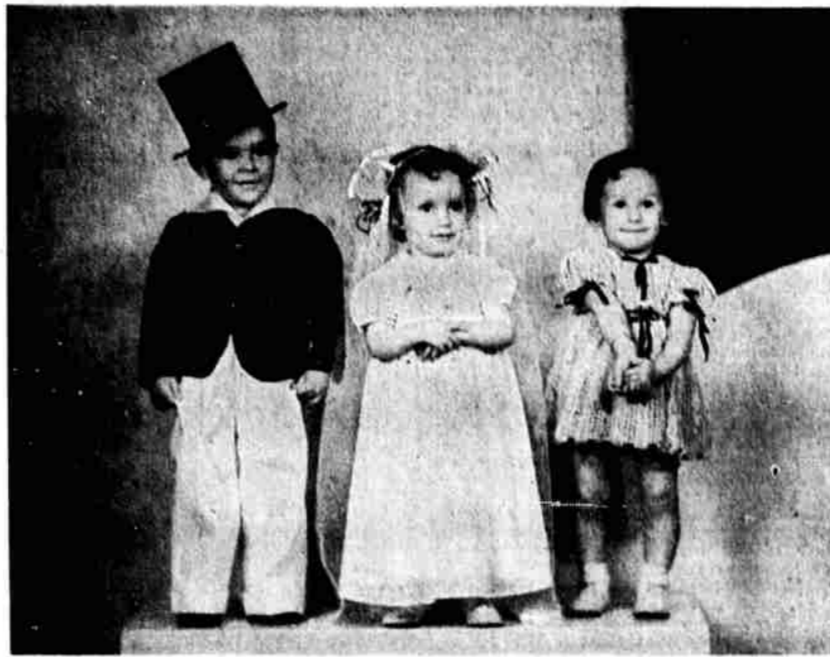

Ballet Of Interest

San Francisco Opera Group To Appear In Klamath Falls

The program which will be seen when the San Francisco Opera Ballet plays at the Pelican theatre on Tuesday night, November fourteenth, will be diversified to an unusual degree, according to announcements received by the Business and Professional Women's club officers who are sponsoring the show as their money-making project for their club this year. There will be three or four definitely contrasting compositions, showing much of ballet's range and possibilities.

William Christensen, artistic director of the ballet, chooses ballets for the company on tour which he believes an American audience will enjoy, and perhaps the secret of the great appeal of the ballet lies in the fact that it is a theatrical art of many elements. A dream world is created that is far from the prosaic and everyday life of the observer. Many Klamath people who attended the ballet last year remarked at the beauty, refreshing personalities and the vital freshness of the youthful dancers. While a trained dancer is like to be judged by appearance, still it is true that an audience doubly enjoys performers who are personable.

All like to see beauty portraying beauty, and no one will forget the moment when the curtains part to the strains of a Chopin Nocturne, revealing a group of dancers in the pure white tutus of the great ballet, seemingly floating in a bath of soft blue light.

In this famous ballet company there are all types of beauty, as the company is truly international. There is dazzling, petite Janet Reed, the ballerina, with her little hair; Maria Tovanaya, an exotic beauty whom every artist wants to paint; Zeldia Norina, black-eyed, dusky beauty whose every feature seems perfect; Jean Dalziel, tall and willowy and of fine figure, and a host of others. The men are virile and athletic youths of artistic feeling and ability.

Von Webber's "Invitation to the Dance" must definitely be included among the ballet classics. William Christensen, who is the principal male dancer of the San Francisco Opera ballet, as well as the artistic director, and Janet Reed, the ballerina, dance to this fascinating composition in "The Dream Lover," a brilliant duo that is ballet at its best.

Jaqueline Martin will be well remembered here for she is almost the perfect dancer. Although but eighteen she has developed a technique and strength which easily overcomes the difficulty of stunts. She is an American and has been dancing since a child of six.

To the young Danish-American artist, Christensen, goes the credit for developing these youthful personalities into outstanding dancers. He is one of the most important ballet figures of the present day. He is of Danish parentage and descended from a family of dancers and ballet masters in Europe.

The three dances from the opera, "Bartered Bride," have been given a thread of story which takes place in a Czech village square on circus day. The peasants gather to watch the clown, the pony, the juggler and the strong man. While they wait they dance a polka and a furiant. The village simpleton complicates matters by wandering into every one's way.

From the amusing to the sublime the ballets skip, until between classic and pure ethereal beauty they reach the tastes of every person in the audience and no one can resist the gay romance and fantastic illusion of their moods and the charm of every movement.

Tickets may be obtained from the members of the Business and Professional Women's club. Be sure to reserve the night of November the fourteenth for a grand treat, and a most unusual one in Klamath Falls, as this will be the only ballet appearing here this year.
