

ELECTIONS SET FRIDAY START AAA FOR 1940

Community elections being held throughout the county on Friday, October 27, mark the first step in organizing the Klamath County Agricultural Conservation association for its work in supervising the 1940 AAA program, according to C. A. Henderson, secretary.

A total of 20 community committees and alternates will be elected in four communities at the meetings Friday. Delegates also will be named to represent

each community at the county conservation convention, to be held in Klamath Falls on November 8, when the three members of the county committee will be elected.

Since the federal conservation program, in which 900 farmers of this county participate, will continue practically unchanged in 1940, the major organization feature will be the elections. In many cases, it is expected that committeemen now serving will be reelected, the secretary said.

Officers of the Klamath County Agricultural Conservation association this year are Fred Rueck, chairman; Harry Jackson, vice chairman; and Burrell Short, alternates are C. V. Loosley and J. L. Jacob.

All farmers taking part in the AAA program are members of the county conservation association and may vote in the community elections. Certain regulations govern those eligible to become committeemen, delegates or alternates. They must be farmers or livestock ranchers; they must have qualified during 1939 for a conservation payment; they may not hold federal, state or major county office; they may not be candidates for such offices, and they

cannot be employed by any political organization.

"The county committee is in charge of the general program in the county and the community committees help bring it to each individual farm," the secretary said. "Through the elections, farmers name their own members of these administrative committees."

Following is the schedule of community election meetings, each to be held on Friday, October 27:

Bonanza-Poe valley district, at the Bonanza high school agricultural building, 1 p. m.

Henley-Keno-Midland district, at the Henley grange hall (near Mac's store), 1 p. m.

Mallin-Merrill district, at the Mallin high school agricultural building, 10 a. m.

Fort Klamath-Modoc Point district, at the Fort Klamath civic improvement clubhouse, 10 a. m.

ONE PRISONER ALLOWED BEARD

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 26 (U.P.)—There's a reason for the fact that 57-year-old Louis Gianopolis is the only one of San Quentin pri-

son's 6000 convicts allowed to wear a beard.

Dr. Leo L. Stanley, prison physician, disclosed today that when "Old Louie" was committed for seven years for assault with a deadly weapon four years ago, the deeply-religious California sheepherder refused to be shaved like other convicts.

"You're not the boss here," Louie told the barber who tried to force him into a chair. "God is boss here and you will be punished."

"I'm the boss," the barber replied. "and you're going to get shaved."

But then the barber fell dead.

Dr. Stanley said the barber died of a heart attack brought on by the quarrel, but nobody has tried to shave "Old Louie" since.

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ALFALFA BAN PUT UNDER NEW SETUP

Movement of alfalfa from counties which have been under quarantine because of the alfalfa weevil to other parts of Oregon will be permitted after October 28, provided the alfalfa is fumigated and otherwise handled as outlined in changes just made in the weevil quarantine, announces Director J. D. Mickle of the state department of agriculture.

This will mean that alfalfa bottled up in Baker, Harney, Jackson, Josephine, Malheur, Union and part of Douglas counties for the past few seasons may be released. While the order deals only with intra-state shipment, the department reports it is awaiting reaction to an amendment to the alfalfa weevil quarantine which was proposed recently by the uniform quarantine committee of the western quarantine board. This amendment will be submitted also to central and southern plant boards.

Fumigant approved by the director of agriculture for alfalfa weevil is methyl bromide, used successfully in the Baker county experiments. The present regulation is application at the rate of one pound per 1000 cubic feet of space in a tight car or fumigation chamber or rubberized tarpaulin for 24 hours at a temperature of 65 degrees.
