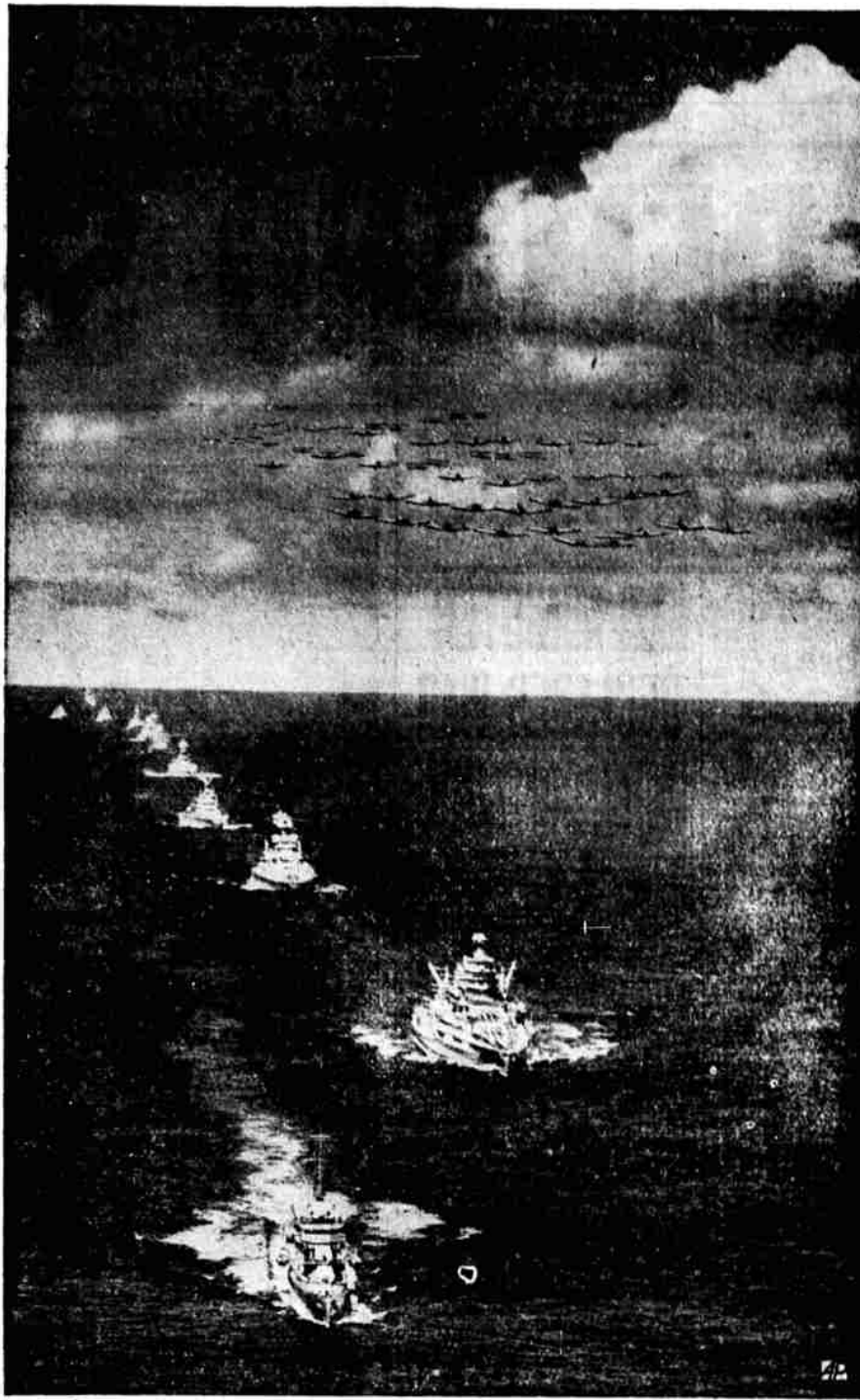

1938 Chrysler Model

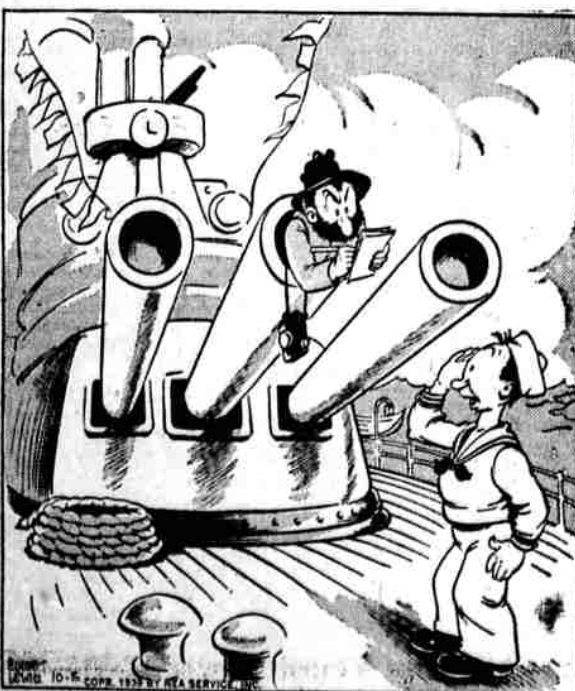

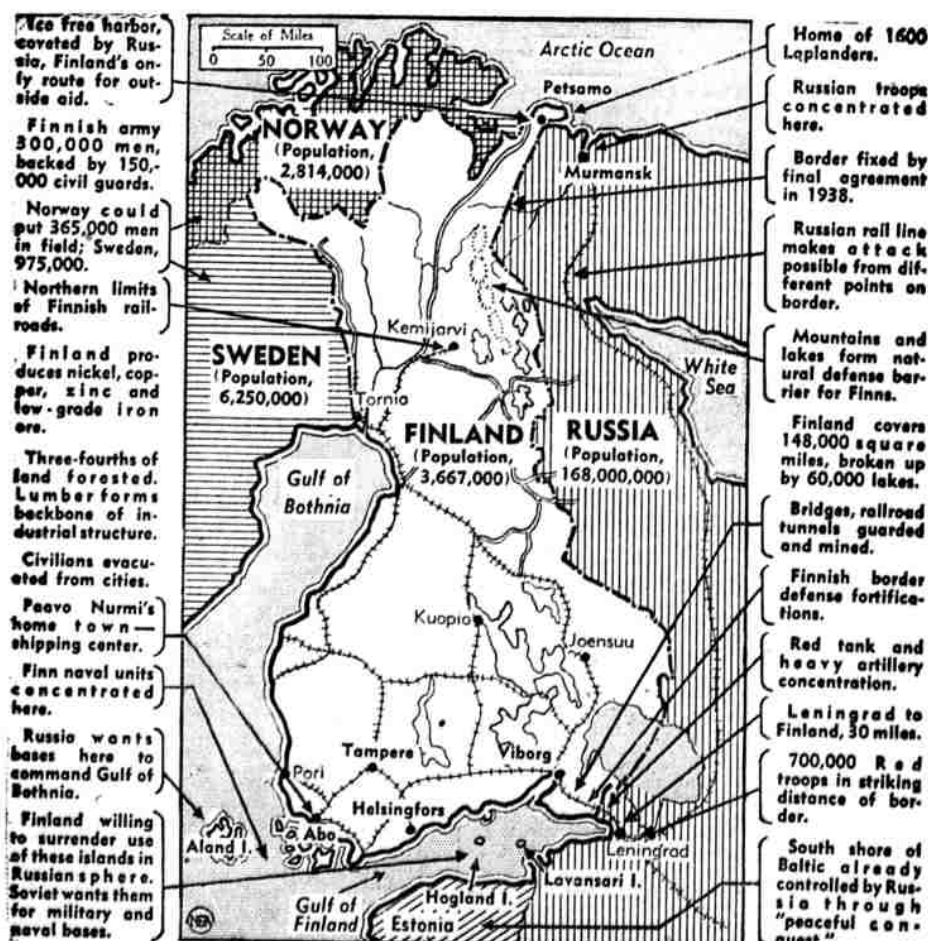


FOR HEAVY DUTY—Seen off California is the U. S. S. Chicago which like all cruisers gets its name from a city.
